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about us

The Singapore Cancer Society (SCS) was established in 1964, registered as a society in 1984, and was accorded IPC (Institution of a Public Character) status as a charity in 1995 by the Ministry of Health. The Society is also a member of the National Council of Social Service and the Singapore Hospice Council.

Being self-funded, the Society is dependent on public donations to provide quality services to cancer patients, their families, and members of the public.

The Society is governed by a Council, which is comprised of members who are volunteers without remuneration and who hold office for a term of two years at a time. Both the Council members and management staff have no business relations with the Society and none of them are related by blood.

C **CHAIRMAN'S** MESSAGE



For anyone who is fortunate enough not to have encountered the disease, it is difficult to imagine the impact that cancer has upon the family and the community.

Here are some facts. Cancer kills more people in a year than any other disease. 1 in 4 people die of cancer. Every day, about 28 people are diagnosed with cancer. 14 die from the disease daily. In fact, in 2011 alone, more than 5,400 people died of cancer. These are the facts.

Yet, these do not fully convey the personal impact of cancer upon sufferers, survivors, and caregivers. Besides presenting the fear of death or the possible loss of a loved one, cancer also places a heavy financial burden upon families. Costly cancer treatments may wipe out savings and cause severe hardship in daily life. Perhaps it is this growing realisation of cancer's impact upon families and communities that more and more Singaporeans are stepping forward to contribute their time and money through the Singapore Cancer Society to help alleviate the burden of the disease.

It is heartening to emphasise that most of the contributions received by the Society comes from individual donors who stem from all walks of life. The Society is grateful to these individual donors who have assumed greater social responsibility in caring for those whose lives have been affected by cancer.

At the same time, the Society is also grateful for the ongoing support of its corporate partners. One such

corporate partner is SingTel, which sponsored the Race Against Cancer (RAC 2012) with the Society. Growing from strength to strength with each passing year, RAC 2012 attracted more than 8,500 participants and included some 90 more corporate teams in its line-up in 2012.

SingTel's continuing contribution directly aids children and youth whose lives have been impacted by cancer by providing financial and educational assistance to mitigate the difficulties that may affect their growth and development. In 2012, this Programme aided more than 120 children and youth. Aina Syara is one such child who has benefited from the Programme. Aina was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukaemia in 2008 and had to undergo chemotherapy and surgery. Although her condition has since stabilised, the various medical treatments which she had to undergo took its toll upon her studies. As a beneficiary of the Programme, the Society provides Aina and three of her younger siblings with weekly tuition as well as a conducive home study environment to ensure that they do not fall behind in their studies due to the difficulties caused by her cancer treatments.

Another youth to benefit from the Programme is Joon Kang, whose grandfather, who was living in the same flat as his family, was diagnosed with advanced rectal cancer in 2010. His mother quit her job to provide full time care for his grandfather, which left his father struggling to provide enough money to


cover their expenses. Joon Kang tried to do his bit by skipping recess meals and foregoing class outings, which affected his studies. As a beneficiary of the Programme, the Society provided Joon Kang with school allowance and weekly tuition, which enabled him to excel and top his level in Secondary three and four. For his achievements, Joon Kang was also awarded two book prizes by the Society. For children and youth like Aina and Joon Kang whose lives have been impacted by cancer, the Society will continue to provide support for their development and growth.

Nevertheless, despite its work in mitigating the impact of cancer upon children and youth as well as providing hospice home care for sufferers, the Society is determined to engage the wider family and community of Singaporeans. With the knowledge that more than a third of cancers are preventable, and a third of cancers are curable if the disease is detected early and treated correctly, public education and cancer prevention remains a key area of concern that the Society will continue to focus upon in the year ahead.

At the other end of the spectrum, the Society is also developing its capacity to meet the increasing demand for palliative care. As the prevalence of cancer increases with age, the number of people who suffer from cancer or other chronic diseases at the time of death is expected to increase by about 30% in 2020. Indeed, cancer sufferers will experience increased palliative care needs as their disease progresses. To meet these increasing needs and to complement the 18 institutions currently providing palliative care today, the Society aims to expand its current service of providing cancer patients suffering from advanced stages of the disease with access to professional palliative care in their homes.

As such, it is with a clear sense of these responsibilities that the Society seeks your support. Yet, in solidarity with our beneficiaries, I would also like to express my gratitude to you — our supporters, donors, partners, volunteers, Council members, management, and staff — for your contributions. Our work cannot bear fruit without your generosity.

PUBLIC EDUCATION

The Society's public education programme strongly advocates the prevention and early detection of cancer. Our public forums and talks have generated a greater awareness of cancer-related issues and the importance of cancer screening.

The Society's public education programme strongly advocates the prevention and early detection of cancer. Our public forums and talks focus on the recognition of the signs, symptoms, risks, prevention, and treatment of the various cancer types as well as the importance of regular screening and early detection.

The Society's public education campaigns have achieved an extensive outreach island-wide through community engagement and partnerships with major healthcare groups, community grassroots organisations, and hospitals. Our well-attended public forums and community/corporate talks have generated a greater awareness of cancer-related issues and the importance of cancer screening.

The campaigns conducted in 2012 were:

- Colorectal Cancer Awareness Campaign

Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month March 2012

The theme "Colorectal Cancer, Don't Wait Till it's Obvious" was centred upon an empty chair, which symbolised what remains of one who has lost the fight against the disease.

Colorectal cancer remains the number one cancer in Singapore. It is highly treatable and has good cure rates if detected and treated early. During the campaign month,



a series of activities were held to raise awareness of this cancer and Faecal Occult Blood Test (FOBT) screening. Campaign activities included public forums, island-wide distribution of the FOBT kits through 18 polyclinics and 71 Guardian Health and Beauty stores, as well as roadshows held at Tiong Bahru Plaza and Lot 1 Shoppers' Mall. In addition, the Society also participated in other events such as the 50 Plus Expo organised by the Council for Third Age and the Lianhe Wanbao Health & Beauty Fair.



An English and Mandarin public forum was held at the Toa Payoh HDB Hub Auditorium. The talks were helmed by doctors from the Singapore General Hospital (SGH) who shared invaluable knowledge about the disease. Two colorectal cancer survivors also shared their experiences of battling the disease at the public forum.

Furthermore, a Malay public forum — jointly organised by the Society, Kampung Ubi Community Club, and Novena Colorectal Centre — was held at Kampung Ubi Community Centre. 563 participants attended the three forums.

Cervical Cancer Awareness Month May 2012

The seventh Cervical Cancer Awareness Month campaign was themed "Eradication of Cervical Cancer, Simply Getting There!" This reflects the approach that the Society has taken to educate women in Singapore on the risk factors and warning symptoms of cervical cancer.

An English and Mandarin public forum held at the YMCA Auditorium attracted a total of 264 participants. Doctors from private and government hospitals shared information on cervical cancer, screening, and vaccination. The National Healthcare Group Diagnostics (NHGD) Mobile Clinic was engaged to provide free Pap smear screening at various community clubs during the last two weeks of May. 210 women participated in this exercise.

During the month, 136 clinics participated in the campaign by providing free Pap smear screening to 3,938 women aged between 25 and 69.

Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month

June 2012

In 2012, the campaign committee was chaired by National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS) for the third year. Other committee members included KK Women's and Children's Hospital (KKH), National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), Singapore General Hospital (SGH) and Singapore Cancer Society (SCS).

With the help of advertising and branding company Landor Associates, the Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month (OCAM) campaign committee re-branded the campaign and developed the "Positively Teal" logo with the tagline, "Raising Awareness for OVARIAN CANCER."

The Positively TEAL initiative sought to

- Encourage everyone to spread awareness of ovarian cancer to friends and family members
- Help women be more aware of the signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer and to take positive steps to consult a doctor immediately should they experience any symptoms
- To raise awareness of teal as the cancer awareness colour for ovarian cancer



The organising committee also reached out to the online community through bloggers. These bloggers were educated about ovarian cancer in the hopes that they would reach out to their readership with this information in cyberspace.

Associate Professor Mahesh Choolani, Senior Consultant from the Department of Obstetrics & Gynaecology at National University Hospital (NUH) gave a presentation on ovarian cancer and showcased the survival rates of women at various stages after diagnosis. He also shared his expertise on what treatment options are available for patients.

The Society also organised a public forum in English and Mandarin, which was attended by 512 participants. To raise awareness and funds as well as to commemorate the Positively Teal movement, a collar pin with the campaign logo was produced and sold at \$2 each.

The organising committee for the Ovarian Cancer Campaign reached out to the online community through bloggers in the hopes that they would reach out to their readership in cyberspace.

Prostate Cancer Awareness Month

July 2012

Departing from its partnership with the Singapore Urological Association (SUA) over the last two years, the Society organised the 2012 public forum independently, with support from Drs. Ho Siew Hong and Poh Beow Kiong who co-chaired the organising committee for the Prostate Cancer Awareness Month (PCAM) campaign. As supporting partner, Kampong Ubi CCMC provided the free use of its venue and facilities.

Doctors from private and government hospitals were instrumental in helping to educate participants about the detection, treatment, and prevention of prostate cancer and other prostate diseases. 510 participants took part in the English and Mandarin public forum.

Gastric Cancer Awareness Month

August 2012

The sixth Gastric Cancer Awareness Month campaign was themed "Beyond Gastric Pain" to raise awareness of gastric cancer as distinct from gastric pain. An English and Mandarin public forum was held at the YMCA Lee Kong Chian Auditorium to educate participants on how to address gastric pain and the treatment options for gastric cancer. Dieticians from the National University Hospital (NUH) joined the panel of doctors to discuss the importance of a healthy and balanced diet. 398 participants walked away with an improved understanding of gastric cancer.

Head and Neck Cancers Awareness Month

September 2012

The Society, together with Merck Serono and the National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS) and the National University Hospital (NUH) organised the head and neck cancer English public forum, which was held at the NUHS Tower Block Auditorium.

Entitled "Surviving Head and Neck Cancer," a panel of experts from NCIS and NUH discussed the causes and prevention of head and neck cancers, the methods and advancements in treating the cancers, as well as the need to have a positive attitude when diagnosed with the disease. 290 participants benefitted from the talk.

The Society engaged in a pilot outreach to River Valley Primary School by conducting a talk that focused on general cancer awareness and encouraged students to learn more about cancer. This pilot outreach serves as a basis for launching a wider outreach to schools in subsequent years.



Breast Cancer Awareness Month October 2012

Themed "Treasure the Breast Things in Life," this year's Breast Cancer Awareness Month (BCAM) campaign sought to encourage women to treasure their breasts by increasing their awareness of breast cancer and early detection methods through mammogram screening and breast self-examinations.

The Society organised this year's BCAM campaign in partnership with National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS), Health Promotion Board (HPB), and Breast Cancer Foundation (BCF).

The Society organised an English and Mandarin public forum at Concorde Hotel, which attracted over 500 participants, most of whom were women. A panel of specialists from NCCS, NCIS, and National University Hospital (NUH) discussed breast cancer prevention and screening, treatment options and their side effects, as well as psychosocial support and alternative therapies. In addition, breast cancer survivors shared their personal testimonies and described the challenges that they faced when they were diagnosed with breast cancer.

To complement the public forum, pink coupons were distributed to women aged 40 and above by participating partners for use at participating polyclinics, hospitals, and diagnostic centres. These pink coupons provided a \$25 mammogram subsidy during the BCAM campaign.

Other Public Education Initiatives

World Cancer Day

The Society commemorated World Cancer Day on 4 February to spread the message that "Cancer Can be Prevented" and to remind the public to go for regular cancer screenings. The Society's World Cancer Day logo featured a lilac-coloured ribbon which represents all cancers and general cancer awareness. 50,000 bookmarks encouraging regular cancer screenings were distributed to the public to raise awareness.

At Orchard Road, Raffles Place, and Tanjong Pagar Road, 50 volunteers and staff members distributed more than 20,000 syringe-shaped pens in conjunction with the premier screening of the award-winning documentary "Life Before Death," which was funded by the Lien Foundation. This screening sought to raise awareness of the "global pain crisis" and the need for improved pain management for cancer patients, especially those living in third world countries.

The Society also partnered the National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS) to host the World Cancer Day 2012 celebrations on 3 February, which featured a host of activities such as cancer prevention education and a special performance by 365 Cancer Prevention Society.



Towards Tobacco Free Singapore

As part of its public education and cancer prevention mission, the Society supported Associate Professor Koong Heng Nung from the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS) to help nurture the first tobacco-free generation in the world as part of the "Towards Tobacco Free Singapore" project, which aims to discourage people born in 2000 and after from picking up smoking.

Close to 3000 primary school students and teachers from Henry Park Primary School and Raffles Girls' School were educated on the history of tobacco via a skit presented by Professor Koong and his team.



World Conference on Tobacco or Health

The fifteenth World Conference on Tobacco or Health was held in March in Singapore at the Suntec Convention Centre. Organised by the Health Promotion Board (HPB), the conference brought together delegates to discuss the various tools and strategies regarding tobacco control.

The Society's booth showcased its efforts made to discourage people from smoking.

Men's Health Public Forum

The Society partnered the Society of Men's Health to raise awareness of Men's Health in March at the HPB Auditorium. The Society distributed Faecal Occult Blood Test (FOBT) kits at the forum to those aged 50 and above and to others who met the screening criteria.

Lianhe Wanbao Beauty and Health Fair

The Society took part in the Lianhe Zaobao Health Seminar and Roadshow for the third time by promoting cancer screening methods such as the Faecal Occult Blood Test (FOBT) kit and Pap smear. Women were also encouraged to go for mammograms at subsidised rates at National Healthcare Group Diagnostics (NHGD) polyclinics.

Daffodil Days School Outreach – July 2012

The Society engaged in a pilot outreach to River Valley Primary School by conducting a talk that focused on general cancer awareness, the myths of cancer, lifestyle prevention methods against cancer, and ways to support and encourage people who are battling with cancer. It also prepared a resource kit which included a newly produced Daffodil Days doodle book as a tool to engage and interest students to learn more about cancer. A quiz segment engaged students in games with prizes sponsored by Banana Boat. The school was also given a follow-up activity for students who were interested to design a Bandana for the cancer cause. This pilot outreach

serves as a basis for launching a wider outreach to schools in subsequent years.

The Society reached out to 1,320 students at River Valley Primary School from primary two to six and raised \$587.70 through the sale of Daffodil Days pens and pins.

November – November 2012

During the month of November each year, Movember encourages men across the world to grow a moustache to raise research funds and awareness for men's health issues, specifically prostate cancer.

The Society organised a lunchtime talk entitled "Fighting Prostate Cancer" at Citibank. This talk was attended by 35 staff members who raised \$14,568 in support of the campaign. The talk was conducted by Movember Ambassador Dr Poh Beow Kiong, MB, BS (Singapore), MRCS (Edinburgh), M Med (Surgery), FAMS.

CANCER SCREENING SERVICES

Cancer screening helps to detect cancer at an early stage where treatment is more effective. This increases the chance of a cure.

The chances of recovery and survival increase when cancer is detected and treated at an early stage. The free cancer screening services that the Society provides to Singaporeans and Permanent Residents are:

Screening Tests

- Faecal Occult Blood Test (FOBT) to screen for colorectal cancer.
- Pap smear to screen for cervical cancer.

Patient Education

- Breast Self-Examination (BSE) to help detect breast cancer.

The Society provides the abovementioned screening services freely at its clinic at Realty Centre, Enggor Street throughout the year. It also encourages heartlanders to be screened by collaborating with community centres, corporate agencies, and medical institutions during its community outreach and campaigns. Subsidised mammograms were also provided to those who need follow-up tests.

Colorectal Cancer Screening

Colorectal cancer can be prevented through the removal of polyps or benign growths in the colon/rectum. Polyps will develop into cancer over time if left untreated.

The Faecal Occult Blood Test (FOBT) serves as a preliminary screening test for colorectal cancer. It detects the presence of blood in stool. All Singaporeans and Permanent Residents aged 50 and above as well as those below 50 with a family history of colorectal cancer are encouraged to perform this test annually.

During Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month (CCAM) in

March 2012, the Society partnered 18 polyclinics and 71 Guardian Health and Beauty pharmacy stores to distribute free FOBT kits to the public. 11 Guardian Health and Beauty pharmacy stores continued with the distribution of the FOBT kits until the end of the year.

Free FOBT kits were also distributed at our clinic and 29 community events such as health roadshows, public forums, and corporate talks that the Society participated in during the campaign period. As a result of media coverage and publicity efforts on colorectal cancer awareness, more participants came forward with the commitment to perform this test.

In 2012, more than 30,500 people collected FOBT kits. Of these, more than 24,500 people returned the kits for laboratory analysis. Among those who returned the kits, 1,071 people tested positive for blood in their stool. Of these, 233 people underwent colonoscopy. 7 were detected with cancer and 37 had their pre-cancerous polyps removed.* The campaign helped save 44 lives.

Cervical Cancer Screening

Cervical cancer can be treated and completely cured if detected in its early stages. Pap smears serve to detect pre-cancerous changes or early cancer in the cervix. Patients with abnormal Pap smear readings were referred to gynaecologists for further assessment.

During the Cervical Cancer Awareness Month (CCAM) in May 2012, the Society partnered 135 GP clinics across

the island to provide free Pap smear screening for 4,559 Singaporean and Permanent Resident women aged 25 and above.

For the entire year, 3,339 women underwent Pap smear screening provided by the Society's clinic. Patients who required follow-ups were referred to gynaecologists for further assessment. 8 women were found with cancer.

Breast Cancer Screening

The Society's clinic provides patient education on Breast Self-Examination (BSE) and advises women aged 40 and above to undergo regular mammograms. 3,313 women were taught BSE at the Society's clinic.

The Society continued its collaboration with the National Healthcare Group Diagnostics (NHGD) for the fourth year.



Women aged 40 and above who visited the Society's clinic were given a \$10 discount for mammogram screening services at NHGD polyclinics. 463 women underwent mammograms. Of these, 21 women were referred for further assessment due to suspicious findings in their breast tissue.

During the Breast Cancer Awareness Month (BCAM) in October, the Society partnered 39 hospitals, medical institutions and diagnostic centres to provide subsidised mammogram services. Mammogram subsidy coupons were distributed at the Society's clinic, 72 Guardian Health



and Beauty pharmacy stores, and 51 Healthway Medical Group GP clinics. Subsidy coupons were also distributed on the premises of the Association of Women for Action and Research (AWARE) and the Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA). More than 7,500 women utilised these mammogram subsidy coupons during the campaign. Of these, 295 women were referred for further assessment due to suspicious findings in their breast tissue.

Celebrate Wellness

Singapore Cancer Society collaborated with PAP women's WINGS (Women Inspiring, Nurturing and Grooming Singaporeans) to provide one free mammogram screening over a two-year period, from 1 January 2010 to 31 December 2011, to all women aged 50 to 69 years who either have not had a mammogram screening done before or who have not had one performed in the last three years. This initiative was extended to 30 September 2012 to allow for more women to be screened.

Toteboard funded \$25 for each eligible woman screened, which SCS reimbursed to the service providers (from the funds provided by Toteboard) for each woman who took up mammogram screening and was verified eligible by the Health Promotion Board (HPB).

Under this programme, the Society oversees the disbursement of funds to the screening service providers, namely Singapore General Hospital (SGH), National Healthcare Group Diagnostics (NHGD) and Medi-Rad Associates Ltd (MEDI-RAD). In 2012, this programme benefitted 7,076 women.

HOSPICE HOME CARE

The Society continues to provide quality hospice home care services. As an effort to build up its clinical capability, Dr Rina Nga and Dr Kok Jann Yang (Parkway Cancer Centre) joined the Society as Resident Physician and Visiting Consultant respectively. Much effort has been put into revamping work processes and capability development.

Hospice home care is also governed by a Medical Services Committee made up of volunteer medical professionals headed by Associate Professor Lim Soon Thye, deputy head and senior consultant of the Department of Medical Oncology at the National Cancer Centre Singapore, to provide clinical staff with up-to-date information on the latest treatments and management techniques for different cancers.



As part of our efforts to provide stronger support for clinical staff, the Society engages volunteer counsellors to provide counselling sessions for clinical staff members to help them better cope with the emotional challenges of managing palliative care patients and to avoid burn-out.

In 2012, the Society implemented a new means-testing framework — the National Means Testing System (NMTS) — which was launched by the Ministry of Health (MOH) to automate and minimise the duplication of household means-testing across the healthcare sector.

Over the years, the Society has collaborated closely with Rotary Club International on its "My Wish" project to fulfil the last wishes of its home care patients. In 2012, the Society helped realise the requests of 6 home care patients.

WELFARE SERVICES

Welfare aid from the Society mitigates the great financial strain endured by cancer patients and their families, which may arise from unemployment, loss of income, and hefty treatment costs.

Financial Assistance Schemes

SCS Cancer Treatment Fund

Coping with cancer is emotionally, psychologically, physically, and financially draining for patients and their families. Costly cancer treatments can quickly deplete life savings. Believing firmly that no patient should forego medical treatment for cancer due to financial difficulties, the Society set up the Cancer Treatment Fund in April 2005 to help needy cancer patients cope with the high cost of cancer treatments.

Needy patients are referred to the Society by their doctors or medical social workers from the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), National University Hospital (NUH), Singapore General Hospital (SGH), Tan Tock Seng Hospital (TTSH) and KK Women's & Children's Hospital (KKH).

OUR CANCER TREATMENT

fund was set up in April 2005 to assist needy cancer patients cope with the high cost of cancer treatments

Over \$1,273,000 was disbursed in 2012 to help 443 patients pay for their cancer treatments. Since its inception, 2,969 patients have been assisted through the disbursement of almost \$10,607,000 in cancer treatment subsidies.

Welfare Aid Fund

The Welfare Aid Fund was established in 1964 to provide needy cancer patients and their families with temporary financial aid to tide them over difficult periods during and after cancer treatments. The Fund was later extended to provide medical supplements such as milk and stoma bags on a regular basis to needy patients who required them.

Welfare aid from the Society mitigates the great financial strain endured by cancer patients and their families, which may arise from unemployment, loss of income, and hefty treatment costs. The Fund may be accessed through medical social workers and healthcare professionals at various hospitals, hospices, and voluntary welfare organisations. In 2012, the Fund benefitted 308 patients with a total aid value which exceeded \$768,000.



Other Funds

The Society also administers the following funds:

■ Trailblazer-Chan Chiew Ping Fund

The Fund was established in memory of the late Madam Chan Chiew Ping in support of Iressa and Tarceva treatment for female lung cancer patients. The Society administers the grant on behalf of the Trailblazer — Chan Chiew Ping Fund.

■ RGS Joan Chan Shu Fang Fund

The Fund was established in memory of Joan Chan, an ex-Raffles Girls' student who succumbed to tongue cancer. The Fund provides financial assistance to young needy cancer patients aged 35 and below. The fund balance at the end of 2012 was \$34,217.59.

■ Koh Soh Eng Fund

The Fund was established in memory of the late Madam Koh Soh Eng to help young leukaemia cancer patients, aged 25 and below, by providing financial assistance and subsidies for their cancer treatment. The fund balance at the end of 2012 was \$32,720.47.

Other Welfare Programmes

Free Hospital Transportation

Patients from low-income families who require transportation for their chemotherapy and radiotherapy sessions may apply to our Free Hospital Transport Scheme. Transportation expenses can be an added burden to patients from low-income families. To ease the financial burden faced by these patients and their families, the Society provides free transport services between patients' homes and hospitals for their treatment sessions. Subject to availability, the service is currently provided by two passenger vans for patients receiving treatment at the National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), Singapore General Hospital (SGH), Tan Tock Seng Hospital (TTSH), and National University Hospital (NUH). In 2012, the service benefitted 136 patients.



SCS Help the Children and Youth Programme

For the fourth year running, the SingTel Touching Lives Fund has assisted children and youths whose lives have been affected by cancer through the "SCS Help the Children and Youth" programme. In 2012, the Programme assisted 127 school-going children and youths. These children and youths may be cancer patients themselves or the children of cancer patients who are our beneficiaries. This programme provides assistance and support in the following areas:

- School allowance grants
- Free tuition services
- Book prize and achievement awards
- Home improvement for better study environment
- Family engagement programmes

The financial assistance and free tuition services help to defray education expenses and ease the burden on families whose finances have been heavily tapped for cancer treatments. We also identify homes of students which lack a basic study environment; study tables, chairs and lights are then provided to render their homes conducive for studying. Furthermore, book prizes and achievement awards are awarded to students who improve their academic results.

68 children benefitted from the tuition programmes, of whom 25 received book prizes and 3 received achievement awards. In comparing semestral results in 2012, 38.3% of these children showed improvement in at least 1 subject, 30.2% showed improvement in at least 2 subjects, while 18.8% showed improvement in at least 3 subjects.

Family Engagement Programmes

With the support of the SingTel Touching Lives Fund, the Society organised family outings and activities to provide opportunities for family bonding as children from cancer-affected families may be unable to experience such activities with their parents.

SCS Satellite Centre at the National Cancer Centre Singapore

Established in Aug 2006, the SCS Satellite Centre, located on the premises of the National Cancer Centre Singapore, aims to provide greater access and convenience to patients who wish to know more about our assistance programmes and make applications. Services available at the Centre include:

- Application for the SCS Cancer Treatment Fund
- Information on cancer support groups
- Educational material on cancer
- Information on the services provided by the Society

REHABILITATION & SUPPORT GROUPS

The Society has formed four Support Groups to provide platforms for cancer patients and survivors to receive peer support. Psychosocial and emotional support forms an integral part of a holistic recovery process. Members of these support groups benefit from psychosocial and educational talks and workshops that the Society organises. They also benefit from group sharing, which helps boost the mental resilience of patients in fighting cancer.

New Voice Club

The New Voice Club (NVC) was formed in 1985 to provide rehabilitative support for throat and nasopharyngeal cancer patients and survivors. The Club has over 72 active members. NVC members meet every Tuesday at the Society's premises for voice rehabilitation classes and fun activities like table tennis and carom. Besides providing support within the group, NVC members also make hospital or home visits to newly-diagnosed cancer patients to offer their support by sharing experiences and knowledge. The group also organises social and recreational activities such as outings to the Singapore Chinese Opera Museum and the Gardens by the Bay as well as engages in various festive celebrations.

Ostomy Club

Established in 1981, the Ostomy Club offers support to colorectal cancer patients and survivors and helps them adjust to their new lives with stoma bags. In 2012, the group's total membership stood at 169, of which 40 are active members who meet every second Saturday of the month. Stoma therapists and nurses are present at all Ostomy Club meetings to assist members with their concerns. Talks and presentations on health-related subjects such as nutrition and exercise were also conducted at these meetings to benefit its members.

Ostomy Club members reach out to new patients through home visits and telephone calls. They help to mitigate the fears of new patients by providing emotional support and sharing their experiences and knowledge. Besides participating in various festive celebrations, members also engage in recreational activities such as art therapy and dance movement therapy. In 2012, members and their caregivers celebrated World Ostomy Day with



volunteers at Bollywood Veggies. The Society partnered with Singapore General Hospital (SGH) in organising the first World Ostomy conference.

Reach to Recovery Support Group

Reach to Recovery (RTR) was established in 1973 to help women cope with breast cancer. There are over 257 registered RTR members. RTR members meet on the second Saturday of each month to share their experiences, to discuss strategies relating to breast cancer rehabilitation, or to participate in psychosocial workshops for breast cancer survivors.

Look Good...Feel Better Programme

The Look Good...Feel Better (LGFB) programme assists female cancer patients in coping with the effects of cancer treatment such as hair loss and skin discolorations by helping them improve their appearance and regain their self-esteem. Hands-on workshop sessions are conducted by volunteer cosmetologists who teach make-up techniques and offer tips on skin and hair care as well as the use of various accessories such as wigs, hats, and scarves to enhance the looks of cancer patients.

During these workshops, patients are also given the opportunity to share how they are coping with their illness and treatment. 31 workshops were conducted in 2012 for 216 participants who attended workshops which were conducted at Johns Hopkins Singapore International Medical Centre, Gleneagles Hospital, Changi General Hospital (CGH), KK Women's and Children's Hospital (KKH), National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), and National University Hospital (NUH).

LGFB members also participated at the Breast Cancer Awareness Month launch at Marina Bay and reached out to residents of Southwest CDC at the Winning Against Cancer Symposium.

VOLUNTEER PROGRAMMES

The support of volunteers is integral to the long-term success of the Society's activities and services.

Profile of Volunteers

Volunteers are valuable as they augment the Society's limited resources. Our volunteers come from diverse backgrounds and contribute their selfless dedication, experience, and expertise that add value to the Society's work.

The Society received some 427 new registrants as volunteers while the pool of active volunteers increased to 1324 in 2012 from 1218 in 2011. These committed volunteers assisted the Society in various areas such as consultation work, giving talks on cancer at public forums, raising funds, promoting cancer screening, assisting in administrative work, and conducting welfare related activities. The Society is thankful to have the support of many corporations who have encouraged their staff to volunteer with the Society, especially SingTel, Blackberry, Pulesync Pte Ltd, and the Central Police Station.

555 students from various schools also helped the Society prepare for events such as the Race Against Cancer and Daffodil Days.

The support of volunteers is integral to the long-term success of the Society's activities and services. The Society values and appreciates every effort made by our volunteers and remains committed to finding ways to make their volunteering experiences with the Society fulfilling and meaningful.

World Cancer Day

World Cancer Day was celebrated on 4 February 2012 to spread the message that "Cancer can be Prevented" and to encourage cancer prevention, detection, and treatment. The Society collaborated with its volunteers and partners to distribute pens and bookmarks to raise awareness of the need for improved pain management for cancer patients and to remind the public to undergo regular cancer screening for early detection. Furthermore, the Singapore Slingers dedicated one of their games to the Society and conducted an auction to raise funds in support of the cause.

Daffodil Days

Daffodil Days 2012 was launched on 1 April by Dr Vivian Balakrishnan, Minister of the Environment and Water Resources, at the 2XU Compression Run where some 10,000 runners participated in 10km and 15km runs which began along Nicoll Highway.

464 volunteers canvassed the streets to sell daffodil pens and other merchandise to raise funds for the Society. A Daffodil Days microsite was also created to encourage visitors to share their cancer stories and provide support to others who suffered from cancer. Visitors were also given the opportunity to send electronic daffodil flowers to encourage those battling cancer and their caregivers or to light a candle in remembrance of those who have passed away.

SingTel and Singapore Cancer Society's Race Against Cancer 2012

The fourth SingTel and Singapore Cancer Society Race Against Cancer (RAC 2012) took place on 22 July 2012 at the East Coast Park, Angsana Green. The event was graced by Guest-of-Honour Major-General Chan Chun Sing, Acting Minister of Community Development, Youth and Sports, and Minister of State for Communications, Information and the Arts. RAC 2012 drew a record 8,500 participants, which included 103 corporate teams, 100 beneficiaries, as well as 25 hand-cyclists and their supporters. The event also saw some 300 volunteers contributing their time and effort to assist in various roles. RAC 2012 raised more than \$750,000, including the \$200,000 donated from the SingTel Touching Lives Fund in support of the SCS Help the Children and Youth Programme.

Report on the Financial Statements

Important Note

1. General

The principal objectivities of the Singapore Cancer Society ("the Society") are those of a community-based voluntary health organisation dedicated to minimising the impact of cancer through public education, screening, patient service, financial assistance, research and advocacy.

The Society is established in Singapore under the Societies Act, Chapter 311. It is also subject to the provisions of the Charities Act, Chapter 37. It is an Institution of a Public Character.

The constitution of the Society restricts the use of fund monies to the furtherance of the objects of the Society. It prohibits the payment of dividends to members. The Society has no share capital.

The functional currency of the Society is Singapore dollars and the financial statements are presented in Singapore dollars.

The Society is registered and situated in Singapore. The registered office address is: 15 Enggor Street, #04-01 to 04 Realty Centre, Singapore 079716.

The financial statements were approved and authorised for issue by the Council of the Society on the date indicated in the statement by the Council.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accounting Convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Singapore Financial Reporting Standards ("FRS") and the related interpretations to FRS ("INT FRS") as issued by the Singapore Accounting Standards Council. The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention except where an FRS requires an alternative treatment (such as fair values) as disclosed where appropriate in these financial statements. The Society is also subject to the provisions of the Charities Act, Chapter 37.

3. Related Party Relationships and Transactions

A related party includes the Council members and key management of the Society. It also includes an entity or person that directly or indirectly controls, is controlled by, or is under common or joint control with these persons; members of the key management personnel or close members of the family of any individual referred to herein and others who have the ability to control, jointly control or significantly influence by or for which significant voting power in such entity resides with, directly or indirectly, any such individual. Key management personnel include the CEO and the direct reporting senior officers.

The Council members, or people connected with them, have not received remuneration, or other benefits, from the Society or from institutions connected with the Society.

There is no claim by the Council members for services provided to the Society, either by reimbursement to the Council members or by providing the Council members with an allowance or by direct payment to a third party.

Notes to the Financial Statements

All Council members, chairman of sub-committees and staff members of the Society are required to read and understand the conflict of interest policy in place and make full disclosure of interests, relationships and holding that could potentially result in conflict of interests.
