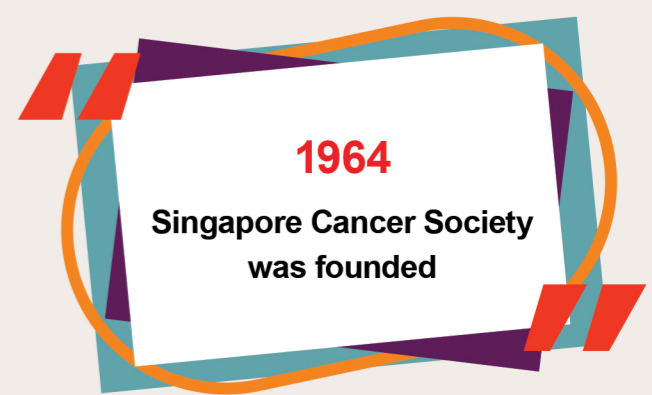

CHAIRMAN AND CEO MESSAGE

2019 has been a significant year for the Singapore Cancer Society (SCS) as we commemorate 55 years of impacting lives. Since we began in 1964, over 100,000 individuals annually have benefited from our outreach and support. SCS strives to minimise cancer and maximise lives through a holistic care system, which is built on effective programmes and services.

SCS supports cancer patients and their families, especially financially challenged individuals, through cancer treatment subsidies, financial and welfare aid, hospice home care services, rehabilitation programmes and support groups for cancer survivors, and much more. We will continue to contribute in four main thrusts to: Reduce the incidence of cancer; Increase survival rates; Improve the quality of life; and Rally the community to take proactive action in the collective fight against cancer.

To mark SCS' 55th anniversary, several new initiatives were launched to serve the cancer community.

Intensifying our public education and cancer prevention efforts, SCS stepped up to raise even greater awareness about the cause in Singapore and highlight our efforts globally, through coordination and championing of several initiatives with various healthcare institutions, government institutions, schools, corporate partners, and social media influencers for 2019.

As part of our efforts to reduce cancer incidence and improve cancer care, SCS partnered the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS) to provide Singaporeans greater access to integrated cancer care. This key collaboration is the upstream prevention effort championed by both parties through a dedicated Cancer Genetics Service Screening Programme that will benefit all Singaporeans, with more support for the financially needy. To strengthen the seamless integrated care to the community, SCS will be co-locating with NCCS at the new NCCS building by 2022. In addition, this partnership will also provide a continuum of cancer care beyond treatment that is

accessible, affordable and of quality. A dedicated cancer rehabilitation centre is planned to be developed to provide a one-stop holistic care plan for cancer patients at NCCS, supported by a multi-disciplinary team that includes oncologists, surgeons, rehabilitation physicians, allied health professionals and psychosocial support staff.

SCS also partnered the National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS), to intensify screening efforts. Faecal Immunochemical Test (FIT) kit distribution has been integrated into their community health programmes throughout the year.

SCS also rolled out Human Papillomavirus (HPV) testing at no cost to all Singaporean/ PR women aged 30 to 69, an initiative aimed to promote early cancer detection and increase survival rates. This is expected to benefit over 1.5 million individuals.

The digitisation movement is quickly changing the healthcare landscape. SCS has leveraged on technology to meet the rising demand of cancer care in Singapore. With cancer incidence on the rise, SCS understands the need for providing timely care services to the cancer community. A chatbot by OneConnect has been developed to identify the common questions and answers relating to cancer and SCS. Based on SCS historical call records and knowledge and expertise on cancer matters provided by NCCS, patients will have easier and greater access to medical care. SCS will continue to explore opportunities to ride the technology wave and intensify our fight against cancer.

Cancer diagnosis can impose a tremendous financial burden on patients and families. Every year, SCS needs to raise at least \$20 million to drive programmes and services and create new initiatives to continue improving the lives of the cancer community. SCS cannot do it on our own. Many partners and volunteers are needed

as SCS strives to ensure holistic support is rendered to help patients cope during their cancer journey.

SCS and AstraZeneca inked a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to further strengthen efforts to jointly improve the quality of life for people impacted by cancer through public education, awareness campaigns, and funding of welfare programmes. Our new initiatives bolster our existing programmes and services in serving the cancer community. Our fight against cancer is also about helping cancer patients achieve a new state of normalcy, in spite of the disease. We strive to bridge service gaps and smooth the path towards life after cancer.

SCS also released a web film series on cancer. Created and produced by veteran filmmaker Daniel Yun, the 5-episode film series "I Do" is a love story that interweaves real-life trials and triumphs in the cancer journey through interviews with our cancer survivors.

As such, it is with a clear sense of these responsibilities that the Society seeks your support. In solidarity with our beneficiaries, we would also like to express our gratitude to you – our supporters, donors, partners, volunteers, Council members, management, and staff – for your contributions. Our work cannot bear fruit without your generosity.

On behalf of SCS and our beneficiaries, we extend our heartfelt appreciation to all those who were part of our achievements and milestones over the past 55 years. The continued and generous support of all our partners, donors, and volunteers has led to what the Society has become today. Community support is extremely crucial to SCS in expanding and strengthening the outreach in the collective fight against cancer. Our strength in numbers is testament that no one fights cancer alone.

Mr Albert Ching has been the Chief Executive Officer of the Singapore Cancer Society (SCS) since September 2012. He led the Society in setting up the SCS Multi-Service Centre at Bishan in 2013 to be close to the heartlands; and the SCS Cancer Rehabilitation Centre, Singapore's first one-stop community-based cancer rehabilitative services (opened at Jem in September 2015). He played a pivotal role in leading the Society to establish new partnerships to better serve the cancer community at large across key areas of cancer upstream prevention and screening, community care and patient support, rehabilitation and cancer survivorship. Under his leadership SCS also clinched the coveted Charity Transparency Award 2019. Before joining SCS, he was the Executive Director and General Secretary of the YMCA of Singapore for over 7 years, and was elected as President in 2019. Prior to YMCA, he served as Executive Director at The Boys' Brigade in Singapore.

OUR PEOPLE MATTER

Our employees are our most valued resource and we rely on them to deliver programmes and services that positively impact the lives of our beneficiaries. SCS values fair employment practices and strongly believes in workforce diversity. We have a multi-generational and multi-ethnic workforce. SCS is committed to building a conducive work environment that celebrates the success of our employees. To lead as an example of a cancer-friendly workplace, SCS has about 15 staff who are cancer survivors.

The Staff Action for Recreation (StAR) Committee organised a wide range of activities in 2019 to foster better relations and esprit de corps amongst SCS employees. These include fitness classes to cultivate a healthy lifestyle and volunteering activities such as beach cleaning.

The highlight of the year was undoubtedly the Hawaiian themed Dinner & Dance held at Raffles Town Club where SCS staff came dressed up in Aloha style.

HEALTHY LIFESTYLE

As an advocate in the fight against cancer, SCS encourages our employees to lead a healthy lifestyle to reduce the risks of cancer. In 2019, we joined the National Steps Challenge organised by Health Promotion Board (HPB). SCS staff were divided into 5 different groups in the spirit of healthy competition to see which could be more physically active. This resulted in an increase in employees partaking in exercise, going out for walks and jogs together. SCS was given a certificate of recognition for our efforts through the HPB Health Award.



In 2019, we organised our first ever SCS Sports Day. Over 90 employees participated in this fun-filled day. This proved to be a good workout session for everyone and encouraged each member of the team staff to keep active.

WORKPLACE

To promote an inclusive workplace – one that is built on merit and progressive HR practices, SCS has adopted the Tripartite Guidelines on Fair Employment Practices. We ensure that candidates are hired based on their merit, regardless of age, race, gender, religion, marital status and family responsibilities. We believe that maximising the abilities and potential of employees will unlock untapped capabilities.

In November 2019, we launched the first SCS Star Employee awards. The nominees, voted by their fellow colleagues, embody the 5 core values of SCS and are exemplary staff who have made a difference in the organisation. This gave SCS the opportunity to express our utmost appreciation for our employees and the invaluable contributions they have made.



CORPORATE GOVERNANCE



SCS received the Charity Transparency Award 2019 and was shortlisted for the Charity Governance Award. These Charity Council awards respectively recognise charities that have excellent disclosure practices in line with the Charity Transparency Framework and adopt the highest standards of governance.

OPERATING PRINCIPLES & GOVERNANCE POLICIES

The Society adheres to the principles and guidelines of the Code of Governance for Charities and Institutions of a Public Character (Revised 2017) ("Code of Governance"), the Charities Act, and regulations as governed by the Charity Council. For the year in review, we continued our firm commitment to the governance and sustainability of the Society's mission.

GOVERNANCE: THE COUNCIL & MANAGEMENT

The Society is governed by a Council of up to 12 elected members and 4 co-opted members, all of whom are volunteers with no business relations with SCS. They are appointed, at the Annual General Meeting (AGM), on the strength of their knowledge, skills, expertise, experience and ability to contribute to the development of the Society. Immediately after the AGM, the new Council will elect among themselves the office-bearers for a one-year period. They hold office as Council members for a term of two years. They are nominated by the SCS Nomination Committee in a formal and transparent process, on the strength of their personal and professional calibre to contribute to the strategic oversight of the Society. The Council and Management of SCS firmly believe that a genuine commitment to good corporate governance is essential to the sustainability of the Society's mission to support the cancer community, and are collectively responsible in ensuring compliance with the Code of Governance and all relevant laws and regulations.



COUNCIL ROLES & COMPOSITION

The Council Members' Roles:

- Determine the mission and steer organisation towards it
- Guide and ensure effective strategic organisational planning
- Determine, monitor and strengthen the organisation's programmes and services
- Ensure adequate financial and human resources (Resource Mobilisation)

There are Committees that support the Council in overseeing key areas of accountability, comprising Governance, Advisory & Resource, Administrative & Events, Campaigns and Support Groups. All Committees have Terms of Reference that are approved by the Council. Council members also sit in the Committees to provide oversight. Members of the Committees are carefully selected to ensure diverse expertise, equitable responsibilities, and expert contributions to decision-making in respective management areas. All Committees maintain records of all proceedings, and copies of resolutions passed by such committees, be it at meetings or by resolutions in writing, are provided to the Council.

All cases reported will be objectively investigated and appropriate follow-up action will be taken accordingly. Depending on the nature of the concern raised or information provided, the investigation will be conducted, involving one or more of the following individuals or entities:

- The Audit Committee
- The External Auditor, and/or
- The Police or Commercial Affairs Department

When the investigation is completed, the investigating officer(s) will report the findings to the Audit Committee for its necessary action.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY

Members of the Council and employees are required in their respective capacities to act at all times in the best interest of the society. All Council members and employees of SCS are required to read and understand the conflict of interest policy in place and make full disclosure of any interests, relationships, and holdings that could potentially result in a conflict of interest. All Council members are required to declare conflict of interest to the Society at the start of the term, annually, or as soon as such conflict or the possibility of such conflict arises. All employees are required to declare conflict of interest at the point of hire and annually. When a conflict of interest situation arises, the member/employee shall abstain from participating in the discussion, decision-making and voting on the matter.

RESERVES MANAGEMENT

SCS has a reserves policy of at least two times its annual operating budget to meet its operational requirements. Operating reserves exclude all building/project funds, endowment, and sinking funds. The reserve ratio as at 31 December 2019 is 2.47. Reserves are invested in Singapore dollars fixed deposits and bonds, with banks. Investments are reviewed and approved by the Council.

FUNDRAISING PRACTICES

SCS is committed to ensure that our fundraising practices are ethical and conducted in the most honest and transparent manner at all times in line with the Fundraising Guidelines by the Charity Council. We promote a high level of accountability for the funds raised to be used for the specific programmes and services communicated to donors. Different communication platforms and channels are set up for donors to provide feedback to our Society. We also uphold the highest standards to protect donors' information and confidentiality through stringent processes and compliance with the Personal Data Protection Act of Singapore.

AUDIT AND LEGAL

Internal Auditor, Baker Tilly TFW, works closely with the Audit Committee and the Management to systematically assess the internal controls of the Society. Reviews are conducted regularly based on agreed upon scope. Processes are reviewed on rotational basis across the years. SCS statutory auditors are RSM Chio Lim LLP, and legal support is provided by RHTLaw Taylor Wessing LLP.

DISCLOSURE AND TRANSPARENCY

The Council members adhere to regular evaluation of its performance and effectiveness, and ensures compliance with requirements in the Code of Governance. The Society makes available to its stakeholders an annual report that includes information on its corporate governance, programmes, activities, services, audited financial statements, Council members and Management. The annual report is also published online via the Society's website. For the financial year, Council members did not receive any remuneration in their capacity as members of the Council. The remuneration of the three highest paid employees is disclosed in the bands of \$100,000 as follows.

PUBLIC IMAGE

The Society publishes information relating to its programmes, events and activities through various platforms that include its website, social media, newsletters, marketing brochures and other collaterals. A summary of the media coverage on the Society is incorporated into the monthly report that is submitted to the Management and Council.

ENTERPRISE RISK MANAGEMENT

As part of its risk management process, the Society reviews and updates the Management, Council and the risk register periodically. Process owners review their processes, assess the adequacy of controls and put in place mitigating controls where applicable. Key risks will be discussed in Management meetings as part of awareness and updates provided to the Council.

PERSONAL DATA PROTECTION ACT (PDPA)

The PDPA establishes a data protection law that comprises various rules governing the collection, use, disclosure and care of personal data. SCS recognises the rights of individuals to protect their personal data, including rights of access and correction. SCS has implemented policies and processes reviewed to ensure compliance and data integrity is not compromised. All employees are required to undergo PDPA training and additional security arrangements have been adopted to prevent unauthorised access, collection, use, disclosure, copying, modification or disposal of personal data.

IMPACT FRAMEWORK

The impact framework was implemented in 2017 to steer SCS into becoming a more outcome oriented organisation, measuring the differences we have made to everyone impacted or possibly impacted by cancer (i.e. beneficiaries, caregivers, public, high-risk individuals who have genetic predisposition to cancer, etc). Keeping that in mind, new strategies and partnerships that are aligned to the 4 main goals of SCS to reduce cancer incidence, increase survival rate, improve quality of life and rally greater community action were developed and forged.

Partnerships were established with two key cancer hospitals in Singapore – The National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS) and National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS) to better serve the cancer community at large across key areas in terms of cancer prevention and cancer screening, community care and patient support, rehabilitation and cancer survivorship.

In 2018, SCS embarked on the SCS Fight Cancer Programme @ North West with North West CDC. This is a 3-year collaboration to fight cancer via a 3As plan – Awareness, Action, Advocacy – mainly to empower and engage the community through cancer education forums, health screenings, health living activities and develop a Cancer Caregivers Network within the North West District. SCS reached out to over 6,500 people through Faecal Immunochemical Test Kit distribution, the Community Mammobus Programme, health talks and workshops.

REMUNERATION OF COUNCIL MEMBERS AND RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

There is no claim by the Council members for services provided to the Society, either by reimbursing them or by providing them with an allowance or by direct payment to a third party. In accordance with the Code of Governance, the Council members, or people connected with them, do not have any transactions, relationships, or can significantly influence or is significantly influenced by another party.

COUNCIL MEETING ATTENDANCE RECORD

EARLY DETECTION OF CANCER

The data below shows that screening tests such as the Faecal Immunochemical Test (FIT), Papanicolaou Test (Pap Test) and Mammogram effectively help early detection of cancer. With that, SCS will continue to intensify its outreach programme to the public to increase screening take-up rate.

PROMOTION OF HEALTHIER LIFESTYLE AND REGULAR SCREENING

In 2019, we reached out to 4,656 attendees in 60 public education talks (excluding schools). With the newfound knowledge in areas of screening, nutrition and cancer prevention talks, 4 in 5 attendees (78.5%) pledged to do more exercise for a healthier lifestyle, more than half (61.6%) of the attendees indicated that they will now go for regular screening and 3 in 8 attendees cited that they will not smoke or will quit smoking.

Among attendeesⁿ who had not gone for a cancer screening before, more than half of them (52.7%) cited that they are now motivated to go for regular screening and exercise (78.3%).

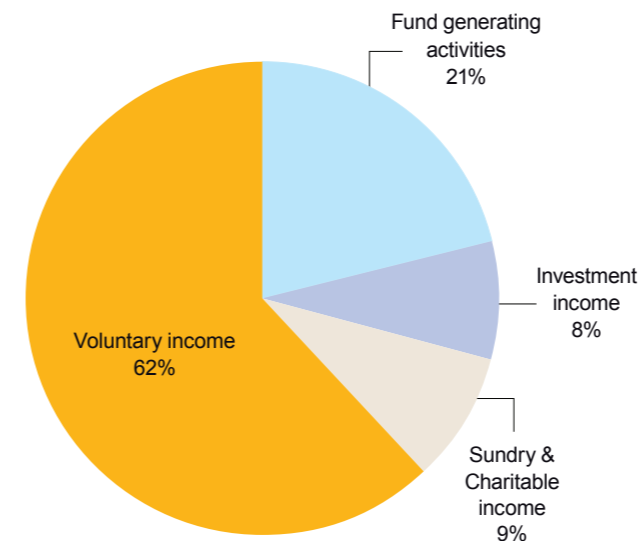

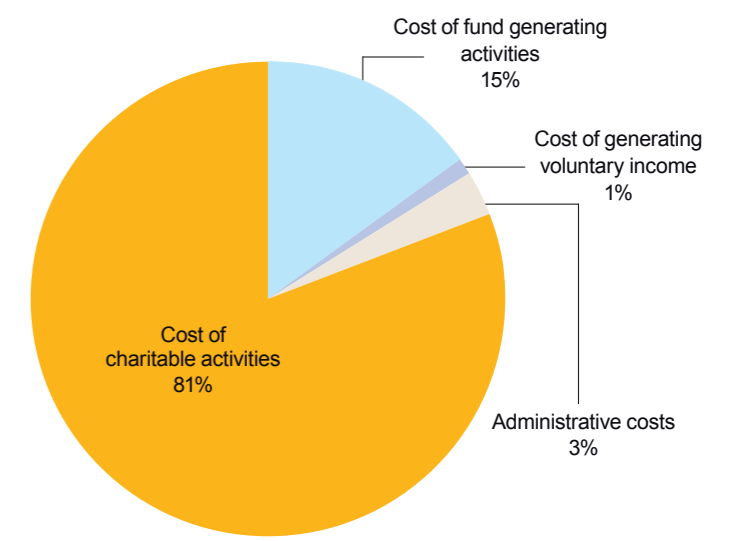

Cancer does not discriminate and it can happen to anyone at any time. SCS is dedicated to MINIMISE CANCER AND MAXIMISE LIVES through various effective and impactful programmes in Singapore. SCS works towards equipping everyone with the knowledge and know-how to adopt a healthy lifestyle to reduce the risk of cancer through various upstream cancer prevention programmes and public education awareness & outreach activities.



SCS CANCER AWARENESS CAMPAIGNS

According to the World Health Organisation, between 30-50% of all cancer cases are preventable by decreasing exposure to risk factors and encouraging healthy lifestyles, while early diagnosis increases the chance of successful treatment. To achieve the above, education & awareness and cancer screening programmes play a critical role. Cancer is a battle we can win through early detection. At SCS, we dedicate our efforts in developing awareness programmes, and providing easy access to screenings for the community.

SCS COLORECTAL CANCER AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

Colorectal cancer is the top cancer diagnosed in Singapore – No.1 in men and No.2 in women among those aged 50 and above.¹ However, only about 2 in 5 individuals (36.7%) aged 50 to 69 years undergo colorectal cancer screening at the recommended frequency.² More can be done to encourage individuals to take charge of their health by screening regularly and learning to recognise the signs and symptoms of colorectal cancer. Chances of contracting colorectal cancer does not differ between men and women. In Singapore, it accounts for 17% of cancers in males and 13% in females.¹ Rather, the increasing incidence of colorectal cancer may be attributed to lifestyle-related risk factors such as lack of exercise, sedentary lifestyle, obesity, smoking and high alcohol consumption.

The Society organises the Colorectal Cancer Awareness Campaign every year in March and August to raise awareness of colorectal cancer among the general public.

SCS continues to distribute the Faecal Immunochemical Test (FIT) kits at no charge to Singaporeans and Permanent Residents (PRs) aged 50 years and above, to encourage them to go for regular screenings and follow-ups. SCS also successfully organised a talk at Khoo Teck Puat Hospital attended by 311 participants.

Colorectal cancer is preventable via regular screening such as the FIT test or colonoscopy. When signs of pre-cancer or cancer growths are detected in the early stages, the chances of recovery and survival are much higher.

SCS WOMEN'S GYNAECOLOGICAL CANCER AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

This campaign sets out to raise awareness on cervical, ovarian and uterine cancers – three gynaecological cancers that are among the top 10 affecting Singaporean women today – with a focus on early detection of cervical cancer through Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccination, Pap test and HPV test.



In a move to strengthen cervical cancer screening, Ministry of Health (MOH) announced the launch of the free HPV vaccination programme for Secondary 1 girls. Along with this announcement, MOH also introduced a new and more sophisticated cervical cancer screening test – HPV test to detect the presence of the Human Papillomavirus, for women aged 30 and above. Women aged 25 to 29 are recommended to continue their regular Pap test.

To support the initiative and to provide a more accurate test to the ladies, SCS introduced the HPV test as part of its cervical cancer screening available at no cost to eligible females since August 2019.

On 8 June, SCS organised a women's gynaecological cancer awareness event at Toa Payoh Hub to raise awareness of the three cancers, and to encourage more women to come forward for cervical cancer screening. The event featured fun and interactive activities such as a zumba session, and booths where ladies were educated on the importance of prevention and control in tackling gynaecological cancers. There was also an informative talk on gynaecological cancers by Associate Professor Timothy Lim, Head and Senior Consultant at Department of Gynaecological Oncology at KK Women's and Children's Hospital, and Dr Cindy Pang, Consultant Obstetrician & Gynaecologist at Singapore O&G Ltd.

HPV EDUCATION AND IMMUNISATION PROGRAMME

SCS rolled out the HPV Education & Immunisation Programme (HEIP) aimed at educating students on the importance of HPV vaccination and increasing their knowledge of cervical cancer.

Since the launch of HEIP in October 2018, SCS has been taking an upstream prevention approach to encourage girls who are between the ages of 9 to 18 years old to get their HPV vaccination done at no cost. This pilot project focuses largely on low income families who are holding on to a valid Community Health Assist Scheme (CHAS) card to encourage families to have their children get their vaccination done early to prevent cervical cancer. Through the programme, we have vaccinated over 50 girls.

In 2019, SCS successfully organised **34** HPV and cervical cancer education talks to **over 13,000 students**. Adding on, SCS also organised HPV education talks to parents of the secondary school girls conducted by the specialists.

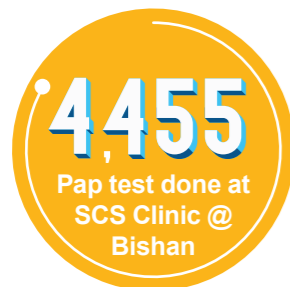
With the implementation of the school-based vaccination programme, SCS has been working closely with the Health Promotion Board (HPB) and the Ministry of Health (MOH) to educate students about HPV, the benefits of HPV vaccination and cervical cancer prevention.

SCS ran a 5-day roadshow at Singapore University of Technology and Design (SUTD) of which 1 day was an on-site HPV vaccination. During the roadshow, various activities were done to engage and educate the students about HPV, the benefits of HPV vaccination and cervical cancer prevention. More than 55 students of both genders were vaccinated.

SCS GASTRIC CANCER AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

In Singapore, gastric cancer is the 7th most commonly diagnosed cancer in men, and the 9th most commonly diagnosed cancer in women¹. This year, in conjunction with the Gastric Cancer Awareness Campaign, SCS organised 3 initiatives: a public forum, a talk, and a Fruits Day programme.

The **Gastric Cancer Public Forum** took place on 14 September at the Toa Payoh Hub Auditorium. Participants learned from specialists about the symptoms, treatment options and diet recommendations relating to gastric cancer. A panel of doctors delivered the talks in English to 300 participants in the morning, and in Mandarin to 320 participants in the afternoon.

The topics covered were:

- **Early Signs and Symptoms of Gastric Cancer** by Associate Professor Andrew Wong, Chief and Senior Consultant for the Department of Surgery, Changi General Hospital, and Professor Jimmy So, Head of the Division of Surgical Oncology, National University Cancer Institute, Singapore, and Senior Consultant, National University Hospital
- **Latest Treatment Options for Gastric Cancer** by Dr Chee Cheng Ean, Senior Consultant for the Department of Haematology-Oncology, National University Institute, Singapore, and Dr Yong Wei Peng, Senior Consultant, Department of Haematology-Oncology, National University Cancer Institute, Singapore

The doctors' presentations were followed by a nutrition talk by Mr Ernest Wong, Senior Dietitian, Nutrition and Dietetics Department, Tan Tock Seng Hospital, and a survivor sharing session by Ms Tan Hai Sing.

The **Fruits Day** programme aimed to promote healthy diet practices by emphasising the importance of increasing one's intake of fruits. 6 outreach sessions took place during school talks and other events.

Another community **Gastric Cancer talk**, aimed at reaching out to the residents in the heartlands, took place on 3 August at the SCS Cancer Rehabilitation Centre. 87 participants attended the event, which was presented by Dr June Lee, Consultant for the Department of Surgery, Changi General Hospital.

SCS LUNG AND PROSTATE CANCER AWARENESS CAMPAIGNS

Lung and prostate cancers are among the top 10 cancers affecting Singaporeans. Lung cancer is the 2nd and 3rd most common cancer diagnosed in Singaporean men and women respectively. Prostate cancer is the 3rd most common cancer diagnosed among men in Singapore.



This year, SCS developed a Chinese version of the Prostate Specific-Antigen (PSA) Decision Tool to educate and help readers decide whether they should get tested for prostate cancer. To address the common misconceptions, SCS produced an educational video titled 'Debunking the Myths of Prostate Cancer'.

On 23 November, SCS organised a Lung and Prostate Cancer public forum that saw more than 500 participants who came to learn more about the two types of cancer.

In partnership with 42Race and in conjunction with Lung Cancer Awareness Month 2019, SCS organised the 2nd Happy Lungs Virtual Run event to encourage a healthy and smoke-free lifestyle. A total of 4,434 people participated in the virtual run, choosing from 3, 5 or 10km options. The event was held over the month of November.

SCS SMOKE-FREE CAMPAIGN OUTREACH TO PRE-SCHOOLERS

BREAK THE HABIT OR BREAK MY HEART



The campaign is a joint community initiative by creative agency Ogilvy and SCS by reaching out to pre-schoolers. They will bring home the "Break the Habit or Break my Heart" stickers to seal the cigarette pack of their loved ones.

To open the pack, the label will be torn which will symbolise a broken heart. The aim is to remind smokers of how their action will impact their loved ones and to encourage them to stay smoke-free.

SCS has reached out to 80 pre-schoolers across 7 schools. The programme targets children from Nursery 2 to K2, aged 4 to 6 years old.

YOUTH ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMMES

SCS strives to expand its youth engagement to reach out to more students from various institutions like Nanyang Technological University and LASALLE College of the Arts to raise awareness of cancers in Singapore as part of their final year projects.

SCS also conduct assembly talks in secondary schools to share with the students about the harmful effects of smoking, HPV vaccination & Cervical cancer and ways to lead a healthy lifestyle.

UNIFORM GROUP: GIRL GUIDES SMOKE-FREE AMBASSADOR PROGRAMME

Jointly organised by SCS and Girl Guides Singapore (GGS), the programme aims to educate and raise awareness on the harms of smoking through peer influence by the guides who participated in our programme. The programme provides a platform for the guides to exercise their creativity by embarking on a 6-month long project to reach out to their fellow peers about what they have learnt and aim to build a smoke-free society.



SCS INTER-POLYTECHNIC COMPETITION



The finals of the Singapore Cancer Society Interschool Competition took place in January 2019. The event was officiated by Guest of Honour, Mr Amrin Amin, Senior Parliamentary Secretary, Ministry of Home Affairs & Ministry of Health.

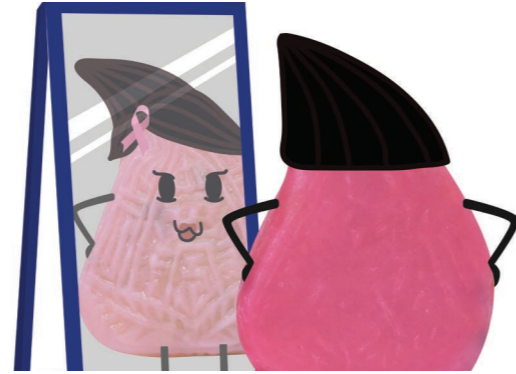
The competition was held to provide an opportunity for youths to be empowered with the knowledge to take charge and be a positive influence to their peers to stay smoke-free. We had over 200 students from five different schools – ITE College West, Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts, Ngee Ann Polytechnic, Nanyang Polytechnic and Republic Polytechnic. The students presented their creative ideas on anti-smoking campaign to a panel of judges.

Congratulations to the team from Republic Polytechnic for winning the Outstanding Award for their proposed campaign "No Cigarette No Regret".

SCS BREAST CANCER AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

Breast Cancer is the Number 1 cancer, (in terms of both cancer diagnosis and cancer mortality) affecting Singaporean women. Therefore it remains a key priority at SCS for women to be aware of breast cancer and take active steps to do regular breast checks such as mammogram and self-examinations.

This year, our “Inkuehtable Heroine”, Auntie Sue, taught ladies to recognise breast changes, instructed them how to do breast self-checks and impressed upon them the importance of going for mammogram screenings. As part of the campaign to raise awareness about Breast Cancer, we have reached out to more than 1,000 participants through our public forums, talks and activities.



In view that only 2 out of 5¹ Singaporean women aged 50 to 69 have gone for their regular mammogram screening, SCS continues to advocate for regular mammogram screening at SCS Clinic @ Bishan, through the Community Mammobus Programme, BCAM \$25 Funding Assistance and FIT50 programme.

WORLD CANCER DAY

In an annual global campaign, the Union for International Cancer Control invites members and cancer organisations all over the world to support World Cancer Day.

On 4 February, SCS gathered the public to show support to the cancer community. Over 30 healthcare institutions, government bodies, schools, corporate partners and social media influencers came together to make a Pledge of Commitment to raise greater awareness of cancer. Singapore was the only city in the world to have 5 buildings light up in support of World Cancer Day 2019.

A special video comprising shoutouts from the public using the campaign tagline ‘I Am and I Will’ was released via social media to officially mark World Cancer Day.



WORLD HEALTH DAY

SCS organised a World Health Day & Colorectal Cancer Carnival on 13 April at Toa Payoh Hub to raise cancer awareness, the screening services that SCS provides at no cost, as well as other common health issues faced by Singaporeans today. More than 900 people attended the event.



KNOW CANCER TO BEAT CANCER

The Know Cancer to Beat Cancer (KCBC) initiative was launched to debunk myths, fight fake news and equip the public with accurate information about cancer.

Public are invited to submit questions on the microsite. A team of volunteer doctors and healthcare professionals would study the questions and provide appropriate answers with fact-checked supporting sources.

More than 4,000 unique users visited the website since the launch in 2019.

“I DO” WEB SERIES

SCS collaborated with Parkway Cancer Centre (PCC) to release the “I Do” web series on Valentine’s Day at School of the Arts Singapore (SOTA) to normalise the stigma of cancer, and depict that no one needs to fight against cancer alone.

The 5-part web series highlights personal trials and triumphs of cancer patients and survivors interwoven in a love story.

The web series garnered over 200,000 views on Facebook and Youtube.

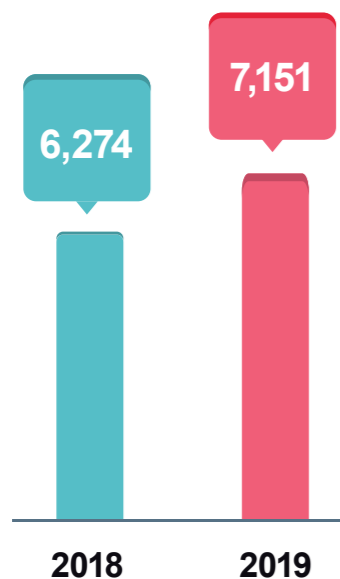


SCS SCREENING SERVICES AND PROGRAMMES

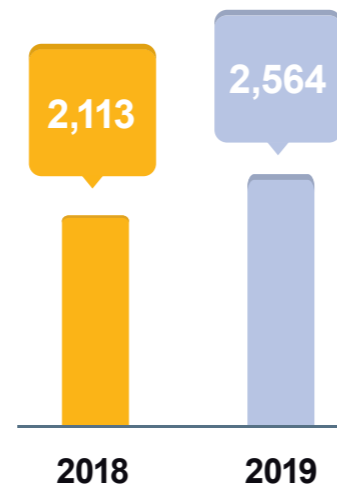
SCS CLINIC @ BISHAN

Screening is effective in the prevention and early detection of cancers such as breast cancer, cervical cancer, and colorectal cancer. SCS provides Mammogram, Cervical Cancer Screening (Pap test/HPV test) and Faecal Immunochemical Test (FIT) at the SCS Clinic @ Bishan, without charge, throughout the year. In comparison to 2018, there has been an increase in the number of screening participants at the clinic for cervical cancer and breast cancer screening.

SCS FIT50

The SCS FIT50 programme is an initiative to encourage Singaporeans who turn 50 years old to stay 'FIT' by undergoing regular health screenings for the three commonly diagnosed cancers affecting Singaporeans—breast, colon and cervical cancers. SCS defrays all remaining screening charges after prevailing government subsidies. Since 2014, more than 42,000 cancer screenings have been performed under this programme.

CANCER RESEARCH AND DATA ANALYSIS

Through outcomes and findings from research done in-house and external collaborations, the team strives to seek insights that would improve SCS programmes and services and drive strategic directions of the organisation.

SCS IN-HOUSE RESEARCH STUDIES

Research Title: Survey on the Knowledge, Perception and Attitudes on Human Papillomavirus (HPV) and Cervical Cancer

RESEARCH OBJECTIVE

A cross-sectional online survey conducted in a purposive population sampling of 1,000 Singaporean women aged 18 to 60 years to evaluate the knowledge, perception and attitudes of Singaporean women on HPV, HPV vaccination and cervical cancer.

KEY OUTCOMES

Lack of awareness was identified as one of the prominent barriers of HPV vaccination. Weak causal association between HPV and related cancers was observed – 46% and 53% for cervical cancer and other related cancers respectively. Hence, education efforts need to focus on the knowledge deficits identified, to raise public awareness through various outreach programmes from schools and communities, as well as cancer awareness campaigns. Education efforts should also be extended to other key influencers (i.e. parents and health professionals), so as to achieve the ultimate goal of increased uptake of vaccination & screening.

Another key barrier to HPV vaccination identified was the high cost of the vaccine – cited by 65% of young women aged 18 to 26 who refused to get vaccinated even with more information provided to them. The finding suggested that financial assistance would help improve the HPV vaccine uptake among young adult women. This may complement the current National Immunisation Programme further in reducing HPV prevalence and incidence in cervical cancer in Singapore.

Results from this survey were shared with SCS to drive a new programme on cervical cancer prevention for young women.

RESEARCH PARTNERS

TERRY FOX FOUNDATION & TERRY FOX RESEARCH INSTITUTE

The Terry Fox Foundation (TFF) establishes and manages fundraising through its international Terry Fox Run programme for innovative cancer research, with the Terry Fox Research Institute (TFRI) and SCS providing oversight for cancer research and support. In 2018, SCS took on a more involved role in research by having a reviewer from SCS join the TFF international review panel to partake in the process of proposal review, interview and evaluation. In 2019, an MOU in relation to the tripartite relationship in cancer research between TFF, TFRI and SCS was signed, with more support cited to be provided to SCS cancer research studies.



MOVEMBER FOUNDATION

The Movember Foundation is the only charity tackling men's health on a global scale, all year round. They aim to address some of the biggest health issues faced by men: prostate cancer, testicular cancer, and mental health and suicide prevention. SCS has partnered Movember on various survivorship projects since 2012 and now strives to collaborate with them on the IRONMAN project, which aims to create an international population-based, prospective registry of at least 5,000 men with advanced prostate cancer. The study of the data collected will develop a better understanding of patients' unmet needs in their treatment and improve survival outcomes.

NATIONAL CANCER CENTRE SINGAPORE

Research has shown that hereditary cancer syndromes account for approximately 5-10% of all cancers, conferring high cancer risks and posing a significant health burden. While there are various outreach programmes to educate the community on environmental risk factors, little has been done for the group with genetic risk factors.

As such, SCS collaborated with the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS) to develop the NCCS-SCS Cancer Genetics Service Screening Programme, which helps identify individuals (and first-degree family members) with increased risk for cancer earlier in life and allow the implementation of individualised risk management. Funding assistance for financially challenged and at-risk individuals is provided.

The goal of regular surveillance and financial assistance is to enable high-risk individuals to detect cancer at an earlier stage for better outcomes and to reduce the cancer burden for them and their family members.



Cancer has affected the lives of too many families. My team and I at the National Cancer Centre hope to vanquish this enemy through our continual efforts to improve care outcomes, boost education and invest in cutting-edge research to find new cures for Singaporeans who have been diagnosed with cancer.

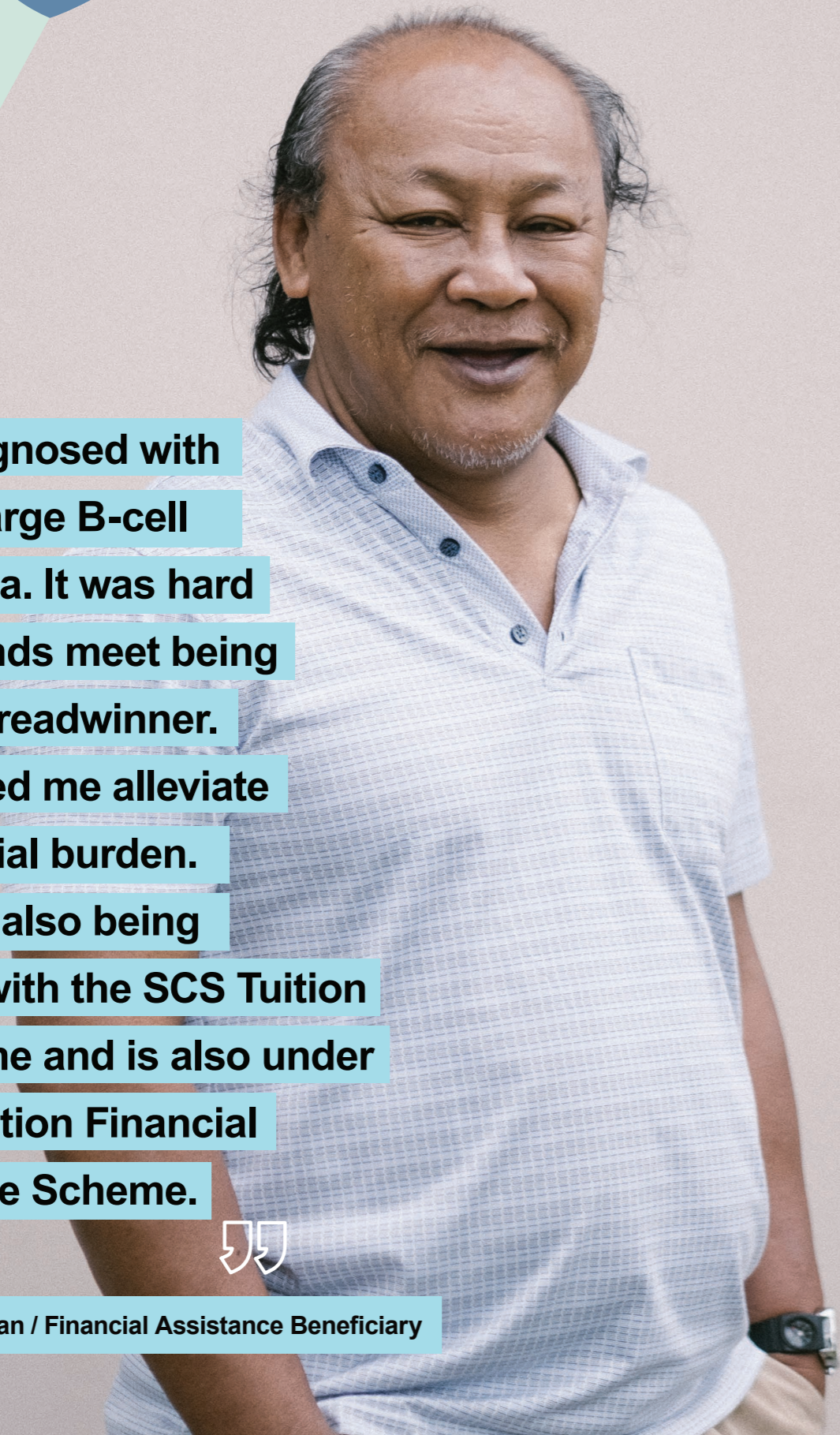

When cancer is diagnosed, it impacts all areas of life. SCS provides holistic care and support to help patients, caregivers, and family members cope in their cancer journey. SCS strives to SERVE MORE AND SERVE BETTER.



CANCER SUPPORT SERVICES

Cancer takes its toll on patients and their families from the moment they are diagnosed till end of life. This is why SCS' support services have various programmes specifically targeted at cancer survivors, new patients and their families to help them reduce stigma, promote communication and cope with life-changing consequences of cancer.

SCS SUPPORT GROUPS

An essential part of coping lies in finding a support system, the ability to talk and exchange with individuals who understand the emotions linked with coming to grasp with the illness or adjusting to new life situations. SCS support groups offer these platforms to support cancer patients and survivors across all 5 pillars.

SCS SEMI-COLONS SUPPORT GROUP

This support group helps newly treated colorectal cancer patients adjust to a new quality of life. Through the support of peers, the professional advice of volunteer nurses and stoma therapists, and the talks and presentations on health-related subjects such as nutrition and exercise, patients gain confidence and are guided to independence in the care of their stomas.

SCS REACH TO RECOVERY

This is a breast cancer support group aimed at helping women cope with life challenges. Breast cancer survivors volunteer their time to provide a listening ear and share their experiences in order to help other women achieve a full recovery – cosmetically, physically, emotionally, spiritually and psychologically.

SCS NEW VOICE CLUB

The New Voice Club brings together patients who have lost their voice completely following the removal of their vocal cords due to laryngeal cancer. The club teaches patients how to speak again, with or without speech devices, and emotionally support new patients and their families in coping with a 'new voice' after surgery – an essential step in regaining the ability to communicate with others.

SCS WALNUT WARRIORS

This group helps men diagnosed with prostate cancer enhance their well-being through therapeutic and enrichment programmes. Through sharing personal experiences and exchanging insights into coping with the condition, as well as recreational workshops, social events and enrichment learning sessions, members feel supported in transitioning to their new lives.

SCS BISHANA LADIES SUPPORT GROUP

Bishana invites female survivors and cancer-diagnosed women to monthly meetings, educational talks/workshops, social and recreational activities, outings, and enrichment programmes. This support group provides a platform for these women to share their experiences and interact with each other to find psychological support and emotional solace, and learn how to cope with the changes brought about by this illness.

PSYCHOSOCIAL SERVICES

Social workers, counsellors and therapists help patients cope with the fear and strong emotions that may result from diagnosis and treatment by bridging patients, caregivers and family members to pertinent information, financial resources and therapeutic groups. Each year, SCS empowers its teams with new skills to enhance capabilities and effectively manage beneficiaries' needs.

CASEWORK & COUNSELLING

Our team of social workers and counsellors seek to help individuals and families cope with the impact of cancer, loss, and bereavement, as well as to facilitate discussion on decision-making, care plans and survivorship goals among family members and healthcare providers.

ART THERAPY PROGRAMME

This programme aims to facilitate emotional well-being through art, which provides an alternative form of self-expression when words are inadequate. Using images and symbols becomes a powerful tool for participants to tell their stories and express their emotions (e.g. pain, desires, sense of loss, self-image).



SCS ENRICHMENT PROGRAMMES

SCS enrichment programmes provide SCS Support Group Members, Caregivers, and Volunteer-Trainers, multilateral opportunities to bond and share talents and pursuits.



SCS LOOK GOOD FEEL BETTER PROGRAMME

The Look Good Feel Better (LGFB) programme helps female cancer patients cope with the effects of treatments, such as hair loss and skin discolouration, by helping them improve their appearance and regain their self-esteem through hands-on workshops teaching make-up techniques or how to wear wigs, hats and scarves.



SCS CANCER REHABILITATION SERVICES

Into its fourth year of operations, the SCS Cancer Rehabilitation Centre (CRC) located at Jem Office Tower saw exponential growth in the number of clients served. Dietician and speech therapy services were introduced, along with various updates of rehabilitation programmes to better address cancer-related impairments, thereby increasing the centre's capacity to serve more clients.



Usually, I am an optimistic person. But hearing about my stage 1 breast cancer was devastating. The staff at the CRC are very efficient and engaging. HIGHLIGHTS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

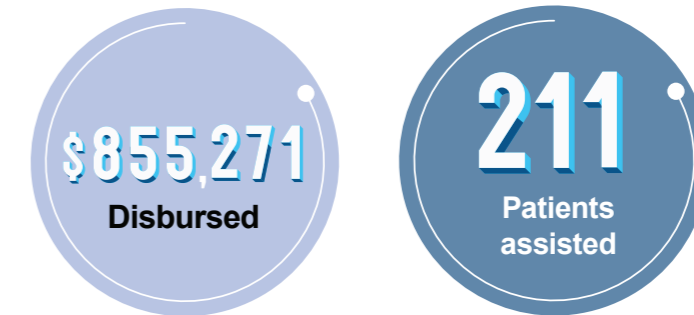
- Client referrals and admission continue to increase in 2019.
- The Ministry of Health (MOH) granted SCS **Subvention for Cancer Rehabilitation Services**. In conjunction with the MOH subvention, a fee structure was introduced in November which includes high subsidies for cancer patients plus additional financial assistance for very needy cases.
- **CARE NAVIGATION** commenced in May 2019. To date, the team has provided care plans to 77 clients, resulting in 97 referrals for rehabilitation service, psychosocial support, welfare assistance and external services such as financial assistance and support groups from hospitals. Care navigation has also been introduced in the care pathway for breast cancer patients at the National University Cancer Institute, Singapore since mid-September, with plans to extend to the care pathway for colorectal cancer.
- **NUTRITION FORWARD SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP** was formed to empower a group of cancer survivors receiving dietetic care to develop confidence and skill in nutritional cooking.
- **FATIGUE MANAGEMENT**, a new occupational therapy programme was introduced. This helps clients identify their fatigue and develop lifestyle changes and strategies to overcome or cope with their tiredness, so that their quality of life can be improved.
- SCS collaborated with Sport Singapore for patients to flow seamlessly from the hospital to continued care in the community. 81 clients were discharged from rehabilitation programmes and transited to three designated ActiveSG gyms to continue an active lifestyle after completing SCS cancer rehabilitation programmes. Results show that almost 40% of these clients continued to exercise very regularly and another 25% visited the gym between 1 to 4 times a month.
- A booklet and a series of accompanying videos were developed to help clients continue to exercise at home using resistance bands.
- SCS piloted a therapeutic closed-group work, **L.I.G.H.T GROUPWORK** for 7 advanced stage cancer patients over 4 sessions between November to December 2019. The groupwork adapted elements from Satir Transformation Systems Therapy and the Eastern Body-Mind-Spirit approach, with aims to address the above concerns and to build social support between participants.



FINANCIAL CARE SERVICES

SCS provides a range of financial assistance and support to Singaporeans and PRs from low and middle-income families to alleviate the costs of treatment at every stage and provisions of milk, diapers, medical dressing, stoma bags and other medical equipment. More than \$3.28 million in aid was disbursed in 2019 through the following funds.

SCS CANCER TREATMENT FUND



The SCS Cancer Treatment Fund was established in 2005 to provide cancer treatment subsidies to patients experiencing financial difficulties. Patients are referred by their doctors or medical social workers from various restructured hospitals.

Since its inception, \$17,693,580 in aid was disbursed, and 5,266 patients assisted.

Partnering key players in the pharmaceutical industry, SCS has been able to give patients access to critical medicine through the Patient Access Programme (PAP):

SCS-Takeda PAP on Adcetris (Brentuximab)

SCS-Merck PAP on Erbitux (Cetuximab)

SCS-Novartis PAP on Jakavi (Ruxolitinib), Tassigna (Nilotinib), Zykadia (Ceritinib), Afinitor (Everolimus)

SCS-MSD Enhanced PAP on Keytruda (Pembrolizumab) 200mg per treatment cycles applies only after 1st tier funding on KeytrudaPAP at restructured hospitals

SCS-Roche PAP on Herceptin (Trastuzumab) and Avastin (Bevacizumab)



SCS WELFARE AID FUND

The Welfare Aid Fund was established in 1964 to aid cancer patients and their families with temporary financial aid and sustenance during and after treatment to mitigate the financial strain which may arise from unemployment, loss of income, and hefty treatment costs. This fund was later extended with the inclusion of provisions such as milk, diapers, medical supplies, stoma bags and other medical equipment to patients. Welfare aid funding is accessed through medical social workers and healthcare professionals at various hospitals, hospices, and voluntary welfare organisations.



SCS CANCER CARE FUND

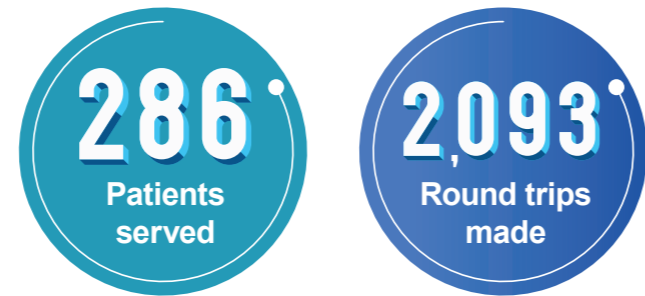
The SCS Cancer Care Fund is a one-time financial assistance scheme that aims to provide for the immediate needs of patients from low and middle-income families within the first 6 months of diagnosis. Since its inception in 2015, more than \$4,503,450 has been disbursed to 4,982 cancer patients.



SCS HOME-HOSPITAL TRANSPORTATION SERVICE

SCS provides home-hospital transportation to and from all restructured hospitals for patients from low-income families who have medical appointments or radiotherapy/chemotherapy sessions.

The Society also provides hospital transportation via private ambulances to beneficiaries who are wheelchair-bound or have mobility difficulties.



SUPPORTING CHILDREN AND YOUTH

The cancer journey can be especially challenging for children and youths as they struggle to find meaning and purpose in their circumstances. However, through life-affirming activities, they are equipped with the tools necessary to cope with the impact of cancer and to live life to the fullest. At SCS, a wide and holistic array of services are provided to these children, youths and their families that include a tuition programme, achievement awards, school allowances, youth engagements and family activities.

SCS EDUCATION FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE SCHEME

SCS provides school allowance grants and bursaries to alleviate the financial burden of school-going children and youths whose families are impacted by cancer.



SCS HELP THE CHILDREN & YOUTH PROGRAMME



Over the past 11 years, SCS has disbursed more than \$3 million. A total of 532 students benefitted from the SCS Tuition Programme, 241 students received the SCS Achievement Awards, 483 students received the SCS School Allowance Schemes, 20 students received Bursary Awards and 1,391 children/youths and their family members attended the family and youth engagement programmes.

Since 2009, SCS has set up various programmes under the Help the Children and Youth Programme (HCYP) with support from Singtel and their annual pledge of \$250,000.

These programmes engage children and youths to improve their lives under the guidance of tutors who act as point of contact, providing timely feedback to parents and/or SCS caseworkers regarding the student and his/her family development as well as other concerns that might require intervention.

THE SCS YOUTH CLUB

The SCS Youth Club offers youths with opportunities for personal growth and development.

This initiative equips youths with the knowledge, attitudes and skills to manage a wide range of life experiences, such as to recognise and manage emotions; to develop care and concern for others; to establish positive relationships; to make responsible decisions; and to handle challenging situations constructively and ethically.

This platform also promotes volunteerism among youths impacted by cancer to connect and contribute back to SCS or the community at large.

SCS HOSPICE CARE SERVICES

SUPPORTING CANCER PATIENTS AT THE END OF THEIR JOURNEY

The close of a cancer patient's journey is painful, daunting and never easy. With care and compassion, the SCS Hospice Care Services team stands ready to journey with patients and their families in their final chapter. The team counts on experienced and dedicated nurses, doctors, social workers, counsellors, physiotherapists and occupational therapists, ready to provide holistic relief and quality-of-life care to terminal stage cancer patients who have chosen to remain within their own living environment and be with their loved ones in the final stages of their lives.

In an ongoing collaboration with volunteer students from the NUS Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine, the befriending (Project Happy Apples) and legacy-building (Project Legacy) initiatives benefit both patients and the future doctors of our society through the invaluable exposure gained.

With the continued support of various visiting consultants in palliative medicine from Khoo Teck Puat Hospital, Ng Teng Fong Hospital and Parkway Cancer Centre Singapore, the team focuses on relieving symptoms and helping patients to live as comfortably as possible, addressing their fear of suffering when nearing the end of life.

In support of patients and families, and to honour their differences, it falls upon the SCS Hospice Care Services team to spark conversations around the patients' preferences towards death and dying – which although difficult, will often bring solace and stability to patients.



The team brought a lot of comfort and reassurance to me and my family. They are very compassionate, patient, empathetic and supportive. 2019 HIGHLIGHTS

– NATIONAL LEVEL INITIATIVES (MINIMUM DATA SET AND CAREGIVER SURVEY):

In support of the Singapore Hospice Council (SHC), SCS responded to their call to participate in two of their national level initiatives.

1. **Minimum Data Set (MDS):** SCS provided anonymised demographical data of our patients over the past year, contributing to what we hope will be the birth of a National Palliative Registry in the long run, which will have a profound impact on the creation and funding of palliative care programmes on a nationwide scale.

2. **Caregiver Survey:** This is a pilot survey initiated by SHC to obtain from bereaved caregivers feedback on the quality of palliative care received by their deceased loved ones. The aim is to have this survey as the national standard in assessing the quality of palliative care delivery from the point of view of the caregiver. With that vision in mind, we have incorporated our existing bereaved caregiver survey into this SHC pilot, and are currently into the second iteration of this pilot survey.

– **HOME-BASED RESPITE CARE (HBRC) PROGRAMME (2019):** This collaboration between the Ministry of Health (MOH), the Agency for Integrated Care (AIC) and their community homecare partners is a new iteration of Interim Care Services for End-of-Life Care (ICS-EOL). Targeting patients from needy families who wish to stay at home, this programme provides trained caregivers to support and guide them in their final days. The criteria for admission to this programme has been broadened to terminally ill patients with a life expectancy of 12 months or less, and an increase in the total number of caregiving hours provided for.

– **WORLD HOSPICE DAY ROADSHOW (2019):** A consistent supporter for several years, SCS once again set up a booth at this event organised by SHC. The theme of the event focused on caregivers. Two live sharings were conducted by caregivers of previous SCS patients, facilitated by the SCS team.

- **Voices of My HeART @ *SCAPE (2019):** This is the first roadshow organised by SHC in the form of a community arts engagement programme. It represents an innovative and daring attempt to engage the young (and young-at-heart) on issues related to palliative care, in the hope that they will take that message home to their older loved ones. The programme featured several arts engagement activities, stage performances, and a songwriting competition. SCS contributed by setting up an interactive arts booth. SCS is proud to be involved in SHC's first foray into the community arts scene, and had lots of fun in the process too.
- **AUDIT ON THE NATIONAL GUIDELINES ON PALLIATIVE CARE (2019):** A biennial clinical audit of SCS Hospice Care Services officially took place in the last quarter of 2019, funded by MOH and supported by SHC.

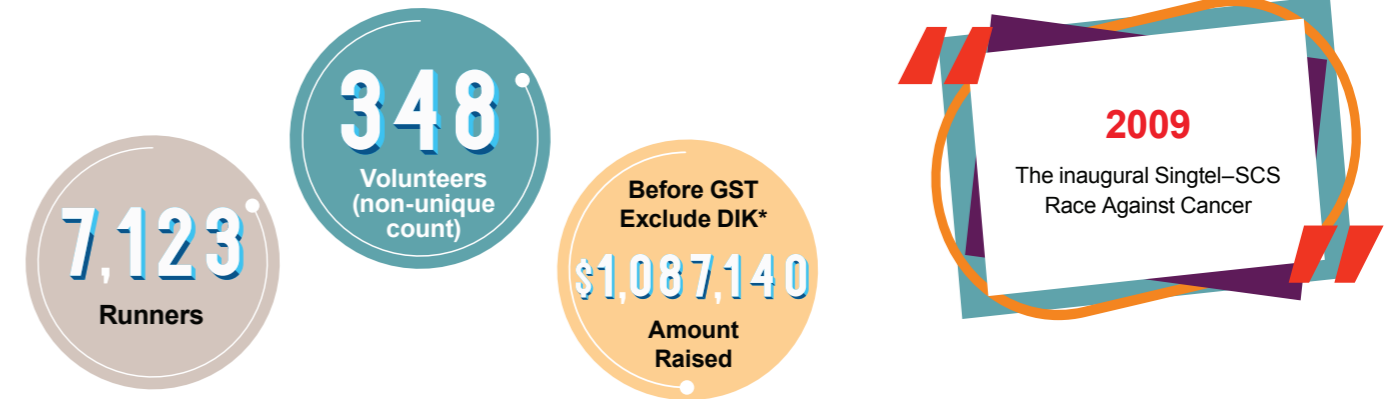

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HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

PARTNERSHIP WITH NATIONAL CANCER CENTRE SINGAPORE

This partnership will provide a continuum of cancer care beyond treatment that is accessible, affordable and of quality. A dedicated acute rehabilitation centre – the first of its kind, is planned to be developed to provide a one-stop holistic care plan for cancer patients supported by a multi-disciplinary team that includes oncologists, surgeons, rehabilitation physicians, allied health professionals and psychosocial support staff. An interactive learning hub is also planned to be developed to further educate and empower the public to manage their cancer journey by providing them insights and a glimpse into the actual experience coping with cancer.

One key collaboration is the upstream prevention efforts championed by both parties through a dedicated Cancer Genetics Service Screening Programme. This is a key advancement in upstream prevention measures to identify potential cancer genes in a strategic bid to reduce cancer incidence. This will be the first time a government healthcare institution and voluntary welfare organisation are coming together to collaborate on upstream prevention efforts in addition to their current activities.

To provide a seamless experience for cancer patients and support the above plans, SCS will co-locate to the new NCCS building come 2022. The new office will house the various SCS cancer support teams. With this co-location within NCCS, cancer patients who require financial aid, welfare, rehabilitation, or hospice support, will no longer have to travel to multiple locations for assistance; making it hassle-free and more convenient for them. Direct medical care from NCCS and additional assistance from SCS can be easily obtained, all under one roof.

MOVEMBER 2019

This annual campaign by SCS and the Movember Foundation to raise awareness of men's health focuses on four areas: prostate cancer, testicular cancer, mental health, and suicide prevention. The programme kickstarted on 1 November with the campaign theme "Whatever You Grow Will Save a Bro".

Prostate cancer is the 2nd most common cancer among men worldwide. In Singapore, prostate cancer is the 3rd most commonly diagnosed cancer in men and has the 6th highest cancer mortality. The funds raised from the Singapore campaign are channelled to the SCS Prostate Cancer Survivorship Programme. From October 2019 to December 2019, more than \$348,034 was raised for the cause.

AFFORDABLE ART FAIR

The Affordable Art Fair was held from 22 to 24 November 2019. They chose Singapore Cancer Society as their adopted charity of choice. For every ticket sold, \$1 was donated to the Society, as well as net profit from sales of a dog sculpture where fair participants could paint on it and bring home. SCS had a booth at the fair where we conducted art activities, talks and promoted use of art therapy for people suffering from cancer. By the end of the event, SCS had received a total of \$5,984 worth of donations.

ASTRAZENECA ON 'CANCER CAN GIVE' INITIATIVES

In June 2019, SCS supported AstraZeneca (AZ) in the launch of the Cancer Can Give (CCG) movement to empower cancer survivors to make a difference in society, and to change the public's perception about cancer and cancer survivors: to dissociate 'death' from cancer, and to recognise cancer survivors for their resilience and their continued contribution to society. In the launch phase, CCG supports cancer survivors to give back across three pillars: 1) the Gift of Help to address pressing societal needs such as Singapore's ageing population, 2) the Gift of Knowledge to impart skills to the young and young at heart, and 3) the Gift of Sustainability to reduce the human impact on the environment.

Within the first three months of launch, CCG supported two groups of cancer survivors to give back. The first group was the SCS dragon boat team, the Purple Dragons (involving 12 cancer survivors). Joined by staff members from both AZ and SCS, the group collected 15 kg of trash from the Marina Reservoir while on kayaks! Cancer survivors also learned about responsible social behaviours while using the waterways of Singapore, which is a message that they can share with the other dragon boaters they encounter during their routine practice.

The second group consisted of four female cancer survivors with a desire to help the young. CCG supported their wish by providing a joint facilitated art therapy session with girls from the Christian residential home Gladiolus Place. These girls all come from challenged family backgrounds, and Gladiolus Place provides the girls with a temporary home, counselling, and all-round support to help them carry on a normal life as much as possible. In the joint art therapy session, the cancer survivors and the girls had the chance to express their inner emotions – both positive and negative – through art, and to share their artwork and stories with each other in a facilitated, safe environment. The cancer survivors' stories inspired the girls to recognise that we all face different life challenges, and that no matter how dire the challenges may seem, they can be overcome.

YOUTH CLUB AND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

DBS MARINA REGATTA 2019: DRAGON BOAT

SCS Youth Club and NUS volunteers formed a team and participated for the 1st time in the DBS Marina Regatta Community Race – Youth Troopers Race.

The team managed to clinch 2nd runner-up and won \$500 prize money for SCS Youth Club despite many being unable to attend trainings during their examination period.



CITI-YMCA YOUTH FOR CAUSES PROGRAMMES

This is a community initiative started by Citi and YMCA of Singapore in 2003 to promote social entrepreneurship and community leadership among Singapore youths aged 15 to 25. The platform includes seed funding, training and volunteer mentorship for executing self-initiated projects to raise public awareness, funds and volunteers for Social Service Agencies (SSAs) of their choice. In 2019, SCS was selected by 4 teams under this programme to raise awareness, mobilise volunteers, bring joy and hope to our beneficiaries, and to raise funds for our cause.



APPRECIATION CARD MAKING

This event was organised by National Junior College students under the Citi-YMCA Youth for Causes Programme. Beneficiaries learnt how to create cards using markers and origami, as well as to decorate the cover of a notebook.
