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About us

The Singapore Cancer Society (SCS) was founded in 1964, registered as a society in 1984 and has IPC (Institution of a Public Character) status as a charity since 1995. SCS is endorsed by the Ministry of Health and is a member of the National Council of Social Service and Singapore Hospice Council.

Being self-funded, the Society organises various fundraising activities throughout the year as it is dependent on public donations to provide quality services to cancer patients, their families and the public.

SCS is governed by a Council comprising members who are volunteers without remuneration, and who hold office for a term of two years at a time. Both the Council members and senior staff have no business relations with the Society and none of them are related by blood.

VISION

To be the leading charitable cancer organisation in Singapore and the region, with a reputation for effective programmes for the prevention and control of cancer.

MISSION

The Singapore Cancer Society is a community-based voluntary health organisation dedicated to minimising the impact of cancer through public education, screening, patient services, financial assistance, research and advocacy.

Chairman's Message



SCS will continue to leverage on our strengths and good governance to better serve the community.

71-year-old Mr Tan Eng Lai suffers from advanced rectal cancer. He has been bed-bound for many years and is receiving palliative care. A widower with no savings, Mr Tan stays with his daughter who is his caregiver. His son-in-law, the sole-breadwinner, depends on his income as a taxi driver to provide for the family of five. The couple has two school-going children. The medical expenses and patient care have put a strain on the family's finances.

For Mr Tan and many patients like him and for families whose lives are adversely affected by cancer, help is available at Singapore Cancer Society. We help Mr Tan by providing him with financial assistance and stoma bags. His grandchildren receive monthly school allowance from the Society which helps to defray the school expenses. These welfare schemes have helped to ease the financial strain on the families so that caregivers can better support the patients in coping with the illness. The patient's family members can also continue to work or study with peace of mind.

The Singapore Cancer Society's financial assistance, treatment subsidies and welfare aid schemes have made it possible for the financially disadvantaged to receive medical care so that they are not left behind in the fight against cancer. They too deserve the best chance of cure or care and of leading normal lives.

CONTINUUM OF SUPPORT AND CARE

The family unit is one of the pillars of our society. We believe that we should not only focus our attention on cancer-stricken patients but also on family and caregivers of the patient. Going beyond helping those who are undergoing treatment and battling cancer, Singapore Cancer Society has embarked on a new programme to help children and youth whose lives are affected by cancer. These young persons are either themselves suffering from cancer or have parents or siblings who

are living with cancer. In 2010, the Singapore Cancer Society's Help the Children and Youth Programme has benefited more than a hundred children through our tuition service, book prize awards, school allowance grant and family engagement activities.

To help patients on their road to recovery and those who survived cancer, the Singapore Cancer Society has continued to walk alongside them by providing them with rehabilitative and psychosocial support. For those battling advanced cancers, our team of hospice home care doctors and nurses has visited their homes to give medical care and bring comfort to these patients and their caregivers by being there for them.

In the year under review, our continuum of support and care services have helped and touched the lives of some 1,500 individuals directly, and more indirectly.

PREVENTION IS BETTER THAN CURE

Cancer is the number one killer disease in Singapore and the incidence is on the rise. According to the latest statistics from the Singapore Cancer Registry, on average, 9,028 new cases are diagnosed each year and 4,177 die from cancer.

However, there is a great chance of cure when cancer is detected and treated early, and many need not die from it. For this reason, the Singapore Cancer Society has been relentlessly promoting the importance of screening through public talks and free screening.

In 2010, our free FOBT (Faecal Occult Blood Test) screening exercise helped to save 169 lives. Of these, 143 were found with pre-cancerous polyps and 26 diagnosed with Stage 1, 2 or 3 colorectal cancers.

The Celebrate Wellness Project, a partnership between the Singapore Cancer Society, Health Promotion Board and WINGS (Women Inspiring, Nurturing and Grooming Singaporeans), saw 9,263 women responding to the call to go for mammogram screening in the first year of the programme.

In all, our public education efforts and cancer screening programmes have reached out to some 55,000 persons. The hope is that these individuals will cultivate a habit of going for regular screening so that cancers can be caught early.


FORGING AHEAD

Public Education



Public awareness is key to cancer prevention and control. Knowing the signs and symptoms of different types of cancer and the various screening tests will empower individuals to take charge of their own health. As such, SCS has been relentless in its efforts to educate the public on the importance of regular screening and early detection in saving lives.

Through community engagement and collaboration with major healthcare partners and hospitals, SCS's public education campaigns have achieved an extensive outreach islandwide. Our public forums and community / corporate talks have helped to generate greater awareness on cancer-related issues and cancer screenings.

COLORECTAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

March 2010

It only takes a minute to administer the Faecal Occult Blood Test (FOBT) at home. For this reason, the theme "Just 1 more minute could save your life" was adopted for the 9th Colorectal Cancer Awareness Campaign. A preliminary test for Colorectal Cancer, the FOBT has proven to be an effective screening method in reducing cancer mortality rates.

During the campaign month, public forums conducted in English, Mandarin and Malay were



held at the Kallang Community Club. A total of 496 participants attended these forums, where a panel of speakers from both the private and public hospitals shared their invaluable knowledge about colorectal cancer.

To encourage those aged 50 years and above to perform the FOBT, an islandwide distribution of the FOBT kits was conducted in the month of March. Free FOBT kits were made available through 40 Guardian Health and Beauty stores, 18 polyclinics, and three roadshows. SCS and 9 Guardian Health and Beauty stores continued to distribute the FOBT kits all year round.

Roadshows were held at Tiong Bahru Plaza, Lot 1 Choa Chu Kang and Pasir Ris White Sands to raise awareness on Colorectal Cancer.



Our public forums and community talks have helped to generate greater awareness on cancer-related issues and screenings.

CERVICAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH May 2010

The theme of the 5th Cervical Cancer Awareness Campaign was "Fight Cervical Cancer". Dr See Hui Ti, Senior Consultant, Medical Oncologist, Parkway Cancer Centre, was the Chairperson of the organizing committee whose aim was to encourage more women to learn about cervical cancer and its prevention.

Member of Parliament for Bishan Toa Payoh GRC, Ms Josephine Teo, graced the 5th Cervical Cancer Awareness Forum held at the Bishan Community Club. 329 participants who attended the English and Mandarin public forums were given information about cervical cancer, screening and vaccination.

To encourage women to go for their Pap Smear, SCS engaged the National Healthcare Diagnostic Group (NHGD)'s Mobile Clinic Bus to conduct free Pap Smear for eligible ladies over a 4-day period at the Bishan Community Club. A total of 94 ladies were screened.

As part of our outreach efforts, 133 clinics participated in the campaign by providing free Pap Smear screening to women aged between 25 and 69 years. 644 women answered the call and had their Pap Smear tests done at the participating clinics in the month of May.

OVARIAN CANCER AWARENESS MONTH June 2010

According to the Singapore Cancer Registry, ovarian cancer is one of the top cancers among Singapore women and the incidence is on the rise. Ovarian cancer is a silent killer as the symptoms are subtle and, when diagnosed, is often already in the late stage. As early detection offers the best chance of survival, it is important for every woman to know



the symptoms of the disease. For this reason, the Ovarian Cancer Awareness Campaign was birthed.

Chaired by A/Prof Jeffrey Low, Head of Gynecologic Oncology, National University Cancer Institute, Singapore and Senior Consultant, Department of Obstetrics & Gynaecology, National University Hospital, a committee consisting of members from National University Cancer Institute, Singapore, KK Women's and Children's Hospital, National Cancer Centre Singapore, Singapore General Hospital and SCS was formed.

The theme "Ovarian Cancer, The Silent Killer" was adopted as it aptly described the nature of this type of cancer. Until there is a test, awareness is best! The inaugural public forum held at the Kallang Community Club was graced by Ms Ellen Lee, Member of Parliament for Sembawang GRC. In addition to talks by the doctors, two ovarian cancer survivors shared their cancer journey with the audience.

554 participants attended the forum. To commemorate the campaign, an Ovarian Cancer Mobile Charm was produced for sale at \$2 each.



PROSTATE CANCER AWARENESS MONTH July 2010

The theme for the Campaign "The Men Need It Too" encouraged men to look out for signs and symptoms relating to prostate health and prostate cancer. SCS partnered the Singapore Urological Association to organise a public forum conducted in both English and Mandarin. Titled "Is frequent urination making life difficult?", the forum held at the Toa Payoh HDB Hub Auditorium attracted 282 participants. Doctors from the public and private hospitals shared with the audience information relating to men's prostate issues covering topics such as frequent urination at night, treatment options, prostate health affecting sexual life and prostate cancer.

GASTRIC CANCER AWARENESS MONTH August 2010

"Beyond Gastric Pain" was the theme for the 4th Gastric Cancer Campaign. The Campaign focused on getting members of the public to recognise the difference between gastric pain and gastric cancer. Chaired by A/Prof Jimmy So, Senior Consultant & Director, Upper Gastrointestinal Surgery, Department of Surgery, National University Hospital, the public forum covered topics ranging from detection to prevention and treatment of gastric cancer. The forum, held at Kallang Community Club, was attended by 781 participants.

In conjunction with the Campaign, a Cooking Demo cum Nutrition Talk named "Happy Belly" was launched for the first time at Kallang Community Club. Chef John See, a popular culinary consultant, shared on "Healthy Cooking for Cancer Patients". More than 30 participants benefited from the demonstration of three simple dishes whipped up by Chef See. During the cooking session, Chef See also shared about his father's cancer journey.

Following the cooking demonstration, participants attended the Nutrition Talk by A/Prof Jimmy So who shared information on common digestive disorders and treatment of gastric disorders.

HEAD AND NECK CANCER AWARENESS MONTH September 2010

SCS, together with Merck Serono and the Chapter of Otorhinolaryngologists College of Surgeons, organised the 4th Head and Neck Cancer public forum held at the Woodlands Regional Library Auditorium.

The theme for this year's Campaign was "Head and Neck Cancer: Are you at risk?" Doctors from private and public hospitals shared their knowledge on this "Silent Killer". The topics covered the risk factors, screening and prevention, signs and symptoms, diagnosis and treatment options of head and neck cancers. 322 participants benefited from the talks.

BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH October 2010

For Breast Cancer Awareness Month in October, the preceding year's theme "Breast Matters!" was retained to aid recall and reinforce the message that breast matters to the women.

Breast Cancer Foundation (BCF) led the committee comprising National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), the National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS) and SCS to plan and implement a series of activities to heighten the awareness of breast cancer and remind women to go for mammogram.

As a lead up to the Campaign, the Health Promotion Board partnered Clover Films to produce a movie "Love Cuts", which featured the stories of two



women with breast cancer — one was diagnosed with late stage cancer and the other at an early stage. The movie aimed to encourage women to have regular mammograms so that any signs of breast cancer could be detected and treated early. A charity film premiere was held on 3 September, the proceeds of which were donated to BCF and SCS.

The Watsons Pink Ribbon Walk / Run marked the launch of the Campaign, underscoring the importance of a healthy lifestyle in preventing the likelihood of developing breast cancer.

For the first time, SCS organised a Pink Ribbon High Tea at Velvet Underground @ Zouk. Dr Hong Ga Sze, Senior Consultant, KK Women's & Children's Hospital, gave a talk on breast cancer to 200 women. Games and quizzes peppered with breast cancer information were part of the afternoon's programme.

During the month, SCS arranged with participating hospitals, X-ray centres and polyclinics islandwide to provide subsidised mammogram screenings for eligible women who met the BreastScreen Singapore's criteria. Coupons were also distributed at Guardian Health & Beauty Stores to allow more women to enjoy mammogram at subsidised rates. SCS also collaborated with SingHealth to provide mammogram at a special rate of \$25 for ladies who have attended SCS events and chose to have their mammograms done at any of the SingHealth polyclinics.

LUNG CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

November 2010

The Lung Cancer Awareness Campaign kicked off with a new twist. Chaired by A/Prof Koong Heng Nung, Senior Consultant and Head of Surgical Oncology Department, National Cancer Centre Singapore, a more focused approach was adopted to reach out to targeted groups. The team went directly to five companies to educate the employees on Smoking and Lung Cancer. A/Prof Koong

delivered the talks on harmful effects of smoking, signs and symptoms, risks and treatment of Lung Cancer. A total of 252 employees benefited from the talks.

During the month, SCS also partnered the Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease Association of Singapore, Health Promotion Board, Boehringer Ingelheim, Pfizer and Ezyhealth to organise a public forum on "Love Our Lungs 2" to raise the awareness of the Respiratory System and Lung Cancer. The forum, held at the Singapore Management University's Function Room, attracted 116 participants. It covered various topics such as the respiratory system, common lung disorders, effects of smoking, breathing exercises as well as an overview of lung cancer. The objective of the forum was to encourage the public to take care of their lungs and to remind them that lung diseases and lung cancer could be prevented.

OTHER PUBLIC EDUCATION INITIATIVES

Celebrate Wellness Roadshows

The Celebrate Wellness project commenced in January 2010 with the aim of encouraging women belonging to different age groups, ethnic groups and background to make well-being the top priority in their lives. The project was initiated by WINGS (Women Inspiring, Nurturing and Grooming Singaporeans) and led by the PAP Women Members of Parliament.

In the year, five Celebrate Wellness roadshows were held in the five districts in Singapore — North East, South East, Central, North West and South West to educate women on health-related matters. For a start, the emphasis was directed at fighting breast cancer, the number one cancer among Singapore women. Regular mammogram screening remains the most effective way to detect breast cancer early and save the lives of women.

Currently, a mammogram costs \$100, but a 50% subsidy is provided jointly by the Health Promotion Board (HPB) and Singapore Totalisator Board (Tote Board). With further generous funding from Tote Board procured by the Celebrate Wellness Organising Committee, women 50 years and above who have never had a mammogram or who have never returned for a re-screen after three years can enjoy a further \$25 subsidy over the already subsidised rate of \$50 at the participating polyclinics. This two-year programme started in January 2010. The Celebrate Wellness Organising Committee has further procured from the Khoo Teck Puat Foundation a subsidy of \$25 if participating women from low income families go for their re-screen two years after this screening.

As one of the partners of Celebrate Wellness project, SCS helped to publicise the roadshows through its various communication channels and arranged for volunteer doctors to give talks on cancer during the roadshows. At each session, SCS also invited breast cancer survivors to share their journey and

encourage women to go for mammogram screening. At the roadshows, SCS also disseminated cancer information, distributed FOBT Kits and allowed women to make appointments for free Pap Smear.

Lianhe Wanbao Beauty and Health Fair

For the second year running, SCS participated in the Lianhe Wanbao Beauty and Health Fair held in the Suntec City Convention Hall. Cancer screening services such as the FOBT kits and Pap Smear were promoted during the Fair. Female participants were also encouraged to go for mammogram at subsidised rates offered by NHGD polyclinics.

Lianhe Zaobao Health Seminar and Roadshow

The Seminar was held at the Toa Payoh HDB Hub this year. SCS was given a booth to distribute the FOBT kits. It was also a platform for ladies to make appointments to have their Pap Smear done at the SCS clinic.

Health Fair at Chong Pang Community Club

SCS partnered Nam Hong Welfare Society and Chong Pang Community Club to organise a health fair, titled "Don't Let Cancer Defeat You". SCS engaged the NHGD Mobile Clinic to provide free Pap Smear to the needy residents. At the same time, SCS also distributed free FOBT kits to those aged 50 years and above. Colorectal Cancer information was disseminated to the visitors at the SCS booth. Dr Lai Jiunn Herng from Singapore General Hospital and Dr Colin Teo from Khoo Teck Puat Hospital shared with the 350-strong audience information on Colorectal Cancer and Incontinence and Urinary Cancers respectively.

SURVEY FINDINGS

Cancer Awareness through SCS Public Education Forums

To measure the effectiveness of our public education programmes, feedback was gathered from our forum participants at the end of every session. A total of 2,628 participants responded to the survey as follows:

CANCER RESEARCH GRANT

SCS encourages research across a wide spectrum of subjects relevant to the quality of life, quality of care and quality of treatment for cancer patients, including the psychosocial aspects. SCS awarded research grants to eight projects selected by our panel of judges. The projects covered four areas: Basic Sciences, Behavioral, Clinical Science and Psychosocial research.

Cancer Screening Services

Early detection of cancer saves lives and hence reduces the mortality rates due to cancer. Cancer screening helps to detect cancer at an early stage. Treatment at an early stage increases the chance of cure.

SCS provides the following free cancer screening services:

SCREENING TESTS

- Pap smear to screen for Cervical Cancer
- Faecal Occult Blood Test (FOBT) to screen for Colorectal Cancer
- Mammogram at subsidised rates

PATIENT EDUCATION

- Breast Self-Examination to help detect Breast Cancer

SCS provides these free screening services at our headquarters at Realty Centre (Enggor Street). The branch clinic at Boon Keng was closed with effect from 28 February 2010 to centralise and maximise the use of our resources at the headquarters.

Promotion of our free screening services has been broadened to cover more community centres, workplaces and community event venues to achieve a wider reach. Subsidised rates for colonoscopies and mammograms are provided to those who need follow-up tests.



BREAST CANCER SCREENING

SCS educates patients on how to perform Breast Self-Examination (BSE) and advises women between 40 and 49 years to go for mammogram annually, and once in two years for those aged 50 years and above. In the year, 3,612 women were taught BSE at the SCS clinic.

We continued our collaboration with the NHGD for the second year. Women aged 40 years and above who visited the SCS clinic were given \$10 off for mammogram screening services at NHG Polyclinics. 1,760 women were given the referral letters and 975 had their mammograms done. 162 women with suspicious findings in their breast tissue had been referred for further assessment.

During the Breast Cancer Awareness Month in October, SCS collaborated with X-ray centres, diagnostic centres, clinics and hospitals to provide special rates for mammogram services. 25,000 coupons were distributed at the SCS clinic and Guardian Health and Beauty stores to allow women to enjoy a special rate for mammogram



screening. 388 women used the coupons for mammograms during the Campaign. In addition, SingHealth Polyclinics also offered a very special rate of \$25 to eligible women who participated in SCS BCAM activities. 82 ladies took up this offer and one was diagnosed with Breast Cancer. A total of 1,445 women were screened during the year.

CELEBRATE WELLNESS

SCS collaborated with WINGS (Women Inspiring, Nurturing and Grooming Singaporeans), led by the PAP Women Members of Parliament, to provide mammogram at a special rate of \$25 over a 2-year period from 1 January 2010 to 31 December 2011 for all women aged 50 years and above who either have never been for a mammogram or who have not been for one in the last three years. The further subsidy was funded by the Tote Board.

The participating screening centres were Singapore General Hospital (SGH), NHGD and Medi-Rad Associates Ltd (MEDI-RAD). This programme has benefited 9,263 ladies. Of these, 4,457 ladies had their first screen and 4,806 went for their re-screen.

CERVICAL CANCER SCREENING

Pre-cancerous changes or early cancer in the cervix can be detected with the help of Pap Smear. Patients with abnormal Pap Smear results were referred to gynaecologists for further assessment. When detected in its early stage, cervical cancer can be completely cured by simple treatments.

During the Cervical Cancer Awareness Month in May 2010, SCS collaborated with 133 participating clinics to advocate for Pap Smear screening among women aged 25 years and above. 1,215 women were screened during the month. SCS engaged the NHGD Mobile Clinic Bus to provide Pap Smear to eligible ladies at the Bishan Community Club over a 4-day period. 94 ladies were screened.

In the year, 4,409 women participated in the Pap Smear screening. Patients who required follow-up were referred to gynaecologists for further investigations. Two were diagnosed with cervical cancer.

COLORECTAL CANCER SCREENING

Early detection of colorectal cancer has been made easier with the use of the Faecal Occult Blood Test (FOBT), a preliminary screening test which detects the presence of blood in the stools. Men and women aged 50 years and above, or those below 50 with a family history of colorectal cancer, are encouraged to perform the test annually.

During the Society's 9th Colorectal Cancer Awareness Campaign, SCS partnered 18 polyclinics and 40 Guardian Health and Beauty stores to distribute free FOBT kits to the public in the month of March. Nine Guardian Health and Beauty stores extended the distribution by making the kits available for collection all year round. Free FOBT kits were also

distributed at the SCS clinic and at 81 community outreach events. SCS participated actively in outdoor events such as community health roadshows, public forums and corporate talks. These events boosted the take-up rate of FOBT kits and generated greater awareness of colorectal cancer.

There was a 9% increase in the collection of the free FOBT kits, from 29,710 participants in 2009 to 32,416 in 2010. Of these, 800 were tested positive with blood detected in their stools. Of the 597 participants who went through colonoscopy, 28 were detected with cancer, of which two were found to have advanced colorectal cancer and 143 had their pre-cancerous polyps removed.

Colorectal cancer can be prevented by the removal of polyps or benign growths in the colon / rectum. If the polyps are left alone, they could develop into cancer over time. Our campaign had thus helped to save 169 lives.



Hospice Home Care


Since 1987, SCS's home care team has been providing palliative care to persons with advanced cancers in the comfort of their homes.

Our hospice home care team, comprising four full-time nurses, part-time doctors and support staff, provides assistance to patients and their caregivers in areas such as pain and symptom management, caregiver bedside training, psychosocial support and referrals for welfare aid and assistance from other community resources.

The team also provides loan of equipment such as wheelchairs, commodes, walking aids and oxygen concentrators. They work very closely with the hospital medical teams to provide holistic care to our cancer patients and their caregivers.

In 2010, the team made 3,516 visits. In comparison, 1,688 home visits were made in 2009.

ATTACHMENT PROGRAMMES

SCS was again selected by Hwa Chong Institution as one of the centres for the School's Talent Attachment and Grooming Programme. 18 students from the School were attached to SCS for a week in June and November. During their attachment, these students were introduced to the respective departments in the Society to equip them with a better understanding of the different roles and functions. In addition, there were opportunities for direct patient interaction through visits to the patients' homes.

Welfare Services

A cancer diagnosis could devastate patients and their families both financially and psychologically. The Welfare Department administers several financial assistance schemes and psychosocial support programmes to help cancer patients and their family members cope with the various challenges brought about by the illness and smoothen their road to recovery.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE SCHEMES

SCS Cancer Treatment Fund

Coping with cancer is emotionally, psychologically, physically and also financially draining. Families are faced with life threatening situations and financial upheaval. One's life savings can be completely depleted within a short period of time. SCS has been helping needy cancer patients cope with their financial plight since April 2005 by providing subsidies for the costly chemotherapy drugs and cancer treatment. Needy patients are referred by their treating physicians from the restructured hospitals. In 2010, over \$1.07 million were disbursed to help 394 patients. Since its inception, \$7.87 million have been expended to help 2,069 cancer patients.

Welfare Aid Fund

When a family member is stricken with cancer, the family faces great financial strain due to unemployment, loss of income, hefty treatment



costs which invariably affect daily living and family lifestyle. The Welfare Aid Fund, set up in 1964, aims to provide needy cancer patients and their families with temporary cash aid to tide them over the difficult period. Medical supplements like milk and stoma bags are also provided to patients who need them. Beneficiaries of the Fund are referred by Medical Social Workers and healthcare workers from hospitals, hospices and voluntary welfare organisations. In 2010, the Fund has benefited 266 patients with a total aid value exceeding \$472,000.

In addition, all welfare recipients were given red packets containing supermarket vouchers during the Lunar New Year for their grocery shopping during the festive season. Temasek Polytechnic Community Service Club (TPCSC) collaborated with SCS for the second year running to do spring cleaning at the homes of welfare recipients. 13 recipients had their homes cleaned and refurbished under the month-long project titled "Project Spring of Love", which took place from 2 to 31 January 2010. The welfare recipients also benefited from the year-end Food Hamper Project which brought festive cheer to their families. The food hampers were sponsored by Carrefour and Pfizer and delivered to the recipients' homes by volunteers from SingTel.





Other Funds

The Society administers the following funds:

- **Trailblazer-Chan Chiew Ping Fund**

The Fund was set up in memory of the late Madam Chan Chiew Ping in support of Iressa and Tarceva treatment for female lung cancer patients. The Society administers the grant on behalf of the Trailblazer-Chan Chiew Ping Fund.

- **RGS Joan Chan Shu Fang Fund**

The Fund was set up in memory of Joan Chan, an ex-Raffles Girls' student who succumbed to tongue cancer. The Fund provides financial assistance to young needy cancer patients, aged 35 and below. The fund balance as at end 2010 was \$69,169.

- **Koh Soh Eng Fund**

The Fund was set up in memory of the late Madam Koh Soh Eng to help young leukemia cancer patients, aged 25 years and below, by providing subsidies for their cancer treatment costs and financial assistance. The fund balance as at end 2010 was \$32,366.

- **Adelina Then Fund**

A bequest of \$1.9 million from the late Adelina Then was used to set up this Fund. The amount was set aside to fund general expenses of the Society over a three-year period.

OTHER WELFARE PROGRAMMES

Free Hospital Transportation

Transportation expenses to hospital for radiotherapy sessions and cancer treatment, which are administered frequently within a period of time, can be an added burden to patients from low-income families. To lighten the financial burden for these patients, SCS provides free transportation service to ferry them to and from home for their radiotherapy sessions at the National Cancer Centre Singapore, Singapore General Hospital, Tan Tock Seng Hospital and National University Hospital. Donations from The Wan Boo Sow Charity Fund Ltd, Target Asset Management Pte Ltd, Mr Lam Kun Kin and Mr Tan Poo Huat made it possible for

SCS to acquire a new 12-seater minibus to replace an existing old vehicle. The key handover ceremony was held on 23 July 2010 on the grounds of Singapore General Hospital. The Society's two minibuses made 1,818 trips in the year to benefit 110 cancer patients.

SCS Help the Children and Youth Programme

SingTel has renewed its support in 2010 by pledging \$200,000 from the SingTel Touching Lives Fund for this programme to help children and youths whose lives have been affected by cancer. Called the "SCS Help the Children and Youth" programme, support was provided in the following four areas:

- school allowance grant and bursary schemes
- group intervention workshops
- tuition services
- family engagement programmes

The financial assistance and tuition services have helped to defray education expenses and ease the burden on the families whose finances were already strained due to the illness. In the year, a total of 23 children benefited from the tuition programme. 28 children received the book prize awards in recognition of their good academic performance despite having to cope with illness in the family. In addition, 19 children received the school allowance grant.

Group intervention workshops and family engagement programmes provided psychosocial and emotional support to these children and youths who are often confronted with a range of emotions such as fear, depression, guilt or anger when coping with cancer or a sick parent.

Apart from helping the children and youths, SCS organised five family outings to promote family bonding. In 2010, over 100 families participated in programmes which included kite making at Marina Barrage, building sand castles at East Coast Park, watching Sleeping Beauty @ Esplanade, visiting the zoo, Snow City and the Science Centre.

SCS Satellite Centre at the National Cancer Centre Singapore

The SCS Satellite Centre was set up on 14 August 2006 at the NCCS to provide greater convenience to patients.

Services available at the Centre include:

- Application for the SCS Cancer Treatment Fund
- Information on cancer support groups
- Pamphlets on different types of cancer
- Information on the services provided by SCS

Rehabilitation & Support Groups

SCS currently has in place four Support Groups that give patients a platform to provide and receive peer support and also to benefit from educational talks and workshops.

Psycho-socio-emotional support is a pertinent part of a holistic recovery process. Group sharing helps boost patients' capacity and inner resilience in fighting cancer together with a positive mental state. The four Support Groups are New Voice Club (NVC), Ostomy Club (OC), Reach to Recovery (RTR) and the Look Good... Feel Better (LGFB) programme. On 16 January 2010, more than 70 members from three SCS support groups — RTR, NVC and OC — gathered at Civil Service Club, Tessensohn Clubhouse to attend the first combined New Year Party.

NEW VOICE CLUB

The NVC was formed in 1985 to provide rehabilitative support for throat / nasopharyngeal cancer patients and survivors. The Club currently has 54 active members. NVC members meet every Tuesday at the SCS premises for voice rehabilitation class and fun activities like table tennis and carom. Other than providing support within the group, NVC members also make hospital or home visits to newly-diagnosed cancer patients to offer them support through the sharing of experiences and knowledge. The group is active in organising and engaging in social and recreational activities. On 23 April 2010, NVC celebrated its 25th anniversary with a silver jubilee dinner and earlier in the day, 19 members participated in the Cancer Seminar: "Understanding Cancer and The New Era of Targeted Therapy". The members celebrated Mid-Autumn Festival on 21 September 2010.



THE OSTOMY CLUB

Established in 1981, the Ostomy Club (OC) offers support to colorectal cancer patients / survivors and helps them adjust to their new lives with stoma. The Club's membership stood at 162 as at end 2010. Members meet every third Saturday of the month. Stoma therapists and nurses were present at all meetings to assist members with their concerns. Talks and presentations on health-related subjects, like nutrition and qigong exercise, were also conducted at the meetings to benefit the members. OC members are active in reaching out to new patients through home visits and telephone calls. They helped to allay the fears of new patients by providing emotional support and sharing their experiences and knowledge. Members also engaged in recreational activities and about 30 members and their caregivers attended a TCM talk on "Diet and Cancer" on 19 June 2010.

REACH TO RECOVERY SUPPORT GROUP

Reach to Recovery (RTR) was established in 1973 to help women cope with breast cancer. The support group has 240 registered members. Members meet monthly on the second Saturday to share their experiences and discuss matters relating to breast cancer rehabilitation. They also organise and engage regularly in fun and educational activities such as fabric painting, cooking and excursions. In 2010, 76 members participated in the Breast Cancer Awareness Month event at Toa Payoh Community Club. On 27 and 28 November 2010, 20 members attended an RTR training conducted at SCS to better equip them to reach out to support newly-diagnosed breast cancer patients.



LOOK GOOD... FEEL BETTER PROGRAMME

The Look Good... Feel Better (LGFB) programme reaches out to women newly diagnosed with cancer, undergoing or about to undergo chemotherapy and / or radiotherapy treatment. It helps them to manage the physical changes brought on by temporary side-effects of their treatments, such as hair loss and skin discoloration, thereby helping them to restore their appearance and self-esteem.

"Hands-on" workshop sessions are conducted by volunteer cosmetologists who teach make-up techniques and offer tips on skin and hair care, use of wigs and various accessories such as hats and scarves to enhance the looks of the patients.

The programme also creates a comfortable environment for patients to share how they are coping with their illness and treatment. 24 workshops were conducted in 2010 and 170 participants attended the programme at Changi General Hospital, Gleneagles Hospital, KK Women's and Children's Hospital, John Hopkins Singapore International Medical Centre, National Cancer Centre Singapore and National University Hospital.

Volunteer Management



Volunteers are valuable to the Society as they augment the Society's limited resources. From diverse backgrounds and different walks of life, our volunteers brought with them their selfless dedication, experience and expertise that add value to the Society's work.

In 2010, the pool of active volunteers doubled to 600 from 300 in 2009. These committed volunteers assisted the Society in various areas of work, such as giving talks on cancer at public forums, raising funds, promoting cancer screening, assisting in administrative work and conducting welfare-related activities. SCS was also thankful to have the support of many corporations who had encouraged their staff to volunteer with the Society. These socially responsible corporate citizens included the American International Assurance Singapore, Health Promotion Board, Citibank N.A and SingTel.

In recognition and appreciation of our volunteers, SCS organised a Volunteer Appreciation Lunch at Scarlet City @ AMK Hub on 13 November 2010. More than 100 attendees were treated to a light-hearted afternoon of games, live entertainment and a scrumptious buffet lunch.

The support of volunteers is integral to the long-term success of SCS. The Society values and appreciates every effort made by our volunteers and remains committed to finding ways to make their volunteering experiences with SCS fulfilling and meaningful.



Community Partnerships

As a self-funded voluntary welfare organisation, SCS is dependent on donations from corporations and individuals to continue its core programmes of public education, screening, patient services, financial assistance, research and advocacy.

The Community Partnerships Department raises funds for the Society through various fundraising activities. It also collaborates with external partners and supporters and engages the community to join in the fight against cancer.

DAFFODIL DAYS

The Singapore Cancer Society held its annual Daffodil Days — “Celebrating Hope” in the month of February 2010. The Daffodil is an international symbol of hope for all people afflicted by cancer. The daffodil is a hardy flower that pushes its way through the frozen earth after a long winter to herald the return of spring, symbolising rebirths and new beginnings. Our Daffodil merchandise, comprising Daffodil Pins, Daffodil Flowers and Daffodil Hope Bears were sold at booths located islandwide at various hospitals and shopping malls in the month of February.



SINGTEL & SCS 2010 RACE AGAINST CANCER

Race Against Cancer is SCS’s annual charity run. The Race took place on Sunday, 4 July 2010 at Pasir Ris Park, Native Lawn. The event was graced by Mr Teo Chee Hean, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Defence. For the first time, a competitive category was introduced with finisher medals given to runners who have completed the Race. Close to 5,500 runners turned up to support the Race and raised \$551,097. Title sponsor, SingTel, made a \$200,000 donation from its Touching Lives Fund to support the SCS Help the Children and Youth Programme.



SCS is a self-funded voluntary welfare organisation dependent on public donations.



FLAG DAY 2010

Our volunteers dedicated their time and effort in support of our Flag Day held on Saturday, 7 August 2010. Two collection centres, Woodlands MRT Station and Plaza Singapura, were set up for the volunteers to collect their donation bags. The volunteers did an admirable job of filling the bags by getting donations from the public. Star Wars troopers came to lend their support and created a stir among the public with their surprise appearance. A total of \$35,690 was raised.

ROTARY-SCS TEE FOR CANCER CHARITY GOLF 2010

Tee for Cancer was held on Thursday, 14 October 2010 at Tanah Merah Country Club, Tampines Course, with Rotary Clubs of Singapore partnering SCS for the second year running. 156 golfers teed-started the spirit of giving. Due to the overwhelming response, morning flights were opened to golfers as well. The charity dinner was held at the clubhouse after the golf game where golfers bidded enthusiastically in the charity auction. Close to \$300,000 was raised from this golfing event.



DIRECT DEBIT DONOR PROGRAMME (DDDP)

DDDP is a year-long fundraising programme which encourages individuals to make long-term donations to SCS through credit card payments. This mode of street and house-to-house collections raised \$9.1 million in 2010.

PINK RIBBON PARTY

Singapore Cancer Society held its inaugural Pink Ribbon Party on Saturday, 23 October 2010 at Velvet Underground @ Zouk. The party attracted about 250 people who came together to celebrate life, health, love and happiness. The crowd partied for a good cause to raise awareness of breast cancer.

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



REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Singapore Cancer Society ("the Society") which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2010, and the statement of financial activities, statement of changes in funds and statement of cash flows for the reporting year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.

COUNCIL'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE PROVISIONS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Society's council is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the Society, the Charities Act, Cap 37, the Societies Act, Cap 311, Singapore Financial Reporting Standards and Recommended Accounting Practice 6. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

In accordance with RAP 6, the assets and liabilities representing each category of fund should be summarised and analysed between those funds in the notes to the accounts. However, the treatment is currently not being observed by management.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' RESPONSIBILITY

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Singapore Standards on Auditing. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Society's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by council, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.



IMPORTANT NOTE

1. GENERAL

Singapore Cancer Society ("the Society") is established in Singapore under the Societies Act, Cap 311. The functional currency of the Society is Singapore dollars and the financial statements are presented in Singapore dollars. It is also subject to the provisions of the Charities Act, Cap. 37 as one of the conditions for the renewal of its status as an Institution of a Public Character. The financial statements were approved and authorised for issue by the council ("the management") on 23 March 2011.

The principal objectivities of the Society are to foster national and international coordination and development of all activities in relation to cancer and the rendering of services to persons suffering from cancer.

The constitution of the Society restricts the use of fund monies to the furtherance of the objects of the Society. It prohibits the payment of dividends.

The registered office address is: 15 Enggor Street, #04-01 to 04 Realty Centre, Singapore 079716.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

Accounting Convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Singapore Financial Reporting Standards ("FRS") as well as all related Interpretations to FRS ("INT FRS") issued by the Singapore Accounting Standards Council and the Recommended Accounting Practice 6, Accounting and Reporting by Charities. The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention except where an FRS requires an alternative treatment (such as fair values) as disclosed where appropriate in these financial statements.

3. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

A related party includes the council members and key management of the Society. It also includes an entity or person that directly or indirectly controls, is controlled by, or is under common or joint control with these persons; members of the key management personnel or close members of the family of any individual referred to herein and others who have the ability to control, jointly control or significantly influence by or for which significant voting power in such entity resides with, directly or indirectly, any such individual. Key management personnel include the CEO and the direct reporting senior officers.

The council members, or people connected with them, have not received remuneration, or other benefits, from the Society for which they are responsible, or from institutions connected with the Society.

There is no claim by the council members for services provided to the Society, either by reimbursement to the council members or by providing the council members with an allowance or by direct payment to a third party.
