



FROM THE CHAIRMAN AND CEO

As we closed 2024, we were deeply inspired by the strength of our community in the fight against cancer. Our 60th anniversary year was an extraordinary celebration of collective action and impact.

The milestone year began with the World Cancer Day carnival in February, where, together with Minister for Health Mr Ong Ye Kung, we unveiled our anniversary theme, "Many Lives, One Legacy." This theme reflects the countless lives SCS has touched over six decades and our shared responsibility in building a brighter future.

In the months that followed, SCS reaffirmed our commitment to the cancer community. From strengthening cancer control and prevention efforts through collaboration with the Regional Health Systems (RHSes) to enhancing our comprehensive suite of rehabilitation services, we not only honoured our legacy but also forged bold new paths for the future.

Our work in 2024 was guided by **four strategic thrusts**:



- ◆ Reduce Cancer Incidence
- ◆ Increase Survivor Rate
- ◆ Improve Quality of Life
- ◆ Greater Community Action

These priorities were brought to life through our three key focus areas of work: Bolstering Cancer Control and Prevention, Providing Cancer Care and Support, and Rallying the Community. Together, these initiatives continue to advance our mission:

To Minimise Cancer and Maximise Lives.

Bolstering Cancer Control and Prevention

Back in 1965, SCS launched our first public education campaign, distributing 5,000 posters on the warning signs of cancer. Six decades later, cancer prevention and detection remain at the core of our efforts to reduce cancer incidence and increase survival rates.

In 2024, SCS reached over 32,700 individuals through roadshows, talks, and forums. Together with healthcare partners, we conducted more than 65,800 cancer screenings and administered HPV vaccinations to over 4,000 individuals.

To complement the national Healthier SG movement, SCS refined our cancer control and prevention strategy to work closely with the three healthcare clusters. A key initiative was the launch of the **NCCS-SCS Cancer Genetics Service Screening Programme**, a partnership with SingHealth aimed at reducing cancer incidence by enabling financially challenged at-risk individuals to access recommended screenings.

Another notable initiative was the SCS **Gift of Light cancer awareness care pack**, launched in September. Designed to support preventive care, this care pack provides essential information on cancer screenings and serves as a referral and navigational tool for primary care practitioners.

Recognising the transformative power of youth, SCS launched **#NextGenRising: Youth Against Cancer** in June 2024 to inspire young advocates. The inaugural SCS Youth Summit brought together 171 participants to champion healthy living and cancer awareness.

Anti-smoking efforts also remained a key focus. Through "Break the Habit or Break My Heart" talks, preschoolers were empowered to encourage their

families to quit smoking, while older students engaged in discussions on vaping. Continuous youth outreach will remain instrumental to SCS's drive to foster healthier habits and engage the next generation. In 2024, our collective youth outreach efforts impacted over 11,540 children and youth.

Providing Cancer Care and Support

Rehabilitation plays a critical role in improving treatment outcomes and enhancing the quality of life for individuals living with cancer.

A cornerstone of our care strategy is integrating rehabilitation at every stage of the patient journey. This includes a comprehensive suite of rehabilitative services — from pre-rehabilitation (or "prehab") in tertiary settings to community rehabilitation centres and accessible heartland programmes that promote sustained healthy habits.

In 2024, SCS achieved a significant milestone with the launch of the NCCS-SCS Rehabilitation Centre, Singapore's first dedicated tertiary cancer rehabilitation facility. We are proud to be the first charity to partner with a healthcare institution to offer such a service in an acute setting. And in September, we expanded further with the opening of the SCS Cancer Rehabilitation Centre @ NCIS. Together, these centres ensure seamless transitions from medical care to community-based recovery, setting a new benchmark for holistic cancer care.

Recognising that healthy lifestyle habits are key to reducing the risk of cancer recurrence, we piloted a fitness programme with SportSG, empowering cancer survivors to stay active and healthy within their communities, even after completing rehabilitation.

Looking ahead, SCS is committed to expanding our network of tertiary-based cancer rehabilitation centres across other healthcare clusters. This will strengthen the seamless transition for patients from acute, tertiary-level care to community-based rehabilitation, ensuring continuity and accessibility for all cancer survivors.

In 2025, we will also establish a third Cancer Rehabilitation Centre, supported by Lien Foundation, within the National Healthcare Group cluster. Together with our existing centres in the Singhealth and NUHS clusters, SCS community-based rehabilitation services will be available across the three healthcare clusters, providing comprehensive and seamless support to cancer survivors island wide.

Rallying the Community

No one walks the cancer journey alone. SCS continues to foster community action, with a special focus on survivorship in 2024. Nowhere was this more pronounced than in Singapore's first ever **Cancer Survivors Day** celebration in June, which drew 400 attendees and was graced by our Patron, President Tharman Shanmugaratnam.

This landmark event, aligned with a global movement, honoured the resilience of cancer warriors and their families, celebrating life, hope, and perseverance. Moving forward, SCS will establish Cancer Survivors Day as an annual tradition, to celebrate the remarkable journeys of survivors.

The spirit of unity remained central to our efforts in 2024. Iconic events like **Singapore Cancer Society – TalkMed Relay For Life** and the **Singtel – Singapore Cancer Society Race Against Cancer** rallied over 16,000 participants, raising critical funds to support our cancer programmes.

The launch of the evergreen **Life in Lavender** movement further exemplified this ethos, featuring a travelling exhibition that shared inspiring stories from patients and caregivers. Complementing the exhibition were care kits tailored to different stages of the cancer journey—prevention, diagnosis, survivorship, and remembrance—offering practical resources and emotional support.

We ended the year with a vibrant birthday bash at Zouk, uniting survivors, patients, caregivers, and supporters in a joyous celebration of life and resilience. Livestreamed to engage a wider audience, the event showcased the strength and solidarity of the cancer community.

The Road Ahead

As we step into 2025, we witness a significant leadership transition. Mr Tan Kwang Cheak, who has over 25 years of experience across public, private, and healthcare sectors, will officially assume the role of Chief Executive Officer (CEO) in February 2025.

During his tenure as CEO of the Agency for Integrated Care (AIC), Kwang Cheak led transformative initiatives that strengthened community healthcare networks and improved care integration across Singapore. His strategic vision and ability to navigate complex challenges, including the COVID-19 pandemic, position him well to lead SCS into the future.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to Mr Albert Ching, whose visionary leadership over the past twelve years has been defined by his steadfast commitment to serve more, serve better. Under his tenure, SCS significantly expanded its reach, scaling up screening efforts and bringing patient services—such as our cancer screening clinic and survivorship centre—closer to communities through new service points in the heartlands.

Beyond expanding existing services, he spearheaded new initiatives that have transformed the cancer care landscape. He brought the Relay For Life movement to Singapore, creating a powerful platform to rally the community in solidarity with those impacted by cancer. He also championed the development and integration of cancer rehabilitation as a cornerstone of cancer care and support, expanding rehabilitative services across both acute and community-based settings.

Albert also played a pivotal role in forging strategic partnerships across the healthcare ecosystem, including with NCCS and NCIS, Singapore's leading cancer institutions.

His dedication to organisational development has strengthened SCS from within, fostering a culture of excellence, compassion, and innovation. His unwavering commitment to the cause leaves an enduring legacy—one that will continue to inspire and guide SCS in the years ahead.

ORGANISATION CHART






YEAR IN REVIEW HIGHLIGHTS 2024

In 2024, SCS strengthened and enhanced holistic cancer care with advancements across prevention, support, and community engagement. Guided by our four strategic thrusts—reducing cancer incidence, improving survival rates, enhancing quality of life, and greater community action—we remained steadfast in our mission to minimise cancer and maximise lives.

SCS expanded our rehabilitation programmes, helping over **800 patients** enhance their quality of life before, during, and after cancer treatment. A total of 1,905 individuals benefited from our funding and welfare schemes. Our cancer care and navigation services saw a significant boost, helping **over 1,400 individuals** get connected to vital resources and services. Meanwhile, SCS cancer support groups registered a healthy growth in members, providing solace and community to over **2,300 patients and survivors**.

To complement the national Healthier SG initiative, which offers subsidised screenings through primary care providers, SCS shifted its focus to education, outreach, and advocacy, driving greater screening participation. While national screening is now under the government's purview, SCS still conducted **65,871 screenings** with healthcare partners to ensure underserved communities remain supported. National screening rates have improved with joint efforts from SCS, government, healthcare, and community partners. The National Health Population Survey 2023 reported increases in cervical screening (43.1% to 45.4%) and colorectal screening (38.1% to 41.7%) from 2022 to 2023.

Cancer Control and Prevention

SCS continued to lead efforts in cancer prevention, complementing the national Healthier SG strategy to prioritise early detection and reduce cancer incidence. Working alongside the Ministry of Health, the Health Promotion Board, and the three Regional Health Systems (RHSes), we implemented initiatives to strengthen preventive care in Singapore.

A highlight in 2024 was the NCCS-SCS Cancer Genetics Service Screening Programme. This three-year collaboration with Singhealth provides financial support to at-risk individuals, enabling access to recommended cancer screenings after their genetic screenings for early detection of hereditary cancers. By lowering financial barriers, the programme aims to reduce late-stage diagnoses and improve survival rates.

The SCS Gift of Light programme further strengthened preventive care by providing useful cancer information and equipping primary care practitioners with tools to navigate patients through the cancer screening process. This programme bridges the gap between awareness and action, fostering a culture of proactive health management.

Youth advocacy remained integral to prevention efforts. The #NextGenRising: Youth Against Cancer movement engaged



children and youth through discussions on healthy living, cancer awareness, and anti-smoking campaigns. Break the Habit or Break My Heart™ talks encouraged preschoolers to advocate for smoke-free families, while older students engaged in discussions on vaping. The inaugural Youth Summit further empowered young leaders to champion cancer prevention and inspire change within their communities.

Rallying the Community

Community engagement remained at the heart of SCS's mission in 2024, with a renewed focus on survivorship. Through initiatives that celebrated resilience and inspired collective action, we united individuals, families, and partners in the shared fight against cancer.

The inaugural Cancer Survivors Day brought together 400 attendees, including survivors, caregivers, and supporters, in a powerful celebration of strength and hope. Aligned with the global Cancer Survivors Day movement, this event will become an annual tradition to honour the journeys of survivors and foster a sense of solidarity within the community.

The Life in Lavender campaign further amplified awareness by sharing inspiring stories through a travelling exhibition and care kits tailored to different stages of the cancer patient's journey—from prevention to remembrance. These efforts not only provided practical support but also deepened empathy and understanding within the community.

SCS's iconic events, Singapore Cancer Society - TalkMed Relay For Life and the Singtel - Singapore Cancer Society Race Against Cancer, continued to mobilise public support. With a record high of **over 16,000 participants**, these events raised critical funds for cancer programmes while strengthening the community's resolve to fight cancer together. The Race Against Cancer's new 2km parent-and-child run category encouraged intergenerational participation, reinforcing the collective spirit that defines SCS's mission.



Cancer Care and Support

In 2024, SCS achieved significant milestones in enhancing cancer care for cancer warriors and survivors. In June, we opened the NCCS-SCS Rehabilitation Centre—Singapore's first dedicated tertiary cancer rehabilitation facility—in a ceremony officiated by President Tharman Shanmugaratnam, the Patron of SCS. The centre offers comprehensive prehabilitation and care during ongoing treatments.

We also opened a new SCS Cancer Rehabilitation Centre @ NCIS in September, extending recovery services into community settings. Together, our Cancer Rehabilitation Centres at NCIS and NCCS have supported over **3,438 individuals**, addressing both physical and emotional challenges through holistic, patient-centric care.

To elevate integrative care, SCS introduced a joint management plan, fostering seamless collaboration between medical professionals and rehabilitation teams. This approach aligns acute treatment with personalised recovery strategies, empowering survivors to rebuild strength and resilience while enhancing their long-term wellness.

The Fight Against Cancer Through Exercise and Sports (FACES) programme, piloted in partnership with SportSG, added another layer of support to SCS's full suite of cancer rehabilitation services. This structured fitness initiative empowers survivors to regain strength, confidence and a sense of normalcy, reinforcing the importance of active lifestyles in long-term recovery.

Recognising the rising incidence of cancer among adolescents and young adults (AYAs) aged 16 to 45, SCS has embarked on a collaboration with National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS) to develop a dedicated model of care for this demographic.

Project SAYANG (Supporting AYAs with caNcer through life staGes) was established to create a comprehensive support network for patients and their families, alleviating distress and enhancing their quality of life. By coordinating services and facilitating early access to community palliative care, the initiative aims to improve outcomes in key areas, such as symptom management, while addressing the challenges AYAs face when considering end-of-life care at home.

This initiative marks a strategic expansion of SCS's clinical services, strengthening our role in the cancer care continuum for AYAs. Through integrated, patient-centric support, we are advancing a holistic approach to care while also fostering grief literacy through psychosocial interventions. As part of our commitment to excellence, SCS prioritises staff competency to ensure the highest standards of patient care.



◆ STEERING HEARTS AND CHANGING LIVES: MR ALBERT CHING'S LEGACY

From pioneering life-changing initiatives to fostering collaborations, Mr Albert Ching's vision, compassion, and purpose have profoundly transformed the way SCS cares for our beneficiaries. As he steps down in 2025 after 12 years as CEO of SCS, we look back on the milestones that defined his remarkable journey with the organisation.

In 2012, SCS was at a crossroads. With a shipload of transformative ideas, it still needed the right captain to steer it forward. Then-Chairman Mr Choo Eng Chuan identified Mr Albert Ching as the ideal candidate.

"Albert came across as an honest, principled, and capable executive with a track record of leading organisations, which we needed at the time," recalled Mr Choo.

Steering SCS into a New Era

Without time to waste, Albert rolled up his sleeves and took the wheel, establishing the SCS Multi-Service Centre at Bishan in 2013. Today, this centre has evolved into a cornerstone of SCS's preventive health efforts, offering screenings for breast and cervical cancers.

In 2015, the SCS Cancer Rehabilitation Centre, Singapore's first community-based cancer rehabilitative service was set up. Since then, SCS has gone on to expand its full suite of rehabilitative facilities, both upstream in tertiary-based settings and downstream in the community. Thanks to Albert's efforts, SCS has strengthened its ability to provide comprehensive and seamless rehabilitative support to cancer patients and survivors island wide.

To further solidify SCS's role within Singapore's healthcare ecosystem, he forged lasting partnerships with key institutions such as the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS) and the National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS). These foundational projects redefined SCS's approach to care, ensuring seamless, integrated, and accessible care for patients, survivors, and caregivers alike.

Bringing SCS to New Heights

Former Chairman Mr Wee Leong How, who served from 2018 to 2023, reflected on his "good fortune" to work with Albert. "As CEO, Albert knew exactly what needed to be done to bring SCS to a new level."

In particular, he commended Albert's remarkable ability to leverage his networks to help SCS: "His strength lies in his ability to build, nurture, and tap into a wide network to facilitate the growth of SCS. Not only did he bring stability, he and his team made SCS unrecognisably different from what it was twelve years ago."

Albert's enterprising spirit and tenacity also enabled SCS to navigate occasional storms. Current Chairman Mr Lee Meng Tat praised his uncanny ability to push through important initiatives when it seemed like they would not go through: "His passion for the cancer cause, his can-do mentality, and, of course, his charming networking skills, ensured they did."

A Visionary with an Infectious Spirit



Mr Choo recalled a defining moment which showcased Albert's knack for inspiring and galvanising those around him:

“For our 50th anniversary, we organised a concert where the then-Prime Minister, Mr Lee Hsien Loong, was to be the guest of honour. I remember the concert hall could accommodate up to 5,000 participants, and we doubted whether we could fill it. To our surprise, the entire hall was packed with beneficiaries and stakeholders! It's a testament to how Albert motivated and worked with the team to deliver beyond expectations.”

More than simply getting things done, Albert always made sure his team had the motivation and determination to keep moving forward. "Albert's overflowing enthusiasm for our cause

is contagious," said Ms Susan Lim, manager of Welfare Services and SCS's longest-serving staff. "Every new venture we've embarked on in the last 12 years has been both exciting and extremely fulfilling."

Under Albert's stewardship, SCS earned national recognition for governance and accountability, gratefully accepting the Charity Governance Award in 2023 and the Charity Transparency Award for four years, between 2019 and 2024. These accolades reflect his commitment to fostering a culture of integrity and excellence.



Charting New Horizons

Even as Albert decided to embark on a new adventure, his focus was on ensuring the stability of SCS. Working closely with the Council, he maintained the organisation's momentum during the onboarding of incoming CEO, Mr Tan Kwang Cheak.



With more than 25 years of experience across the public, private, and healthcare sectors, Kwang Cheak brings a wealth of expertise and passion to the helm. His appointment points to new and exciting horizons for SCS - one made possible thanks to the strong foundations Albert has laid.

"As Albert takes a break from work - but not from his hobbies of cycling, running, taking Wefies, and eating ice cream by the tub! - we would like to express our sincere thanks and appreciation and wish him the very best," said Mr Lee. "We will all miss him dearly, but also eagerly look forward to working with Kwang Cheak to take SCS to new heights."

As our journey with Albert concludes, SCS extends our deepest gratitude for his unwavering commitment and contributions over the past 12 years. His bold vision and tireless efforts have transformed our services into a beacon of hope for those affected by cancer, leaving a legacy that will continue to define the organisation and impact lives for generations to come.





THE FACES BEHIND OUR LEGACY

For 60 years, the Singapore Cancer Society has been a pillar of support, hope, and resilience. Behind this legacy are the individuals whose stories of strength and courage continue to inspire.



Suhaimi Masohan

One of them is 70-year-old Suhaimi Masohan, who was diagnosed with stage four prostate cancer in 2022. When doctors gave him just three years to live, his world fell apart. Yet, through the care and support of Singapore Cancer Society (SCS) Hospice Care, Suhaimi found comfort, clarity, and a renewed sense of purpose. Today, he spends his time volunteering and sharing his story to bring hope and courage to others facing similar challenges.

Stories like Suhaimi's are at the heart of our mission. For six decades, SCS has walked alongside individuals and families navigating cancer, offering financial aid, emotional counselling, and rehabilitation services. To celebrate 60 years of fighting cancer, we spotlighted 60 individuals from our community of patients, survivors, caregivers, volunteers, and staff. Together, they stand as ambassadors of our cause to minimise cancer and maximise lives, united by our mission to ensure no one faces cancer alone.



Seah Wan Peng

For caregivers like Seah Wan Peng, whose father is battling stage four colon cancer, SCS Hospice Care was a lifeline, especially during her family's most vulnerable moments. "Be brave and ask for help," she advises. "Don't keep it within, because you never know when help will arrive."



Kenji Ng

SCS's reach touches all generations. For 19-year-old university student Kenji Ng, whose father was diagnosed with cancer when he was just eight months old, the organisation became a source of hope. Through SCS's Help the Children and Youth programme, Kenji and his brother received the educational support and financial assistance they needed to focus on their studies.

Today, Kenji gives back by performing at SCS events, using music to inspire survivors and caregivers. "The wings of hope are not visible to the eye but reside within our hearts," he shares. "Let's spread our invisible wings, uplift one another and advocate for those affected by cancer."



Michael John Rollings

These stories reflect not only the strength of survivors and caregivers but also the power of acceptance and purpose. Michael John Rollings, who was told his advanced prostate cancer was incurable, describes the moment as transformative: "I stopped chasing a dream of a cure. I thought: 'This is it. Get on with it.'"

Now 75, Michael lives with cancer while helping others navigate their own journeys. As an active member of the Walnut Warriors support group, he draws strength from the bonds he's formed with fellow survivors. "You hear about men in the trenches," he says. "They may not be friends in normal times, but they form life-long bonds during war because they're in the same predicament: helping each other survive."



Aparna Suri

For three-time cancer survivor Aparna Suri, early detection has been lifesaving. She has become a passionate advocate for screening: "By taking tests, you can take control... If even one person hears my story and goes for a mammogram, that will mean a lot to me."



Karyn Wong

Others, like Karyn Wong, choose to bring light to fellow survivors while living with advanced lung cancer. "Volunteering helps walk us out from the darkness. You are not alone. Stay strong."



Zoe Yap

Zoe Yap, who has been battling rectal cancer since 2014, has a mantra that perfectly captures this ethos: "We have a choice to either let [cancer] consume us or learn to live with it. I choose to embrace it and find strength in my vulnerability."

✦ BOLD MOVES, NEW BEGINNINGS, AND A BIRTHDAY BASH: HOW WE CELEBRATED OUR 60TH ANNIVERSARY

In 1964, the Singapore Cancer Society (SCS) was founded on a simple yet powerful belief: no one should face cancer alone. Over six decades, SCS has grown from humble beginnings in a borrowed library space into Singapore's leading cancer charity—bridging critical gaps in care and providing a full spectrum of services, from prevention to rehabilitation and end-of-life support.

To mark six decades of impact, SCS celebrated with the theme **"Many Lives, One Legacy,"** reflecting not only the

milestones achieved but also the lives touched and forever changed. This year-long commemoration featured a blend of events, groundbreaking initiatives, and inspiring stories of resilience. From the bold launch on World Cancer Day to the debut of Cancer Survivors Day, the expansion of rehabilitation services, and the grand finale at Zouk, every moment carried the promise of a brighter future for the cancer community.

The Bold Beginning: Launching our 60th Celebration

SCS officially kicked off our 60th anniversary celebrations on 17th February, in conjunction with a World Cancer Day carnival. Held at Our Tampines Hub, the event brought together approximately **5,000 participants**, including cancer survivors, beneficiaries, healthcare partners, volunteers, and government stakeholders. The launch served as a powerful reflection of our six-decade-long commitment to minimising cancer's impact and maximising lives.

One highlight was a special video message from President Tharman Shanmugaratnam, the newly minted Patron of SCS. Filmed in the Istana, the video was a powerful statement in raising awareness about cancer prevention

and inspiring collective action in the fight against the disease.

SCS also revealed key initiatives at the launch including the Life in Lavender campaign to deepen public awareness of the experiences of the cancer community, and the provision of care kits containing information and resources tailored to patients at every stage of their cancer journey—screening, diagnosis, post-treatment recovery and remembrance. The launch culminated with the unveiling of the SCS60 logo, symbolising a web of support, collaboration, and resilience. Guests also witnessed a symbolic flag-off of ComfortDelGro taxis featuring SCS beneficiaries' stories, driving cancer awareness into the heartlands.



The Celebration of Hope: Inaugural Cancer Survivors Day

Patients have always been at the centre of what we do. As part of our 60th-anniversary celebrations, SCS hosted Singapore's first-ever **Cancer Survivors Day** on 1 June at the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS). Aligned with the global movement of Cancer Survivors Day, the event recognised the strength and perseverance of cancer warriors. SCS announced the intent to make this an annual platform in Singapore—one that raises awareness, inspires hope, and celebrates the remarkable journeys of survivors.

Graced by SCS Patron, President Tharman Shanmugaratnam, the day brought together survivors,

caregivers, and families in a celebration of triumph and resilience. In his address, President Tharman affirmed the collective commitment of the community to minimising cancer's impact and improving survivorship rates in Singapore, underscoring the importance of unity in advancing care and recovery.

One of the day's poignant moments was the "Ring the Bell" ceremony—a global tradition that celebrates the end of treatment and a hard-fought personal victory. Surrounded by loved ones, survivors declared their strength with the words, "Cancer never had me."



The Next Frontier in Care: A Full Suite of Rehabilitation Services

SCS celebrated our 60th year by renewing our commitment to patients, survivors and caregivers. This was manifested in the opening of the NCCS-SCS Rehabilitation Centre on Cancer Survivors Day, Singapore's first dedicated tertiary cancer rehabilitation facility.

SCS further expanded community-based care with the opening of the SCS Cancer Rehabilitation Centre @ NCIS, making holistic rehabilitation more accessible. To ensure survivors sustain healthy lifestyles, we partnered with SportSG to pilot a fitness programme in local gyms, helping survivors maintain physical and emotional well-being while reducing the risk of relapse.



The Grand Finale: Honouring Legacies, Celebrating Impact



SCS marked the finale of our 60th Anniversary celebrations with a vibrant birthday bash at Zouk on 8 December 2024. Over 500 cancer warriors, survivors, caregivers, volunteers, and partners gathered to commemorate a landmark year of achievements, unity, and hope. The evening was a tribute to the resilience of the cancer community and the collective efforts that have shaped SCS's six decades of impact.

The evening was marked by a spirited flash mob dance performed by cancer survivors, embodying strength, determination, and joy. Survivors from SCS support groups devoted weeks to rehearsals, and their performance was a testament to life beyond cancer. Breast cancer survivor Madam Foziah Yeon, 65, shared:

“ Taking part in this was a way for me to show that life after cancer can be filled with joy and new challenges. The rehearsals were tough but rewarding and seeing the audience's reaction made the effort worth it. ”

✦ BOLSTERING CANCER CONTROL AND PREVENTION

SCS continues to lead the fight against cancer, championing prevention through robust screening programmes, public awareness initiatives, and strategic partnerships.

In 2024, SCS pivoted its Cancer Control and Prevention strategy and efforts to align with the Healthier SG movement. Working closely with the three Regional Health Systems (RHSes), we are strengthening upstream healthcare interventions through various approaches: building public awareness about cancer prevention, expanding access to early detection screening programmes, working with GPs to support the implementation of cancer screenings, and empowering Singaporeans to become health advocates in their communities. These coordinated efforts aim to support healthier lifestyles and reduce the national cancer burden.

In support of the Healthier SG initiative, SCS launched the Gift of Light (GOL) programme with two key components to strengthen national cancer control and prevention efforts. The first component, the GOL care pack, serves as both a public education resource and a consultation aid for GPs. It provides comprehensive information about three cancers that have significant incidence and mortality rates in Singapore—breast, cervical, and colorectal cancers—and supports GPs and their patients during consultations and beyond.

The second component, the GOL referral system, serves as a navigation tool that helps primary care providers guide their patients through cancer screening and prevention pathways. This dual approach empowers both individuals and healthcare providers in delivering effective cancer prevention.

World Cancer Day

SCS commemorated its 60th anniversary with the launch of a year-long campaign on 17 February 2024 at Our Tampines Hub. Held in conjunction with World Cancer Day—an international day to raise awareness of cancer and encourage its prevention, detection and treatment—the event was graced by Minister for Health Mr Ong Ye Kung and attended by some 5,000 participants.



In line with the international World Cancer Day theme, 'Close the Care Gap,' the carnival featured a panel discussion with cancer survivors, an energetic dance performance for cancer survivors, and special guest Dr Koh Poh Koon, Senior Minister of State for Sustainability and the Environment, and Manpower and Adviser to Tampines GRC Grassroots Organisation.

One highlight of the event was a special video message for World Cancer Day from the President of Singapore and SCS's new Patron, Mr Tharman Shanmugaratnam.

A special taxi flag-off ended the event on a high. The taxis featured various profiles of SCS survivors and aimed to drive the cancer message across Singapore.

Colorectal and Gastric Cancer: Tackling Common Cancer Risk Factors

Lifestyle factors like unhealthy diets and excessive alcohol consumption contribute to the risk of various cancers, including colorectal and gastric cancers. To encourage healthier lifestyle habits, SCS launched the "Find It Before It Finds You" campaign at Sengkang Grand Mall in September, to raise awareness of the signs and prevention of colorectal and gastric cancers.

The event engaged over 800 attendees with expert talks, interactive quizzes, and a cooking demonstration by Chef Heman Tan, emphasising early detection and lifestyle changes to reduce cancer risks.

Colorectal cancer can be largely prevented through early detection. In 2024, SCS continued efforts to distribute Faecal Immunochemical Test (FIT) kits to 69,026 eligible individuals. Additionally, 58,349 individuals were screened through community events and partnerships with organisations like Eu Yan Sang, Guardian, and Unity, as well as healthcare institutions such as Changi General Hospital and NUHS CareHub.



Championing Lung and Prostate Health

Lung cancer, Singapore's third most common cancer, affects both men and women, with five cases diagnosed and three lives lost daily. Prostate cancer has also become the leading cancer among Singaporean men, with four cases diagnosed daily.

SCS dedicated November to combined efforts for Prostate and Lung Cancer Awareness Month. Fireside chat-style webinars engaged **583 participants** and generated over 130 questions, reflecting the audience's thirst for actionable insights.

The Fight Against Cervical Cancer

In 2024, SCS advanced the mission to protect women from cervical cancer with expanded HPV vaccination initiatives, comprehensive screening services, and a digital-first awareness campaign.

Through our continued partnership with Temasek Foundation, the HPV Immunisation Programme offered free vaccinations to women aged 18 to 45, bridging care gaps for those who missed school-based vaccinations. By year's end, **13,879 women** had received at least one dose—nearly 70 per cent of the programme's vaccination target—delivered through a network of 420 CHAS clinics.

Women's Gynaecological Cancer Awareness Month adopted a fresh digital approach under the theme "Don't Ignore What's Underneath". The campaign spotlighted uterine, ovarian, and cervical cancers, leveraging social media, MRT advertising, a podcast feature on Daily Ketchup, and endorsements from key opinion leaders.

Nearly 500 participants joined educational webinars. To connect with specific community groups, SCS worked with KKH to host a mosque talk, attended by 60 participants, with 20 women signing up for cervical and mammogram screenings at the SCS Clinic @ Bishan. SCS also partnered with the Public Health Service Committee for an offsite cervical screening initiative, screening 74 participants during a mass health event.

Battling Breast Cancer

Despite breast cancer being the most prevalent cancer among women, breast screening rates continue to decline, with the 2023 National Population Health Survey revealing a drop to 34.7 per cent (from 37.6 per cent in 2022), far below the 50 to 85 per cent rates seen in developed countries.

In October 2024, National Breast Cancer Awareness Month focused on empowering women with knowledge and resources while promoting early detection and support for those affected. Themed "Empower Her", the campaign aimed to boost screening rates and highlight the importance of regular mammograms.

The month kicked off on 27 September at Bugis Junction, with First Lady Ms. Jane Ittogi officiating the launch. Led by Tan Tock Seng Hospital and supported by SCS, the event featured a moving fashion show, "Walk of Resilience: Garden of Flowers," where breast cancer survivors modelled designs by local brand Esse, celebrating their courage and tenacity.

A highlight was the deployment of a community mammobus, a collaboration between SCS, National Healthcare Group Diagnostics (NHGD), and Breast Cancer Foundation (BCF), to bring free breast screenings to the community.

SCS's annual breast cancer awareness webinar also attracted over 1,440 attendees who listened to experts and survivors share insights on early detection, screening, and treatment options.

To further engage heartland communities, SCS partnered with Khatib Polyclinic, Sembawang Polyclinic, and Woodlands Health to organise educational forums and outreach activities.

The SCS Clinic @ Bishan

Established in 2013, the SCS Clinic @ Bishan provides key clinical cancer screening services. These include mammogram services to CHAS orange or blue card holders as well as PAP and HPV tests for women. The screening clinic is staffed with a resident physician. Conveniently located in the Bishan Junction 8 office tower, near the MRT and bus interchange, the clinic ensures accessible and affordable care, supporting patients on their cancer control and prevention journey.

In 2024, the clinic acquired a state-of-the-art mammography system. The system reduces radiation while

providing high quality images and is fully upgradable to 3D imaging, addressing future needs for more sophisticated breast health screening. Since the launch of the Healthier SG initiative, the clinic has seen a significant increase in screening participants and has expanded its mammogram services from three to four days a week.

As a complementary cancer screening centre supporting the Healthier SG initiative, the clinic plays an active role in follow-up processes to ensure that primary care providers maintain medical oversight of their patients.



#NextGenRising: Nurturing Young Trailblazers

Recognising the potential of youth in shaping a healthier future, SCS launched #NextGenRising: Youth Against Cancer, a movement to empower young advocates through three levels of engagement:



Be Informed, Be Empowered, and Be the Change.



Targeting students across pre-school to tertiary levels, the initiative addressed key issues like smoking, vaping, HPV vaccination, and healthy living. Tailored school talks delivered age-appropriate messages. For pre-schoolers, the "Break the Habit or Break My Heart" talks introduced the harmful effects of smoking in a relatable way, empowering children to encourage their families to quit. Older students explored topics such as vaping, HPV vaccinations, and the link between nutrition and cancer prevention.

Across all levels, these efforts engaged **11,541 students**, driving home the message that everyday choices have long-term health consequences.



The Inaugural SCS Youth Summit

As part of SCS's 60th Anniversary celebrations, the inaugural Singapore Cancer Society Youth Summit in July 2024 gathered 171 passionate young participants to advocate healthy living and cancer awareness.

The event featured an Interschool Competition where tertiary students crafted impactful storyboards on cancer prevention, guided by storytelling workshops from TheSmartLocal. Standout entries included the Overall Winner, "Your Star Sign... Cancer?" by Sparsh Vashishth, Sadak Advait, and Lee Tse Yee Megan, and the People's Choice Award, "Inner Voice Story: Fight Against Cervical Cancer" by Cho Yoonseo.

Youth Conversations provided a platform for meaningful dialogue with experts, sparking creative campaign ideas to combat cancer stigma, misinformation, and discrimination.

The summit empowered youth to step up as leaders, inspiring change and nurturing a culture of compassion in the fight against cancer.





Advocating for a Smoke-Free Future

Launched in 2015, the Smoke-Free Ambassador Programme continues to build a generation of advocates to promote anti-smoking messages and drive positive change within communities. Targeted at Brownies, Girl Guides, and Red Cross Youths, the programme trained 896 students in 2024 to lead peer-to-peer campaigns within their schools such as educational campaigns and setting up interactive booths.

SCS also reached preschoolers through the 'Break the Habit or Break My Heart' initiative, which empowers young children to encourage their families to quit smoking.



Engaging Corporates through empowHER

Screening rates for women's cancers in Singapore lag behind other developed nations. Launched in 2022, the empowHER Campaign encourages organisations to champion women's health by promoting cancer awareness, facilitating screenings, and offering flexible work arrangements. SCS supports this initiative with funding assistance for eligible employees and toolkits to integrate screenings into workplace health benefits.

In 2024, empowHER engaged **over 5,600 participants through 40 talks and roadshows**, with 10 companies, including FairPrice and Sheng Siong, joining the movement.

Reaching Communities Where It Matters

In 2024, SCS expanded community outreach by collaborating with 35 organisations, including government agencies, social service agencies, hospitals, and active ageing centres, to bring cancer awareness to local communities.

We also tailored our outreach efforts to the Malay-Muslim community, acknowledging the need for culturally relevant content. In January, we participated in the Sihat Bersama Jaga Kesihatan Jaga Ummah (JKJU) event, organised by the Health Promotion Board (HPB). The event united community partners to discuss strategies for prioritising health while celebrating contributions to health promotion.

In June, SCS collaborated with Ain Society for a cancer-focused exhibition, and in July, the Hijrah Health Fiesta 2024 provided another platform for SCS to engage participants through an interactive booth. In October, the Sembawang GRC Health Fiesta 2024 drew more than 1,000 attendees with SCS managing to engage 400, further amplifying cancer awareness.

Beyond events, SCS partnered with HPB to distribute educational resources throughout their Malay-Muslim community network and displayed banners at Jamek Queenstown Mosque, Mujahidin Mosque, and Angullia Mosque. These initiatives ensured that individuals from diverse backgrounds gained access to essential health resources, further bridging care gaps.



✦ PROVIDING CANCER CARE AND SUPPORT

Since our inception, SCS has pioneered innovative cancer care and support. To mark our 60th anniversary, we progressed to provide a full suite of cancer rehabilitation services across the continuum—from upstream acute care to downstream community programs—ensuring greater access to this vital service. We also identified a key gap by exploring the unique needs of adolescents and young adults (AYA) with cancer, a growing yet underserved group.

SCS also continued to strengthen our psychosocial services, survivorship programmes, funding and welfare aid, and hospice care services, providing holistic support to patients and their families at every stage of the cancer journey.

At our core, SCS remains a patient-centric organisation, relentless in breaking new ground and bridging service gaps. For the cancer community, we are committed to serve more and serve better.

Cancer Rehabilitation

Once considered an afterthought, rehabilitation is fast being recognised as a vital part of cancer treatment and care plans. To respond to this pressing need, SCS scaled up a full suite of rehabilitation services in 2024, including a first-of-its-kind tertiary-based rehabilitation centre. We are also committed to advocating the importance of this vital service which helps patients cope successfully with treatment, increase survival rates, and enhance their quality of life.

In 2024, SCS supported 499 new patients who enrolled at the Cancer Rehabilitation Centre (CRC), bringing the total number of patients under CRC care to 824, including those continuing their treatment from previous years. Additionally, the NCCS-SCS Rehabilitation Centre welcomed 54 new patients, further expanding the reach of our rehabilitation efforts.

Launching Rehab in a Tertiary Setting

A landmark achievement in 2024 was the official opening of the **NCCS-SCS Rehabilitation Centre** on 1 June. Developed in partnership with the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), it is the nation's only dedicated cancer rehabilitation facility in a tertiary care setting. The centre supports NCCS patients with complex medical conditions by offering tertiary-level rehabilitation, including prehabilitation before surgery or treatment and care during ongoing treatments. Upon completing oncology treatments, patients transition seamlessly to SCS Cancer Rehabilitation Centres for community-based rehabilitation, ensuring continuity of care.

Expanding Community Rehabilitation

In September 2024, SCS, in collaboration with the National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS), launched the **SCS Cancer Rehabilitation Centre @ NCIS** at the NUH Medical Centre. This is our second community rehabilitation facility, complementing the first, which is co-located within the NCCS building. With this expansion, SCS has solidified its presence in the NUHS cluster, bringing accessible rehabilitation services to residents in Western Singapore.

Looking ahead, the planned opening of a third community rehabilitation centre in the NHG cluster will ensure SCS's rehabilitation services are available across all three Regional Health Systems, providing comprehensive and seamless support to cancer survivors island wide.



Maintaining Health After Rehabilitation

Rehabilitation is the beginning of a lifelong journey toward better health and reduced cancer recurrence risks. Recognising this, SCS partnered with SportSG to launch a pilot fitness programme tailored specifically for cancer survivors. The programme offers guided sessions at community gyms and heartland spaces, bridging the gap between rehabilitation and active living. In this way, SCS ensures that survivors continue to embrace a healthy lifestyle even after their discharge from tertiary and community-based rehabilitation facilities.

Mainstreaming Rehabilitation in Healthcare

SCS's Cancer Rehabilitation Services team continued to champion the importance of rehabilitation in cancer care throughout 2024, engaging the public, healthcare providers, and the cancer community through a range of impactful events and conferences.

Highlights included sharing insights on nutrition and fitness during World Cancer Day, public forums and presenting research on exercise and quality of life at international conferences. SCS also participated in events such as the Singapore Rehabilitation Conference and the European Society for Medical Oncology Summit.

In total, the team took part in or spoke at 14 events in 2024, reinforcing SCS's commitment to positioning cancer rehabilitation as an essential component of mainstream healthcare.

Lymphedema Special Interest Group

Lymphedema, a chronic and often debilitating condition, affects many cancer survivors. The condition can cause significant physical challenges, such as fatigue from additional limb weight, and emotional burdens, including distress and body image concerns.

SCS started the Lymphedema Special Interest Group (LE SIG) in July 2024. It empowers survivors to take control of their condition by providing education on lymphedema management, teaching self-monitoring and symptom management techniques, and equipping individuals with strategies to alleviate physical discomfort and improve daily functionality.

In 2024, SCS supported 460 clients for mental and emotional wellbeing, providing a lifeline through innovative approaches and compassionate care. Together, we enable survivors to reclaim their lives with confidence and grace.

On June 1, 2024, the SCS Psychosocial Support team organised Cancer Survivors Day, a highlight event that brought together survivors to celebrate resilience and recovery. Our inaugural celebration was attended by over 400 individuals and was graced by President Tharman Shanmugaratnam and his spouse, Ms Jane Ittogi.

The significance of Cancer Survivors Day lies in its focus on life after cancer, celebrating milestones and resilience while also drawing attention to the needs of survivors, which includes long-term health monitoring, mental health care, and social support.

Coffee and Community at CAmpong Cafe

In 2024, SCS soft-launched CAmpong Cafe, a unique befriending space supported by AstraZeneca's Cancer Can Give initiative. A blend of "kampung" and "cancer," the name embodies the spirit of community and support—because it truly takes a village to rally behind those affected by the disease.

Located within the SCS headquarters on level 16 of the NCCS building, the cafe offers a safe, welcoming space for cancer patients and their caregivers to relax while waiting for medical appointments. Members of the public are also welcome with drinks and pastries offered on a pay-as-you-wish basis.

Patient ambassadors, who are cancer survivors themselves, are present to engage visitors in conversation and connect them to SCS services including support groups, counselling, and rehabilitation. The cafe also provides flexible, part-time employment opportunities for cancer survivors, hiring them as baristas.

Since its debut in June 2024, CAmpong Cafe has served over 5,200 beverages and achieved a customer satisfaction score of 94 per cent. It has facilitated meaningful interactions, with 98 reported conversations between trained volunteers, cancer survivors, and caregivers to date.



Casework and Counselling

In 2024, SCS provided 1,352 supportive counselling sessions to patients and caregivers, helping them navigate the emotional toll of cancer. Feedback revealed a high satisfaction rate of 94%, with many noting the invaluable comfort provided by our dedicated counsellors.

Art Therapy added another layer of emotional healing, offering participants creative outlets to process their experiences and express their feelings. Over 20 survivors participated in these sessions, reporting significant improvements in mental well-being and a renewed sense of purpose.

Return-to-Role Programme

SCS's Return to Role Programme supports suitable patients in resuming caregiving responsibilities, hobbies, and other essential roles. Supported by Tan Chin Tuan Foundation (2024) and President's Challenge (2024 & 2025), it fosters recovery and reintegration.

Cancer Navigation and Patient Ambassador Programme

SCS's Cancer Care Navigators play a key role in ensuring survivors receive the care and resources they need during their recovery. Whether linking individuals to support groups, guiding them through financial assistance programmes, or providing emotional reassurance, these navigators are a steady source of support.

In 2024, care navigators assisted 1,443 patients and caregivers over 2,435 follow-up sessions, helping them navigate the complexities of survivorship with confidence.

The Patient Ambassador Programme extends this personalised support by pairing survivors with newly diagnosed patients for six months of peer-led guidance. This initiative fosters a sense of hope, allowing patients to draw strength from those who have walked similar paths. A total of 32 individuals were referred through the programme in 2024, offering solace to survivors every step of the way.

B.E.A.C.O.N Programme

The B.E.A.C.O.N (Befriend, Educate, Advocate—Cancer Outreach Network) is a pilot initiative that trains individuals to raise cancer awareness, share basic cancer knowledge, and to empathetically communicate with those affected. Our goal is to empower as many people as possible to become cancer advocates within their personal networks.

To date, SCS has trained 1,695 cancer-informed advocates, each committed to supporting at least 3,804 individuals within their communities.

Return-to-Work Programme

SCS's enhanced Return-to-Work Programme supported survivors in reclaiming their professional lives. Through specialised rehabilitation and skills training, participants gained confidence and work readiness. In 2024, the programme enabled 42 individuals to secure and sustain employment, creating a pathway to renewed independence and stability.

Supporting Children and Youth

Cancer often casts a long shadow over families, deeply affecting children and youths who face emotional and academic pressures. SCS provides young people with holistic support, helping them build resilience and stay focused on their education during trying times.

Supported by the SingTel Touching Lives Fund's annual \$250,000 pledge, the Help the Children and Youth Programme (HCYP) offers free one-to-one home tuition for financially disadvantaged students affected by cancer. Qualified tutors not only help students improve academically but also serve as a vital bridge between families and SCS, offering feedback to address broader concerns. In 2024, we supported 23 students through the Home Tuition Programme, disbursing \$90,159.50 in funds.

The SCS Achievement Awards also celebrated 53 students who excelled academically while managing the challenges of cancer in their families. A total of \$21,000 was awarded, recognising their achievements and inspiring perseverance. SCS also provided school allowances and bursaries, easing financial loads and ensuring education remains a priority for affected families.



Welfare

Cancer treatment often brings significant financial strain, especially for families already stretched thin. SCS offers comprehensive financial aid and welfare services to meet patients' diverse needs. In 2024, a total of **\$2.51 million was disbursed to 1,905 beneficiaries**, provided critical support, ensuring no one faces their cancer journey alone.

SCS Cancer Treatment Fund

Since 2005, the Cancer Treatment Fund has provided life-saving treatments to 6,425 patients referred by medical social workers and doctors from restructured hospitals. In 2024, **\$647,000 was allocated to support 227 patients** in accessing essential cancer treatments.

SCS also collaborates with pharmaceutical companies through the Patient Access Programme (PAP) to provide patients with access to critical medicines. These partnerships alleviate the cost of high-priced medications,

ensuring that patients receive necessary care without undue financial strain.

In partnership with Takeda, SCS offers access to Brentuximab, a medication used in the treatment of certain types of Lymphoma. Our collaboration with Roche has also enabled access to several critical medications to treat breast, liver, lung, leukemia and lymphoma cancers, improving quality of life and bringing hope to countless families.

SCS Welfare Aid Fund

Since 1964, the Welfare Aid Fund has supported a total of 7,698 patients with basic needs including essential supplies such as milk, diapers, and stoma bags. By alleviating everyday burdens, this fund allows families to focus on caregiving and recovery. In 2024, **\$636,000 was disbursed, benefitting 346 patients.**

SCS Cancer Care Fund

Introduced in 2015, the Cancer Care Fund provides newly diagnosed patients with a one-time financial boost during the critical first six months of diagnosis. To date, SCS has supported **11,423 patients with nearly \$10.25 million**. In 2024, this support has been a safety net for **1,329 families, with more than \$1.17 million disbursed** to help mitigate the initial financial shock of a cancer diagnosis.

Home-Hospital Transportation Service

Transportation should never be a barrier to accessing lifesaving treatment. That is why SCS introduced The Home-Hospital Transportation Service, providing eligible patients with assistance to travel to and from medical appointments, radiotherapy, or chemotherapy sessions. With thousands of patients benefiting from this initiative, we are proud to ease the financial burden for families facing the challenges of cancer treatment. In 2024, **6,226 single passenger trips were facilitated, supporting 429 patients.**

Beyond Financial Aid: Restoring Hope & Dignity

At SCS, we believe that true support goes beyond financial assistance—it's about restoring hope, dignity, and a sense of purpose to those affected by cancer. By addressing the unique challenges our beneficiaries face, we empower them to rebuild their lives and find strength in community, even in their most difficult moments.

Transforming Homes, Transforming Lives

For nearly a decade, SCS has been supporting Madam Lee by providing essential nutritional milk feeds. After her spouse passed on, she wanted to improve her home so she could rent out a room for additional income—but she needed help.

In collaboration with Thye Hua Kwan Community Case Management Services and Hengli PetroChemical International, SCS supported Madam Lee's home improvement project, transforming her space into a clean and liveable environment. Reflecting on the experience, Madam Lee shared how happy she was with her "improved house," thanking both Hengli PetroChemical and SCS for their support.

Similarly, SCS extended assistance to Madam Juliana, a widow undergoing cancer treatment who had vacated her HDB flat due to its poor condition. With the help of AIN Society, MP Ms Sun Xueling, and the Pasir Ris-Punggol Town Council cleaning team, her home was decluttered and revitalised. Madam Juliana expressed her heartfelt gratitude, adding that the improvements would enable

her to eventually right-size her flat and achieve financial independence.

These partnerships with community stakeholders reflect our commitment to helping beneficiaries beyond monetary aid, offering holistic solutions to improve their quality of life.

Creating Joyful Moments for Families

At SCS, we also bring joy to our beneficiaries through meaningful experiences. We would like to thank Ms Atiqah and her team for hosting a memorable family engagement day. Beneficiaries were treated to a delightful afternoon featuring a sumptuous lunch, live music performances, and an uplifting atmosphere.

Additionally, with the support of Guardant Health AMEA, we hosted a family engagement day at Gardens by the Bay, followed by a lunch at Peppermint @ Park Royal Hotel. These events offered a much-needed respite for our beneficiaries and their families, fostering a sense of community and togetherness.



Hospice Care Services

For patients in the advanced stages of cancer, SCS's Hospice Care Services offer support to ensure comfort, dignity, and peace. In 2024, the Home Hospice team **cared for 542 patients, enabling 175 individuals to fulfil their wish of passing away at home**, surrounded by loved ones.

Patients receive holistic care from a dedicated multidisciplinary team of doctors, nurses, social workers, counsellors, physiotherapists, and occupational therapists who address their physical, emotional, and spiritual needs. This bespoke care ensures that each patient's journey is met with kindness and understanding. Families are equipped with training in medical equipment use and symptom management, so they can provide home-based care with confidence and competence.

Supporting Adolescents and Young Adults (AYAs)

The SCS Home Hospice Care team has seen a significant increase in the number of adolescents and young adults (AYAs) with advanced cancer under our care, with this group **doubling in size over the past two years**. However, existing models of care often do not fully address the unique needs of this group which are tied to their age and life stage.

To address this critical gap, SCS is collaborating with the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS) Adolescent and Young Adult Oncology (AYAO) support group and palliative care teams through Project SAYANG to coordinate services and develop a dedicated model of care for younger cancer patients aged 16 to 45. We are also training our staff to better understand and respond to the distinct needs of younger patients, who require a different approach than older patients.

By bridging service gaps, we are committed to providing holistic and tailored care in this emerging area of need.

Home-Based Respite Care Programme

The Home-Based Respite Care (HBRC) programme enables families to care for their loved ones at home with dignity and comfort in their final days. In collaboration with community agencies, the programme provides trained caregivers to support terminal care. Designed for terminally ill patients with a life expectancy of twelve months or less, it offers between 15 and 30 days of caregiving assistance. In 2024, we successfully enrolled 26 patients into the HBRC programme.

Stories of Love and Courage

Every hospice journey tells a unique story of love and courage. From families striving to find peace to individuals living with purpose during their last days, these experiences create a rich fabric of compassion and connection. The heartfelt words of gratitude from families and caregivers prove that even in life's most challenging chapters, dignity and hope shine brightly.

The SCS team's frequent visits provided comfort and reassurance not only to our dear mother but also to all of us who were navigating the challenges of palliative care with heavy hearts each day. We are immensely grateful for everything you did to make her final days as comfortable and peaceful as possible. Your kindness and support will always be remembered fondly by our family.

✦ RALLYING THE COMMUNITY

At SCS, we believe the fight against cancer is a collective journey. In 2024, we fostered greater community action through initiatives, events, and partnerships that showcased the power of unity in inspiring hope and driving change. From individuals organising fundraising activities to corporates mobilising teams to run in our flagship events, every effort strengthened our shared belief: that no one fights cancer alone.

Relay For Life

In 2024, SCS's flagship event—the Singapore Cancer Society – TalkMed Relay For Life—**raised over \$1.71 million**, the highest fundraising milestone in its history. These funds supported crucial programmes, including the SCS Cancer Care Fund, Cancer Treatment Fund, and Welfare Aid Fund, benefitting thousands affected by cancer.

Held from 20 to 21 April at the 100PLUS Promenade, the 100-km challenge brought together **over 9,000 individuals**, including cancer patients, survivors, caregivers, and volunteers. Graced by SCS Patron President Tharman Shanmugaratnam, the event showcased solidarity and resilience.

We are also grateful to Speaker of Parliament, Mr Seah Kian Peng, Member of Parliament for Marsiling–Yew Tee GRC, Hany Soh, and, Minister of State for Health and Minister of State for Communications and Information, Mdm Rahayu Mahzam, for showing their support.

Participants ran the relay overnight to bring light and hope to those affected by cancer, highlighting the strength found in community and affirming that no challenge is insurmountable together.



Race Against Cancer

The 16th Singtel – Singapore Cancer Society Race Against Cancer (RAC) in 2024 marked a historic milestone with **over 7,000 participants**, the largest turnout since its inception. Held on 29 September at Angsana Green, East Coast Park, the event celebrated SCS's 60th Anniversary with new features, including a 2km Parent–Child Fun Run that attracted over 250 parent–child duos, creating moments of connection and purpose. Participants also received a

specialty commissioned completion medal by Singaporean artist tobyato.

More than 5,000 individuals joined the race in person, supported by 194 volunteers, 100 SCS staff, and 121 beneficiaries. Together, they helped raise \$1.36 million, fuelling SCS's vital cancer care and support programmes.



Mini Relay For Life

Mini Relay For Life (RFL) events continue to inspire a new wave of youth-led advocacy, giving students an opportunity to contribute to the cancer cause. In 2024, schools such as Xin Min Secondary School, Raffles Girls' School, Raffles Institution, Hwa Chong Institution, Methodist Girls' School, Fuchun Secondary School, School of Science and Technology, and Ngee Ann Secondary School joined the initiative, showing a significant growth in youth participation.

A standout event was the Raffles Institution Interact Club's Mini RFL, held on 13 January at Bishan Community Club. For the first time, the student organisers welcomed public participation, broadening its reach and impact. Supported by the SCS, Bishan Youth Network, and Rotary Club sponsors, the event brought together approximately 180 participants.

Guest of Honour Minister Chee Hong Tat joined attendees in exploring interactive cancer awareness booths, enjoying student-led performances, and writing personal messages of hope on Luminaria bags. A highlight was an interactive sharing session with a stage-four prostate cancer patient, who shared his inspiring story of resilience. The event also featured videos of patient and survivor experiences, creating a deeper connection to the cause.

Mini RFLs foster a sense of responsibility and action among youth. With each event, more young leaders step forward, sparking change and creating impact within their communities.



Mini Relay For Life

Youth For Causes

The YMCA Youth For Causes (YFC) initiative continues to ignite passion and foster social entrepreneurship among young changemakers. This programme empowers teams with seed funding to implement innovative ideas that drive community impact.

In 2024, SCS proudly **partnered with 15 YFC teams**, whose efforts spanned concerts, arts and craft workshops, school bazaars, and more. Together, these youth-led initiatives **raised \$100,517 for SCS**—proof that small actions can spark big changes.

Among this year's winning teams was Project Lavande from CHIJ St Nicholas Girls' School, which raised \$24,179

through a series of activities, including Étoile, a fundraising concert graced by Minister of Health, Mr Ong Ye Kung. Team Turmeric, a homeschool-led group, raised \$31,643 through Concert Spero, an enchanting string ensemble performance themed around hope. Guest of Honour Dr Choo Bok Ai applauded their dedication and vision, highlighting their impactful efforts in uniting audiences for a meaningful cause. Beyond The Ribbon, representing NPS International School, hosted a creative art workshop that raised \$700, using art as a medium to connect and inspire.

At the YFC 2024 Awards Celebration, SCS was honoured with the "Most Supportive SSA Award," affirming our commitment to empowering the next generation of changemakers.

★ AMBASSADORS OF CHANGE

In 2024, SCS Charity Ambassadors spearheaded creative fundraising efforts to rally the community against cancer. Notable initiatives included pledge donations tied to The Last Gold: James Wong—An Odyssey Through Sports and Cancer, a limited-edition book detailing Mr Wong's battle against cancer, drawing from lessons and strengths gained from his 25 years as a competitive athlete. Mr Wong

is Singapore's 10-time SEA Games Gold Medallist and a survivor of stage-two bile duct cancer.

Mr Wong's campaigns raised significant funds while spotlighting the resilience of the cancer community. By sharing his personal journey, he demonstrated the transformative power of influence and advocacy.



Community Fundraisers

Cycle for Hope

For the third year running, the Singapore Cycling Federation (SCF) united the community through Cycle for Hope, raising over \$70,000 to support SCS programmes and services. In 2024, SCF invited members of SCS support groups and their caregivers to participate in the launch day ride, creating a meaningful blend of physical engagement and emotional solidarity.



Great Eastern Women's Run

SCS was among two beneficiaries of the 18th Great Eastern Women's Run (GEWR), held on 27 October at the Singapore Sports Hub. This year's event attracted over 12,000 participants—the largest turnout since the pandemic—and raised a record \$388,000, shared equally between the two charities.

A highlight was the participation of 10 cancer survivors and staff in the 5km walk. Among them, 50-year-old Aparna Suri, shared her inspiring cancer journey and gratitude for SCS's support:

Padel for Cancer

On 23 November, Asia Padel and The Padel Co hosted the inaugural Padel for Cancer Tournament, bringing together 35 teams, and raising over \$50,000 for SCS's programmes and services. Teams engaged in peer-to-peer fundraising efforts, demonstrating the potential of community action. Plans are in motion to make this an annual event, sustaining vital support for SCS's mission.



November

SCS's renewed partnership with global men's health movement Movember continued to break new ground in the fight against cancer, empowering men to lead healthier, happier, and longer lives. This collaboration raised over \$308,000 in 2024 for the SCS Prostate Cancer Survivorship Programme in Singapore, fuelling advancements in men's health initiatives. As part of the campaign, multinational company Rio Tinto contributed \$11,355 to SCS and partnered on a Prostate Cancer Awareness Talk for their Singapore office.



CELEBRATING OUR VOLUNTEERS AND PARTNERS

Every achievement at SCS is powered by dedicated volunteers and partners whose contributions inspire hope and shape lives. In 2024, SCS's work was fuelled by volunteers and partners whose collaborative spirit shone through acts like delivering care packages and cleaning patients' homes, creating a community of care that brought comfort, joy, and the promise of brighter days.



Festive Cheer with a Heart

Our Festive Cheer with a Heart initiative spreads joy and comfort to cancer patients by delivering thoughtfully curated goodie bags throughout the year.

This initiative thrives on the generosity of partners like AIG Asia Pacific Insurance, Coca Cola Singapore, Wacker

Chemicals (S.A) Pte Ltd, Publicis Groupe, Detmold Group, and our Council member Mr Kenny Rebeira, along with the members of the Church of St Vincent de Paul. Beyond monetary donations, volunteers personally pack and deliver goodie bags to patients' homes, turning deliveries into meaningful gestures of care.



Sweet Home Project

The Sweet Home Project engaged corporate partners like Heng Li Petrochemical, whose employees created warm, welcoming spaces for cancer patients. Over two days, volunteers painted walls, rearranged furniture, and added thoughtful touches to transform homes into spaces of comfort and care. Their efforts helped improve living conditions, offering beneficiaries refreshed homes and a renewed sense of hope.



Creating Connections

In November, SCS's long-time corporate partner Temasek T-Touch joined beneficiaries from the Help the Children and Youth Programme (HCYP) for a magical day at Universal Studios Singapore. The school holiday outing was filled with laughter, excitement, and meaningful moments shared between families and volunteers.

Guardant Health also partnered with SCS for an excursion to Gardens by the Bay, where volunteers and beneficiaries shared moments of joy and reflection. The outing created new-found friendships through a day of connection and joy.



DRIVING CANCER RESEARCH

Every year, SCS allocates significant resources to fund, develop and support local innovative cancer research that aims to improve the quality of treatment and quality of life for anyone impacted by cancer. Through the SCS Cancer Research Grant, in-house research, and partnerships such as Terry Fox Foundation, SCS seeks to further its thought leadership.

SCS Cancer Research Grant

Through the provision of SCS annual Cancer Research Grant, SCS encourages and supports local cancer research initiatives aligned to our mission. Since 2006, we have funded 62 cancer research projects.

Impact of the SCS Cancer Research Grant

Over the years, SCS has supported research that drives innovation and improves patient outcomes. We invited our past awardees—whose projects were successfully completed in 2024—to share how the SCS Cancer Research Grant has advanced initiatives benefiting the cancer community.

Our team thanks SCS for its kind support during the past several years. We set out with an ambitious plan to harness digital therapeutics, a new form of intervention for patients, and we could not have achieved this without the generous encouragement from SCS. During the term of this work, we developed and ultimately took this platform to interventional human trials. Our work has been presented at the highest levels of clinical sharing including the ASCO Annual Meeting, all the way to policy-level forums. On behalf of our team of engineers, clinicians, broader clinical stakeholders, and implementation experts, we are grateful for the privilege of working with our patient and caregiver communities to pursue unprecedented levels of translation at our Institute.

The SCS Cancer Research Grant provided critical support for our research on the supportive care needs of patients with breast cancer undergoing neoadjuvant chemotherapy, particularly young women and older adults. This funding enabled us to survey women with breast cancer undergoing intensive cancer therapies and conduct in-depth qualitative interviews which offered invaluable insights into their unique physical, emotional and psychosocial challenges. We were able to showcase the strength of our neoadjuvant program especially in addressing areas such as fertility preservation, genetic predisposition and state of the art oncological surgeries. We identified unmet needs in younger patients, specifically in sexual health, and evaluated the attitudes of older patients towards their life goals which will inform the development of tailored interventions to enhance supportive care services.

The SCS Cancer Research Grant was instrumental in the development of the Quality of Care for Patients with Advanced Illnesses (QCPAI) scale, a reliable and culturally adaptable tool to measure end-of-life care quality. This support enabled us to address critical gaps in evaluating patient-centred outcomes, paving the way for improvements in care delivery for advanced cancer patients.

Transforming Cancer Care and Improve Quality of Life of Cancer Survivors

Research Title Return to Work in Breast Cancer Patients Following an Interdisciplinary Rehabilitation Program in a Community-Based Cancer Rehabilitation Center: A Pilot Study

Publication *Healthcare* 2024; 12(7): 805.

Research findings This study at SCS Cancer Rehabilitation Center investigated the effectiveness of their Return-to-Work programme for breast cancer survivors. Patients participated in an interdisciplinary vocational rehabilitation program delivered by psychiatrists, occupational therapists, physiotherapists and social workers.

Out of the 63 breast cancer patients studied, most were under 60 years old. The programme helped more than half (59%) of the participants successfully return to work, primarily in white-collar positions. Of those who returned, 27% did so within 6 months, while others took up to two years.

The research revealed three key factors that influenced whether patients could return to work:

- Having advanced-stage cancer made it harder to return
- Experiencing significant fatigue was a major barrier
- Patients who believed in their ability to work were more likely to succeed

These findings highlight the key role of cancer rehabilitation in supporting breast cancer survivors to resume their careers.

Research Title Impact of an Asian Community-Based Cancer Rehabilitation Program on Health-Related Quality of Life

Publication *Healthcare* 2024;12(22):2251.

Research findings Cancer survivors often face challenges that affect their quality of life after treatment. While hospital-based rehabilitation programmes have shown benefits, little is known about the effectiveness of community-based cancer rehabilitation programmes in Asia.

This study examined 197 cancer patients who participated in SCS's cancer rehabilitation programme. Most participants (61%) had breast cancer, while 39% had other types of cancer. The programme was led by physicians and included physiotherapists, occupational therapists, nutritionists, and exercise physiologists.

Key findings:

- After 3-6 months of rehabilitation, patients showed lower levels of distress and improved quality of life
- Patient age and number of exercise therapy sessions attended were linked to better quality of life

These findings demonstrate that community-based cancer rehabilitation programmes can effectively improve quality of life for cancer patients.

SCS In-house Research

SCS's in-house research team has completed and published three studies across two areas: Cancer screening and prevention and improving quality of life of cancer survivors.

Deepen the Understanding of Cancer Screening and Prevention

Research Title Exploring Factors Influencing Cervical Cancer Screening Participation among Singaporean Women: A Social Ecological Approach

Publication *Cancers (Basel)*. 2024;16(20):3475.

Research findings Cervical cancer poses a major public health concern in Singapore, but it can be effectively prevented through screening. Unfortunately, many Singaporean women have never been screened. This research examined factors influencing participation in cervical cancer screening in Singapore.

The study surveyed 665 women aged 25-69 years who were aware of cancer screening and had no personal cancer history. The findings revealed that only 30% of participants had undergone cervical cancer screening.

Several groups were less likely to get screened:

- Young women aged 25-29 years
- Malay women
- Unmarried women

The study identified four factors that made women more likely to get screened:

- Good knowledge about cervical cancer screening
- Awareness that primary care providers offer screening services
- Active seeking of cancer-related information
- Willingness to use self-sampling options

These findings show that multiple factors influence screening participation and suggest that Singapore needs more targeted strategies to improve cervical cancer screening rates among different groups of women.

Partnership with Movember and Terry Fox Foundation

Movember

Movember is an international organisation focused on men's health issues, particularly prostate and testicular cancer. In 2024, we were honoured to renew our partnership with Movember, advancing our joint initiatives in cancer awareness, early detection and screening, health education and resource development, and cancer research support. Through this collaboration, we work to improve access to cancer prevention, early detection, and treatment services for men in Singapore.

Terry Fox Foundation

Through our longstanding partnership with the Terry Fox Foundation (TFF) and Terry Fox Research Institute (TFRI), SCS has managed and channeled the funds raised to support local cancer research projects through the Terry Fox Grant call. As part of our collaboration, SCS participated as a reviewer to the TFF international review panel, supporting the project review and evaluation processes.

◆ PEOPLE FIRST: ELEVATING THE EMPLOYEE EXPERIENCE

At the heart of the SCS mission to “minimise cancer and maximise lives” is a commitment to our most valuable asset—our people. Guided by our People First Strategy, we strive to foster an environment where employees feel supported, valued, and inspired in their journey to make a difference.

Prioritising Wellbeing

Recognising the challenges inherent in our work, SCS prioritises the holistic wellbeing of our employees through a range of thoughtfully designed initiatives. Mental health support services provide accessible and professional resources to assist employees in navigating challenges and maintaining emotional resilience. Annual health screenings are offered to promote proactive health management and underscore the importance of prioritising physical wellness.


In 2024, we celebrated our team with a month-long Employee Appreciation Programme, which featured activities such as Massage Day, indulgent Sweet Treats, and invigorating walk-and-run sessions, fostering both relaxation and camaraderie. Empowering Growth

Investing in the growth and development of our employees remains central to SCS’s ethos. In 2024, we dedicated over 2,000 hours to learning and development programmes that were designed to equip our workforce with the skills and knowledge required to navigate the evolving landscape of cancer care.

Beyond structured training, regular town halls and team engagement sessions were integral in ensuring employees remained informed, connected, and aligned with the organisation’s mission. This emphasis on growth not only enhances individual potential but also strengthens our collective ability to drive meaningful impact.



✦ BUILDING READINESS IN ESG



In April 2023, the Charity Council issued a revised Code of Governance which recommends that charities conduct their activities with Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) factors in mind and communicate these activities to stakeholders.

To ensure ongoing accountability, SCS set up an ESG task force in November 2023 to coordinate our ESG efforts, align them with the organisation's strategic plans and operations, as well as stay abreast of governance guidelines.

SCS is committed to keeping our activities environmentally friendly and sustainable; to maintaining and further cultivating strong connections with our stakeholders and upholding the highest governance standards. We do this through our key focus areas of Cancer Control and Prevention, Cancer Care and Support, and Rallying the Community in the fight against cancer.

Environmental Sustainability



Environmental sustainability is a cornerstone of our ESG efforts. SCS plays our part in reducing our carbon footprint through careful use of resources and a concerted reduction in overall consumption. We use energy-efficient technologies such as auto on-off light sensors and green-rated equipment. As SCS resides within the NCCS building, we collaborate with NCCS and leverage NCCS's GreenGov.SG initiatives. One way is through electricity conservation by maintaining indoor temperatures at 25 degrees Celsius or higher through the NCCS central air-conditioning system.



SCS has reduced paper usage by digitising event materials, such as providing electronic Notices, documents, and reports during the Annual General Meeting. Our flagship events and programmes also encourage paperless online registration.



In addition, we aim to reduce collateral wastage for our key events, the Singapore Cancer Society - TalkMed Relay For Life and the Singtel - Singapore Cancer Society Race Against Cancer, by allowing participants to opt out of collecting a race pack or t-shirt. We discourage the use of plastics by asking participants to bring personal water bottles, complemented by providing environmentally friendly paper cups.

Social Impact

Cancer Control and Prevention Community Health

SCS continues to expand public education outreach and enhance cancer awareness. Throughout the year, we launched a series of cancer awareness campaigns, each a beacon of hope meant to enhance the community's knowledge on the types of cancers and encourage the public to go for relevant screenings. This forms part of our strategy to minimise the occurrence of cancer.

SCS has partnered with government agencies like People's Association (PA), Community Development Councils (CDCs), Active Aging Centres (AACs) and Muis, MENDAKI and MESRA (M3), as well as hospitals and social service organisations like Ain Society as part of our public engagement.

We believe early detection is key to combating cancer. This drives our commitment to prevention efforts, equipping Singaporeans with the tools and knowledge to safeguard their health and highlighting the benefits of regular cancer screening for early detection and improved survival rates.

We are heartened to share that, following engagements with SCS, an average of 95% of participants expressed intentions to either participate in cancer screening and/or recommend it to their social networks.



Cancer Care and Support Cancer Rehabilitation Services

SCS strives to ensure our beneficiaries experience improved quality of life through our services, aiming to maximise lives.

95% of our Cancer Rehabilitation Services patients reported that they are happy with the services received, with 80% expressing increased confidence in applying self-management strategies at home due to SCS's rehabilitation services.

SCS Financial Care Services

SCS strives to help Singaporeans and Permanent Residents from low- and middle-income families by providing a range of welfare and financial assistance. We understand that medical expenses can be a heavy burden, so we aim to alleviate those costs at every stage of treatment. SCS's assistance includes providing milk, diapers, medical dressing, stoma bags, and other medical equipment.

90% of our beneficiaries feel less financially burdened and anxious due to the financial assistance provided, enabling them to cope better with the support from SCS.



“The diagnosis of kidney cancer was frightening enough, but the financial stress added another layer of difficulty. Thankfully, SCS stepped in, providing a treatment subsidy under the Cancer Treatment Fund, which is an essential support that eased my burden immensely. Psychosocial Support Services

SCS's Psychosocial Support Services provides counselling, therapeutic interventions and various support for our patients, their families, and caregivers. 94% of beneficiaries attributed SCS for making a positive difference in them and/or their families' situation.

Hospice Care Services

The SCS Hospice Care Services team strives to render quality and dignified care to all our patients, including their families, in the last lap of their cancer journey. A multi-disciplinary team of nurses, doctors, social workers, counsellors, physiotherapists, and occupational therapists provide quality and holistic clinical care for terminal stage cancer patients who have chosen to remain at home in the final stages of their lives.

According to SCS's Survey for Families of Palliative Care Patients (Bereaved), 100% of beneficiaries reported that the Hospice Team provided comfort and dignity to the patient at the end of life. Additionally, 99% stated that the clinical team offered emotional support to both the patient and their caregiver.



Mr Tan Hok Nai, diagnosed with advanced cancer in June 2024, passed away peacefully at home in October 2024, cared for by his daughter, Ai Yen. Honouring Mr Tan's wish to remain at home, Ai Yen managed his high care needs with support from a migrant domestic worker and night home-based respite carers. The SCS Home Hospice team prepared Ai Yen well for potential challenges like managing massive bleeding as Mr Tan was experiencing intermittent bleeding through his tracheostomy tube. The Home Hospice team also helped Ai Yen recognise the signs of deterioration and the terminal phase, which allowed her to notify family members in time to visit Mr Tan during his final days. Ai Yen expressed gratitude for the team's support in fulfilling her father's final wishes.

Rallying the Community

Community Partnership

Our flagship events, Singapore Cancer Society - TalkMed Relay for Life (RFL) and SingTel - Singapore Cancer Society Race Against Cancer (RAC) aim to rally communities together in the fight against cancer.

The RFL 2024 event saw more than 9,000 participants, comprising cancer patients, survivors, caregivers, volunteers and members of the public, with over \$1.71 million raised in support of SCS programmes and services.

2024 marked the 16th year of the RAC, with over 7000 participants, over 194 volunteers, 100 SCS staff and over 121 SCS beneficiaries joining our festivities. The RAC 2024 raised over \$1.36 million for our programmes and beneficiaries.

Both events demonstrate the unwavering public support for the cancer community and indicate the increasing support by the community towards our common fight against cancer.

Governance Excellence

SCS strives to constantly maintain and strengthen its Governance Structures and Internal Controls through periodic reviews and updates of policies and processes, ensuring alignment with best governance practices.

SCS' commitment to high standards in governance and transparency is evidenced by our attainment of the coveted **2023 Charity Governance Award** and the **Charity Transparency Awards** for four years, between 2019 and 2024.

SCS ensures board diversity within the SCS Council, drawing expertise from areas such as healthcare, finance, IT, legal, and governance to provide effective oversight and strategic direction. Council members have clear Terms of Reference and undergo onboarding, with regular reviews to ensure effectiveness. Additionally, the rotation of Council members supports proper board renewal and succession planning, in line with the Code of Governance for Charities and IPCs.

SCS ensures transparency, accountability, and reporting by maintaining open communication with stakeholders and providing regular, comprehensive updates on our financials, governance, and activities through platforms such as our website, social media channels, and Donor Impact Reports.



✦ CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

Operating Principles & Governance Policies

Singapore Cancer Society (“SCS” or “the Society”) adheres to the principles and guidelines of the Code of Governance for Charities and Institutions of a Public Character (April 2023) (“Code of Governance”), the Charities Act, and Regulations as governed by the Commissioner of Charities. For the year in review, we continued our firm commitment to the governance and sustainability of the Society’s mission.

Governance: The Council & Management

The Society is governed by a Council comprising twelve (12) elected members and up to four (4) co-opted members, all of whom serve as volunteers with no business affiliations with SCS. They are nominated by the SCS Nominations Committee in a formal and transparent process, based on the strength of their personal and professional calibre to contribute to the strategic oversight of the Society. They are elected at the Annual General Meeting (AGM) based on their knowledge, skills, expertise, experience, and ability to contribute to the Society’s development. Following the AGM, the newly formed Council elects the office-bearers from among its members for a one-year term. Council members will hold office for a term of two years, subject to a maximum total term of ten (10) consecutive years. They can be re-elected after a lapse of not less than two (2) years.

No individual may hold the office of Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, or Assistant Secretary for more than ten (10) consecutive years. However, they may be reappointed to the same role after a minimum interval of two (2) years. Similarly, no individual may hold the office of Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer for more than four (4) consecutive years, with eligibility for reappointment to the same role after a two (2) year break. The Council’s Terms of Reference are outlined in the constitution.

The Council and Management of SCS are deeply committed to upholding good corporate governance, recognising its importance in ensuring the sustainability of the Society’s mission to support the cancer community. Together, they are responsible for ensuring compliance with the Code of Governance, as well as all relevant laws and regulations. Individual Council members complete a self-evaluation annually to evaluate competencies in specialised fields which may be of benefit to SCS. This is submitted to the Nominations Committee and Council Chairman to review the results. The consolidated submissions are then shared with the entire Council for peer consideration.

Council Roles and Composition

The Role of Council Members include:

- Define the mission and steer the organisation towards achieving it.
- Guide and ensure effective strategic organisational planning.
- Determine, monitor, and strengthen the organisation’s programmes and services.
- Ensure adequate financial and human resources (Resource Mobilisation).

Committees are established to support the Council in overseeing key areas of accountability, including Governance, Advisory & Resource, Administrative & Events, Campaigns, and Support Groups. Each Committee operates under Terms of Reference (TOR) approved by the Council, and Council members participate in these Committees to provide oversight.

Committee members are carefully selected to bring a diverse range of expertise, ensure equitable responsibility, and contribute specialised knowledge to decision-making in their respective areas. All Committees maintain records of their proceedings, and copies of any resolutions passed, whether at meetings or by written resolution, are shared with the Council.

All cases reported will be objectively investigated and appropriate follow-up action will be taken accordingly. Depending on the nature of the concern raised or information provided, the investigation will be conducted, involving one or more of the following individuals or entities:

- The Audit Committee
- The External Auditor, and/or
- The Police or Commercial Affairs Department

When the investigation is completed, the investigating officer(s) will report the findings to the Audit Committee for its necessary action.

Conflict of Interest Policy

Members of the Council and employees are required in their respective capacities to act at all times in the best interest of the Society. All Council members and employees of SCS are required to read and understand the conflict of interest policy in place and make full disclosure of any interests, relationships, and holdings that could potentially result in a conflict of interest. All Council members are required to declare **any actual or perceived** conflict of interest to the Society at the start of the term, **and annually**, or as soon as such conflict, or the possibility of such conflict arises. All employees are required to declare **any actual or perceived** conflict of interest at the point of hire and annually. When a conflict of interest situation arises, the member/employee shall abstain from participating in the discussion, decision-making and voting on the matter.

Reserves Management

Singapore Cancer Society maintains a reserves policy of more than one time its annual operating budget to meet operational requirements. Operating reserves exclude all building/project funds, endowment, and sinking funds. As of 31 December 2024, the reserve ratio is 2.65. Reserves are invested in Singapore dollar fixed deposits and bonds with banks/financial institutions. All investments are reviewed and approved by the Council.

Fundraising Practices

Singapore Cancer Society is committed to ensuring that our fundraising practices are ethical and conducted with honesty and transparency at all times, in accordance with the Fundraising Guidelines recommended by the Commissioner of Charities. We promote a high level of accountability, ensuring that funds raised are used for the specific programmes and services communicated to donors. Various communication platforms and channels are available for donors to provide feedback to our Society. We also uphold the highest standards to protect donors’ information and confidentiality through stringent processes and compliance with Singapore’s Personal Data Protection Act.

Audit and Legal

Internal Auditor, BDO Advisory Pte Ltd, works closely with the Audit Committee and the Management to systematically assess the internal controls of the Society. Reviews are conducted regularly based on agreed upon scope. Processes are reviewed on rotational basis across the years. SCS statutory auditors are RSM SG Assurance LLP, and legal support is provided by RHTLaw Asia LLP.

Disclosure and Transparency

The Council Members adhere to regular evaluation of its performance and effectiveness and ensure compliance with requirements in the Code of Governance. The Society makes available to its stakeholders an annual report that includes information on its corporate governance, programmes, activities, services, audited financial statements, Council members and Management. The annual report is also published online via the Society’s website.

For the financial year, Council Members did not receive any remuneration in their capacity as members of the Council. No employee is involved in setting their own remuneration, and no employee serves as Council member. The remuneration of the three highest paid employees is disclosed in the bands of \$100,000 as follows.

Public Image

The Society shares information about its programmes, events, and activities through various platforms, including its website, social media, newsletters, marketing brochures, and other materials. Enterprise Risk Management

As part of our risk management process, Singapore Cancer Society reviews and updates the risk register periodically. Process owners review their processes, assess the adequacy of controls, and implement mitigating controls where applicable. Key risks are discussed in Management meetings for awareness, with updates provided to the Council.

Personal Data Protection Act

The PDPA establishes a data protection law comprising rules governing the collection, use, disclosure, and care of personal data. SCS recognises individuals' rights to protect their personal data, including rights of access and correction. SCS has implemented policies and processes to ensure compliance, maintaining data integrity. All employees are required to undergo PDPA training, and additional security measures have been adopted to prevent unauthorised access, collection, use, disclosure, copying, modification, or disposal of personal data.

Remuneration of Council Members

There are no claims by Council members for services provided to the Society, whether through reimbursement, allowance, or direct payment to a third party. In accordance with the Code of Governance, the Council members, or people connected with them, do not have any transactions, relationships, or can significantly influence or is significantly influenced by another party. There is no paid staff, being a close member of the family belonging to the Executive Head or a governing board member of the charity, who has received remuneration exceeding \$50,000 during the financial year.


